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New Rural Fire Law Explained

Numerous farmers in the Wayne area have requested information concerning the 1949 Nebraska law providing for the organization and operation of rural fire protection districts. The Wayne Chamber of Commerce reports:

Briefly the law is as follows: The legislature recognizes "that it is to the best interest to encourage residents and property owners in rural areas in the state to organize, equip and maintain local fire fighting bodies, and that such organizations will promote public health, convenience, safety and welfare in rural areas in the state."

"WHENEVER 60 percent of the freeholders residing in any rural territory equivalent in area to one township or more elects to form a rural fire protection district, they may signify such intention by presenting to the county clerk a petition setting forth the desires and purposes of such petitioners."

"The petitioners shall also present to the county clerk, a plat or map showing suggested boundaries of the proposed district. The county board then completes arrangements. Fire districts may include parts of more than one county."

Rural fire districts, according to the 1949 law, are governed by a board of directors composed of members of that fire district. The board has the power to determine a general protection program, make an annual estimate of expense, manage and conduct business affairs, make and execute contracts and purchase or lease such fire fighting equipment and other real or personal property as shall be necessary. The district may incur indebtedness within a \$10,000 limit. This amount can be borrowed at 1 percent interest.

"THE BUDGET supported by tax is not to exceed 1 mill on all taxable property within said district. In no case shall the amount of tax levy exceed the amount of funds required to defray expenses of the district for one year and the tax is nullified by a lowering of insurance rates by about 13 percent on fire insurance costs."

Many areas in the state are taking advantage of the new law, which was designed to improve fire service in rural communities.

Former Wayne Man Gets High Post With Bekins

Lloyd Erxleben of Los Angeles, Calif., son of Mrs. Frank Erxleben of Wayne, has been appointed personal director of Bekins, a nationwide van and storage firm, according to word received here.

Before his new job, the former Wayne man was manager of the Driver Safety Center of Los Angeles. This was organized in 1946, and is the first of its kind in the country. It has set the pattern for other industry sponsored centers throughout the country and has been credited with a marked reduction in accidents in the industry.

Erxleben received his AB from the Nebraska State Teachers college in Wayne and afterwards did graduate work at Northwestern university and the University of California, Los Angeles. His career began in 1936 as a high school teacher in Emerson and Sioux City. In 1942, he enlisted as a private in the Army Air Forces weather service and was discharged with the rank of major in 1946.

Mr. and Mrs. Erxleben and their two daughters make their home in Altadena, Calif.

Former Local Man Now An Inventor



A native son of Wayne has become a nationally recognized manufacturer through his invention of an electric plug with a safety grip finger-pull. W. T. Gossard, son of Mrs. Olive Gossard and brother of Mrs. Clarence Sorenson of Wayne, got his idea for the THYCO plug when his wife broke a fingernail while trying to disconnect their electric toaster. Her patience gone, she snapped out against her face, breaking her glasses.

She asked, "Why don't you do something about this?" and the inventive gleam lighted Mr. Gossard's eyes. He drew out several plans and designs, patented his invention and set up shop in Los Angeles as a THYCO plug manufacturer. The T in THYCO stands for Ted, his nickname; the Y for Helen, his wife; the C for Colleen, his oldest daughter; the O for Oliver, his youngest; and the O for Olive, his mother.

MR. GOSSARD IS NOW tooling for a unique THYCO cord set which has been accepted by the patent bureau of the United States and by underwriters associations in both the United States and Canada.

There are two forms of THYCO plugs. One has a double finger-grip preferred by women and the other has a single opening, which men prefer.

MECHANIX ILLUSTRATED, selected the plug as prize winner of their gadget of the month feature for the August issue. The plug has been advertised in several news, business and trade magazines.

Mr. Gossard was born in Wayne and attended high school and college here. He went to California in 1927. His wife, the former Helen McManold of Winslow, also attended Wayne college.

Last Rites Held At Hyannis for Dr. Kreamer, 74

Funeral services for Dr. C. W. Kreamer, 74, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Lamberson of Wayne, were held last Wednesday at the Congregational church in Hyannis, where he had made his home for several years. Rev. H. J. Taylor conducted the service.

Dr. Kreamer died July 24 at his ranch home. Burial was in the Hill-side cemetery.

He was born in Millheim, Pa., Nov. 30, 1874. He graduated from Bucknell Academy in Lewisburg, Pa., in 1893 and enrolled in the American college of Dental Surgery in Chicago. This school was later consolidated with Northwestern university from which he graduated in 1897. He came to Nebraska that autumn to practice. Five of these years were spent in Alliance and the rest largely in Hyannis.

DR. KREAMER has been known as a great lover of trees and his ranch southwest of Hyannis is a monument to his efforts in this direction. He has planted about 15,000 trees on the ranch and was assisted in planting over 30,000 trees in Nebraska in conjunction with the state forestry extension service.

In 1900 he became a member of the Masonic lodge and was raised to the degree of Master Mason at Ansley. He received his permit from this lodge and joined Zion lodge at Hyannis where he served as master for two years.

In 1945 he married Hallie A. Blievernicht, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lamberson, and the couple have resided on their ranch since, excepting winters spent in Hyannis.

SURVIVORS ARE his wife, a sister, Mrs. M. A. Lesher of Denver, a brother, Isaac D. Kreamer of Seattle, Wash., and five nephews.

Mrs. Kreamer's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Clara Lamberson of Beatrice, were among those at the funeral. Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Lamberson were unable to attend.

Mrs. Kreamer had planned to be in Wayne this weekend, but had to postpone her trip until later this month.



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Congress

As Seen By KARL STEFAN

Few persons know that Nebraska is one of the only two states represented by two seals apiece in the ceiling now being replaced in the House of Representatives chamber of the capitol.

The Territory of Nebraska seal, one of the original 38 seals placed in the ceiling when the House wing was completed in 1863, was in a prominent position in the center of the north row of seals directly opposite the speaker's desk.

The ceiling of the Senate chamber, also being replaced in the capitol remodeling, carried seals representing various governmental activities and occupational aspects of American life.

THE HOUSE passed a bill appropriating 150 million dollars to fight grasshoppers and other insects. Sixty-five percent of the money will be used exclusively to fight grasshoppers which department of agriculture representatives told the committee are prevalent in Wyoming and in some parts of Nebraska.

A DIFFERENT type of ceiling will be placed in the remodeled House chamber, with provisions made for indirect lighting and dicaloustical improvements.

Each year unless the country is in a war emergency or unless Congress by its own resolution authorizes extension of a session beyond that date. Because pending legislation probably will keep Congress here at least until the last of August and in order to avoid the necessity of a special resolution, the speaker of the House has ruled that we are still in a state of war and that an emergency exists.

The Nebraska Teacher faithfully reported the activities of the institutes. The Nebraska county institute, held at Nelson in December 1914, may be cited as somewhat typical of the early meetings.

THE INSTITUTEs generally were held on a county basis, with the county superintendent presiding. Usually they lasted from two to five days, although in the 80's some of them lasted several weeks.

Miss Phillips teaches high school English and American history at training school during the common school term. During the summer she teaches college and high school courses; besides these classes she has study centers throughout the year.

Miss Phillips received her BA

and MA degrees at West Texas State in Canyon, Tex. She attended Texas Technological college for a semester while working on her MA. She originally comes from Hale Center, Tex. Her father was one of the first to farm in that region of Texas.

BEFORE COMING to Wayne Miss Phillips taught four years in the north panhandle of Texas, two years at Grand Valley, Palsade, Colo. and one summer in Tucumcari, N. M. Besides attending and teaching school, she has done much office work in colleges and one summer in an FSA office.

Miss Phillips pointed out that there are scarcely any rural schools in Texas. In the region where she taught, 700 of the 1200 people in the county lived in the town of Miami. In this town was the one school in the county, and some of the students were obliged to ride 40 miles to school each morning.

The instructor is interested in the liberal arts experiment in the Nebraska colleges, because the same action has taken place in Texas.

"We should never forget to teach people; we must remember that we can teach these people something," Miss Phillips said that this statement is paraphrased after the educational philosophy of Jacques Bazan.

Among her favorite hobbies are reading, sewing and cooking. She especially enjoys types of outdoor life. Miss Phillips appreciates the pleasant people of Wayne and their friendliness.

Another Yelp for Help

Great Britain, on the financial rocks again, wants the United States to grant her huge new sums of money. It's something like the "good old college days" when Dad seldom heard from Junior... except when he was running low on cash. Similarly, it's getting so that Great Britain's communications with Uncle Sam usually are requests for more cash.

Since the war, Great Britain has received staggering sums of dollars from the United States, expecting that this money would put her "back on her feet." It hasn't, and she appears today to be farther than ever from economic stability, despite all-out aid from the United States.

We don't particularly object to aid for Britain, but the money she has received apparently has not been spent wisely, and Uncle Sam cannot continue to foot the bill forever. It is, as we see it, an indictment of Great Britain's socialist government. As burdensome, and sprawling, and inefficient as our own government sometimes seems to be, we'll take it in preference to Britain's experiment in socialism.

Who'll Help Uncle Sam?
(Knoxville, Ia., Journal)

One of the best things that President Truman seems to do is to reach for Uncle Sam's check book and ask the Congressional advocates of this or that, "How much will it be this time?"

There are generous citizens who respond like that to calls for money for some good cause.

But there is this difference: Good Citizen has to reach for his own personal check book. President Harry reaches for Uncle Sam's check book.

He exemplified his check-book-reaching habit immediately after the Senate approved the North Atlantic Alliance treaty. He came back at the Senate with a proposal that immediately \$1,450,000,000 be appropriated to make it possible for the North European allies to spend that much for equipment for defense.

The free-spending President (with Uncle Sam's billions) refused to listen to Senator Vandenberg and others who suggested that such aid be given part at a time. With very large generosity the answer came—"All or none."

Senator Robert Taft dwelt upon this new kind of use for Uncle Sam's billions in a radio discussion last Sunday night. He foresaw this particular demand and others to follow, each in its turn quite plausible. This \$1,450,000,000 call for help is probably only the beginning.

There is very definitely a need for close cooperation between the United States and the North Atlantic nations. Some kind of assurance needs to be given them that they have a sure friend in the United States, but there is also serious question of how far must the United States go?

Our nation has its own serious problems, growing greater and more difficult day by day. Where can it turn for help, except to its ownself.

The time has come when the people of the United States must face the fact that it must be true to its own good interests and welfare. Sooner or later that must be the first consideration. That time may be right at hand. We've been all out for the other fellow; who will be all out for Uncle Sam if the need come?

A timely question.

Want Free Roads
(Cedar County News)

Apparently the people of Nebraska want good roads, but no one wants to pay for them.

The last legislature increased the gas tax and the registration fees for cars and trucks. Now commercial truck interests and certain farm groups are fighting both laws via referendum.

The fact remains, however, that roads cost money, they are not free. If we wish to have more good roads some one must pay the bill.

The increased gas tax helps out the burden on the users of the highways, and the largest users pay the greatest amount. Commercial trucks, which use the highways, are said to break the roads down faster than the fees they pay will build them. It is also said that much lower cost highways could be built, thus making the highway dollars go farther, if it were not for the heavy trucks.

If this is the case, as it apparently is, then the commercial trucker should pay a larger share of the highway cost. The car user will pay more gas tax for more roads, and

an increased license fee to give the roads we have better care and maintenance.

The former license fees and gas taxes did not keep pace with the increased cost of highway materials and labor, nor the increased demand for all-weather roads.

It would seem that the new laws are fair, and place the additional burden on the proper shoulders.

The best things in life may free, but the best roads are not. The trouble seems to be that everyone wants better roads and they want someone else to pay the bill!

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
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
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
