A Start Toward Economy

Just exactly how difficult it actually is to reduce government expenditures was illustrated last week by the howls of protest which followed Secretary of Defense Johnson's announcement that 135,000 civilians were being dismissed from their jobs with the defense department.

And the protests came from both democrats and republicans in the congress, many of whom are heartly in accord with economy measures only so long as their own particular districts are not affected.

It was gratifying to note, however, that Senator Wherry—one of the strongest advocates of economy in government—was not one of those who protested the move. Neither did he immediately approve the order, stating that he would reserve judgment until he could determine if the reductions in civilian personnel were fairly distributed throughout the country. But he noted that his preliminary scrutiny indicated that it was.

And there you have it. Here is a measure that is expected to cut government costs by one million dollars daily—yet some of the congressmen who have been so loud in their demands for economy suddenly perform an about face. Common sense would indicate that if the defense department does not need these employees it certainly is time to remove them from the payrell.

Unfortunate though it may be, economy

Unfortunate though it may be, economy in government cannot be achieved unless unnecessary employees (and there are thousands) are weeded out. We heartily approve Secretary Johnson's action—may other government bureaus and agencies follow suit.




