





Merrily We Go in Debt

In his weekly news letter, Congressman Karl Stefan notes that "some of the appropriation bills which have been hung up in the Senate were passed by the House in March and April."

March and April."

Ordinarily, appropriation bills would—or should—have been passed long ago, for the government began a new fiscal year on July I and is more or less operating without money. Perhaps the Senate needs a bit of prodding. The 81st session of Congress seems to be dragging on interminably, and all indications point to many more weeks of legislative work if anything at all is to be accomplished.

But, although the Senate may be responsible for the failure to approve certain appropriation bills, it alone is not to blame for the fact that the national debt now stands at 255 billions—the highest since February 1948. Neither the House nor the Senate has done enough to reduce government expenses and expenditures, and the government will go on spending the nation farther into the red until something constructive is done. Government spending is longer just a serious problem—it is downright dangerous to the national economy.

Skinning a Tomato

Skinning a Tomato

(Omaha Journal-Stockman)

Directions for skinning a tomato are contributed in the form of a new story from the educated cooks of Iowa State College.

Scientific research at its peak!

First, to skin's tomato, you have to catch a tomato; then in the kitchen drawer you will find a knife. Now you may think you are all ready to proceed—just skin it. But, no, hold it. First scald the tomato, then douse it in cold water. Now you are really ready, and we get to what science has learned on this intricate and so often fumbled problem. Thus:

"Take hold of the tomato in the position for coring, to avoid shifting it around affer it's pickediup. The stem end or core can be removed with a single simultaneous twist of both hands. The left hand, holding the tomato with the stem end toward you, twists quickly to your left, and the hand holding the knife twists to the right. The knife goes competely around the core in a single stroke, and meanwhile you need not shift your hold on the tomato. Grasp the skin at the core opening with the edge of the knife and the ball of your thumb. Pull toward the blossom end. The peeling from then on begins at the blossom end instead, the side (not the end) of the knife slipping under the skin at the start of each stroke. Meanwhile, the lingers of the left hand rotate the tomato, always in the same direction, between peeling strokes. Repeat the peeling process in the same way, tomato after tomato, and you'll develop a rhythm which will speed the task."

That gets to the heart of the trouble of so many house wives. Left frand to the right and right hand to the left, right hand to the left.

Now go out and flick a tomato and practice—left to the left, right to the right—whispet it, yell it, sing it.
