

County Fair Expects Largest 'Entry List'

AAA Ready to Store 400,000 Bushels of Corn

Delivery of 1948 Corn Scheduled to Begin on Sept. 1

As the time nears for delivery of 1948 loan and purchase agreement corn to the government, the Wayne county AAA is making arrangements for the storage of more than 400,000 bushels of the crop.

Four bins, with a capacity of 40,000 bushels each, will be placed in Wayne and two of a similar size will be stationed in Sholes.

Wayne elevators have agreed to store another 35,000 of 60,000 bushels. Other storage space will be provided by elevators in Carroll and Winslow.

The 1949 annual remedial speech clinic of Wayne State Teachers college is now in progress to again bring new hope into the lives of speech handicapped children of northeast Nebraska.

On the day the clinic opened, Mrs. Rollie Ley, a member of the Wayne county committee of the Nebraska Society for Crippled Children, who volunteered her services to bring children from their homes to the clinic, was on hand with a selected group of children needing the services offered.

Alice Liljegren, for the past several years director of the remedial speech program in the Omaha public schools, and Arlene Oberhelman, who in September will open a new department in this field in the Fremont public schools, will spend three weeks each year holding college classes in remedial speech at Wayne State Teachers college, in addition to supervising the remedial speech training for the children brought to the clinic.

Dr. Howard Tempero, dean of the college, said, "The parents of any child with any sort of speech handicap should try to get their child into the clinic so he will not be handicapped through life with peculiar or inadequate speech."

Parents who wish their children to attend future sessions of the clinic should notify their county superintendent of schools, who is the chairman of their county committee of the Nebraska Society for Crippled Children for any necessary financial arrangements.

He advised taking the youngster to Omaha, where the paralyzed leg was placed in a cast. Extent of the paralysis has not been determined.

Kathy Ann is at home and will be taken back to Omaha in about 10 days when a brace will replace the cast.

Schroeder Says Trend is Toward Socialized State

Legislator Explains Solons' Problems To Local Kiwanians

State Senator Norris Schroeder of Hoskins told Wayne Kiwanians Monday of the problems that face Nebraska legislators.

He emphasized what he feels is our rapid transit toward a socialized state. Many bills in the legislature pointed that way. In 1935 we had an assistance program and now we spend 19 million in the state for assistance in times that are good, he said.

HE ILLUSTRATED the trend toward socializing the government by the change in terminology which "cushions" people's thinking. The assistance program used to be relief and unemployment insurance is now insurance security.

He explained his opposition to the highway program in the 1949 session by saying that as far as Wayne county was concerned, only the tax would be paid with no benefits derived that he could see. He also said that the efficiency of the administration of the highway department should be increased, rather than more money appropriated to be poorly administered.

HIS STAND in regard to appropriating more money for various state departments is that our state government is getting too large and too burdensome. He told of the increase in size of the state fish and game commission from 38 employees to 150.

In regard to representation in the legislature, he admonished those present to elect a senator who had the most modest success in his own right, someone who has had to make business decisions and meet a payroll from his own capital.

ONE OF THE problems met by legislators is the difference between the wants of the people and the demands of pressure groups. He asked that citizens have adequate knowledge of a matter before contacting their senator, as a senator is naturally influenced by the needs and wants of his constituents.

Wayne Pastor to Aid Church Drive

Fremont—Rev. S. K. deFresco, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran church in Wayne, has received another mark of recognition by the United Lutheran Church in America.

According to Midland, college here, he has been appointed a member of the directing committee for the denomination's Midwest Synod for managing the church's Christian Higher Education Year appeal, which will begin this fall and have its intensive period from Jan. 1 through next April 30.

He will have an important supervisory part in raising within the synod area \$75,000, set as the synod's quota of the \$6,000,000 fund which will be raised throughout the United States and Canada to strengthen the nine theological seminaries, 13 standard colleges and one junior college of the denomination.

Carroll Special Election Friday

Carroll residents will vote tomorrow on the question of granting a 25-year franchise to the Wayne County Rural Public Power district to furnish electricity for the town. Only a majority is needed to carry the proposal.

The election was called as a result of a petition signed by the necessary number of residents asking that the question be submitted to a vote. Those who favor the change believe that it would be economical and more efficient than the present diesel generating plant.

Over Proposal to Shift REA Headquarters—Emerson, Wakefield in 'Feud'

Proposed transfer of the Northeast Nebraska Rural Public Power REA headquarters from Emerson to Wakefield has developed into an open feud between the two northeast Nebraska towns.

The dispute began a few weeks ago with the publication in Dixon county newspapers of a notice of hearing on the proposed shift, after the district's board of directors had voted, 4 to 2, to move to Wakefield.

Headquarters for the district, which includes Dixon, Dakota and a part of Thurston county, have been located in Emerson since the REA was set up about 12 years ago.

A HEARING on the proposal originally was set for Sept. 1 before the department of roads and irrigation in Lincoln. Now, however, according to an Emerson spokesman, the board of directors has adopted a resolution asking a postponement pending a "further survey of the district and the situation."

This action, he said, came after some 600 of the district's 1200 farmers had signed petitions protesting the proposed move of the headquarters.

Emerson, fighting hard to keep the district, charges that the board of directors voted to transfer to Wakefield because of pressure brought by Wakefield businessmen and Lawrence Brock, Wakefield cattle feeder and president of the REA board of directors.

BUT LAST WEEK the Wakefield Republican said, "It might first be stated that the businessmen of Wakefield are absolutely not the instigators of the proposed move."

And the Omaha World-Herald noted that Brock said, "This move has been discussed for several years. Wakefield would be the best town because it has an airport, is nearer power line metering and switching stations and can furnish adequate dental and medical care for REA employees."

The Emerson Tri-County Press countered by pointing out that Emerson, too, has an airport, and that the bulk of the patrons live in the Emerson area and their needs can best be served by leaving the headquarters in Emerson.

Calf Sale Wednesday, Aug. 31 90 Head Will Go at Auction

Ninety head of dairy calves from some of the finest Wisconsin herds will be sold at public auction at the Wayne sale barn next Wednesday evening at 8:00.

The sale, a non-profit venture, is sponsored by the special committee of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce. All proceeds in excess of actual costs will be prorated back to the purchasers.

IN THE OFFERING will be Holsteins, Brown Swiss, Guernseys and Milking Shorthorns. All are tested for tuberculosis and Bang's disease and inoculated against shipping fever. The animals will be guaranteed one month against death loss.

The calves will be bigger than last year and more closely graded. A heavier consignment of Brown Swiss than in previous sales is expected.

THIS WILL BE the fourth dairy calf sale sponsored by the local C. A. Anyone interested in seeing good calves to his herd is eligible to attend the sale and join in the bidding.

Tom Hughes will cry the sale, and the local banks will serve as clerks.

A number of calves purchased at previous sales will be on display at the sale barn the night of the sale.

Beginners Need Birth Records

Supt. E. W. Willert of the Wayne city schools today reminded parents that children of kindergarten age must have their birth certificates with them when they enroll on Sept. 5.

Although the kindergarten will be divided into two groups, all children are to enroll the morning school opens. The class then will be divided into morning and afternoon groups for the rest of the term.

Under the new school law, children must be 5 years of age by Oct. 15 of the current year to be eligible for kindergarten.

Merrily We Go in Debt

In his weekly news letter, Congressman Karl Stefan notes that "some of the appropriation bills which have been hung up in the Senate were passed by the House in March and April."

Ordinarily, appropriation bills would—or should—have been passed long ago, for the government began a new fiscal year on July 1 and is more or less operating without money. Perhaps the Senate needs a bit of prodding. The 81st session of Congress seems to be dragging on interminably, and all indications point to many more weeks of legislative work if anything at all is to be accomplished.

But, although the Senate may be responsible for the failure to approve certain appropriation bills, it alone is not to blame for the fact that the national debt now stands at 255 billions—the highest since February 1948. Neither the House nor the Senate has done enough to reduce government expenses and expenditures, and the government will go on spending the nation farther into the red until something constructive is done. Government spending is longer just a serious problem—it is downright dangerous to the national economy.

The people are becoming more and more aware of the government's foolhardy course, so much so that the elections in 1950 may result in another turnover in the personnel of the nation's Congress.

The Dairy Calf Sales

Next Wednesday evening the Wayne Chamber of Commerce will sponsor its fourth non-profit dairy calf sale. The venture was originated for the purpose of promoting the dairy industry in northeast Nebraska, and the three previous sales have brought many fine cattle into this part of the state. Since these sales are strictly non-profit affairs, farmers have been able to enrich their herds with calves from Wisconsin's better herds at relatively low cost. We believe these auctions have been a healthy contribution to northeast Nebraska agriculture and should be continued as long as the demand exists.

Skinning a Tomato

(Omaha Journal-Stockman)

Directions for skinning a tomato are contributed in the form of a new story from the educated cooks of Iowa State College. Scientific research at its peak!

First, to skin a tomato, you have to catch a tomato; then in the kitchen drawer you will find a knife. Now you may think you are all ready to proceed—just skin it. But, no, hold it. First scald the tomato, then douse it in cold water. Now you are really ready, and we get to what science has learned on this intricate and so often fumbled problem. Thus:

"Take hold of the tomato in the position for coring, to avoid shifting it around after it's picked up. The stem end or core can be removed with a single simultaneous twist of both hands. The left hand, holding the tomato with the stem end toward you, twists quickly to your left, and the hand holding the knife twists to the right. The knife goes completely around the core in a single stroke, and meanwhile you need not shift your hold on the tomato. . . Grasp the skin at the core opening with the edge of the knife and the ball of your thumb. Pull toward the blossom end. The peeling from then on begins at the blossom end instead, the side (not the end) of the knife slipping under the skin at the start of each stroke. Meanwhile, the fingers of the left hand rotate the tomato, always in the same direction, between peeling strokes. Repeat the peeling process in the same way, tomato after tomato, and you'll develop a rhythm which will speed the task."

That gets to the heart of the trouble of so many housewives. Left hand to the left, right hand to the right—say it over and over. Never, never left hand to the right, and right hand to the left.

Now go out and pick a tomato and practice—left to the left, right to the right—whisper it, yell it, sing it.

'Cats Schedule 5 Home Games

18 Lettermen On Roster

Followers of Wayne State's Wildcats will be treated to five home games at the northeastern Nebraska college's athletic field this fall as Wayne tries to better its 1948 record in which it garnered a conference co-championship for Wayne State.

Furthermore, fans will be comfortable throughout the season in the new Wayne stadium completed this summer and to be dedicated at the opening game Sept. 9, when Wayne meets Westmar college of LeMars, Ia.

Head coach of the Wayne State eleven will be Jack Wink, former Wisconsin and Michigan quarterback. His assistant will be Charles Obye. Wayne State basketball mentor, Drills for the 49 season will start today (Thursday) at Wayne.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR Don Emery has named 35 prospects for the varsity squad. Included on this roster are 18 lettermen. Jack Wink has quarterbacked two of the best Wisconsin football teams in the last decade and that alone should serve notice of what a great football player he was in a Wisconsin uniform. In addition to that he quarterbacked the Michigan team of 1943 to a Western conference title.

Wink prepped in Milwaukee Boys' Tech where he compiled a great athletic record. He was a freshman at Wisconsin and was a member of the 1941 Eastern Iroquois team which was one of the best in the history of Wisconsin football.

HE TOOK OVER the regular quarterback job on the 1942 Badger eleven and guided them within an inch of the national championship. He was named to the sopho-

more all-American that year. The following year he went to Michigan as a lead-lease marine trainee and sparked the Wolverines to their conference title.

WINK EULOGIZED his mates at the final banquet when he said, "You are the greatest squad I have ever been associated with."

Wink was best known for the canny way he maneuvered his team on the football field and was one of the reasons why Stuhldreher went back to the direct method of signal calling.

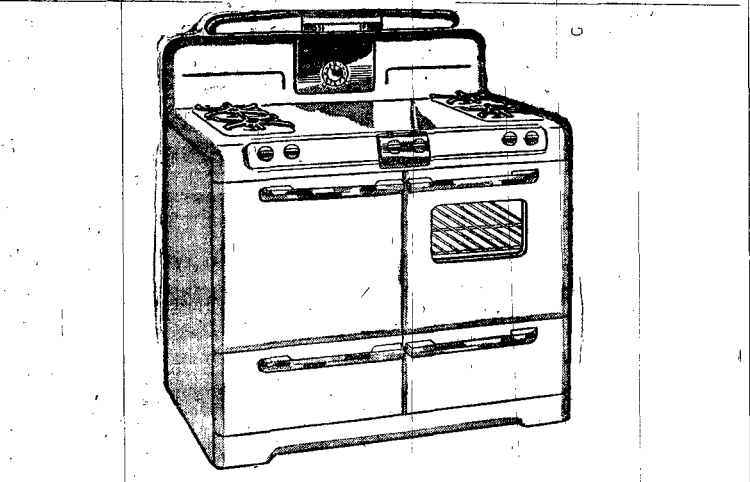


