Kiddie Parade to Feature Fall Opening in Wayne

Dozens of Prizes Offered by C. of C.

The autumn season will arrive in Wayne officially next Thursday evening, Sept. 8, when local merchants stage their annual fall opening.

Patterned after last year's highly successful event, the program will open at 7:30 with a gigantic costume and pet parade for kiddies. The parade this year will be augmented with a special section for rural children.

Prizes will be awarded for the youngest entries, the most unique entries, the most outstanding pets, the prettiest costumes, the funniest entries, and dozens of others.

A PARADE ENTRY blank to be filled out and sent to the Chamber of Commerce, is published in a C of C advertisement appearing in section 3 of today's Wayne Herald.

Another feature of the parade will be a pep demonstration by Wayne State Teachers college students, who on the following night (Friday) will dedicate the new Wayne State Memorial stadium at the opening game of the football season.

The parade, too, will feature marching bands and baton twirlers, according to the C. of C.

Early next week local merchants will test their store windows in preparation for the fall opening.

After the parade, windows will be unveiled simultaneously throughout the city for the first big display of what's new in merchandise for the new season.

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Wayne Council Hears Outline Of Local Plan

Fire Chief Paul Rogge Tuesday evening obtained the city council's permission to call a meeting of farmers in this area interested in organizing a rural fire district to be served by the Wayne fire department.

Rogge has set Tuesday, Sept. 6, as the meeting date, and urged all farmers interested in the proposal to attend. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. at the city hall.

E. C. IYERSON, state fire marshal, will be present to explain recent legislation regarding rural fire districts.

If such a district is organized, the farmers probably would purchase a new truck which would be stationed in Wayne and operated by the local fire department.

At least one local plane owner, Fuehrberth, said, wants permission to build his own private hangar at the airport.

No action was taken, pending further study of the situation.

The council granted a building permit to Herb Bergt for the construction of an \$8,500 home in the northwest part of the city.

KNOW YOUR FACULTY**

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State College. In the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



the college has purchased, and still others which the college has rented. The college library is rented for off-campus purposes as well as on-campus, even to other schools.

SIX SCHOOLS are included in a project in this area, under the supervision of Prof. Wait, the purpose of which is to acquaint high school classes with the operation and maintenance of a film library. Under the testing program Mr. Wait must go to the specified schools every day until they have efficiently set up the proper methods.

Prof. Wait received his BS degree from Nebraska Wesleyan university in 1931 and his AM from the University of Nebraska in 1941, both at Lincoln. He is a graduate student of Nebraska U. and Indiana U. with an ultimate Ed.D. degree, doctor of education, in mind.

HE HAS DONE practically all his teaching in northeast Nebraska. He taught five years at Crofton as a classroom teacher, four years at Wausau as principal and two years at Snyder as superintendent, before coming to Wayne in 1942.

He was born in St. Edward, but his home was originally in Sidney, where he graduated from high school. Before attending college he was head bookkeeper for the heat, light and water company at Sidney for two years. During summer months between college years, he worked as a classroom teacher, with experience at the yard and at the Western Nebraska Oil Co. Mr. Wait names his hobbies as hunting, fishing and golfing.

"VISUAL EDUCATION is an important prominence in education due to several factors," Mr. Wait said. He named these as "the technological development of equipment, especially the 16 mm. motion picture projector. This is an important step towards revolutionizing teaching methods; it is found as standard equipment in many schools, both large and small."

He said, "Other equipment, such as the radio, is being utilized to better advantage to aid in new education methods. But the field that hasn't been developed to any extent as yet, one which shows almost unlimited possibilities is that of television." Mr. Wait believes that educational processes will be revolutionized with television coming into vogue.
