

Explain Grain Storage Construction Loans

Provides Funds For New Cribs

Short on corn storage? Short on cash?

The Wayne county agricultural conservation committee believes that government storage construction loans are the answer to these questions which face many farmers in corn growing areas.

The Wayne county committee points out that although this Commodity Credit Corp. construction loan program was announced only a few weeks back, already a number of county farmers have made application for loans.

"IT'S NEVER BEEN easier to get the storage we need," the committee said. "Building materials generally are plentiful and there are numerous pre-fabricated bins on the market. The only other obstacle seems to be money. The CCC loan program takes care of the problems of those who need financial help."

The committee explains that under the program, corn growers are able to borrow up to 45 cents per bushel of capacity but not to exceed 85 percent of the finished construction cost. The program applies to new storage on farms where storage is needed and for structures that meet CCC specifications. The loans bear interest at 4 percent and are payable in three or five equal yearly installments.

LOAN APPLICATIONS are filed with the county ACA committee, but loans may be completed through local banks and other lending agencies approved by CCC.

"There is general agreement among farmers," the committee says, "that the goal for Wayne county should be enough good storage to care for all the corn produced in one year's crop."

"That means keeping a lot of corn on hand at all times, but a big reserve in the insurance we have against a short crop. Besides, with plenty of good storage, we can always take advantage of the government price support program and will never have to take less than the support price for our corn."

IN THE COMMITTEE'S opinion, with the huge supply of corn that will be on hand after harvest this fall and with the probable shortage of storage space, cash prices are likely to drop below the price support level. If this happens, the difference between the market price and the support price could easily be enough to pay for the storage needed to get the corn under price-support loan.

The committee also emphasizes that growers with 1948-crop corn under loan or purchase agreement should give serious consideration to "reserving" their corn for an extended loan period. They point out that estimates for corn on local prices indicate that the 10 cent per bushel storage payment will cover about one-third of the cost of building new storage for an equal amount of the new crop.

GROWERS WITH 1948-crop corn under price support have until Oct. 31 to take advantage of the reserving program. The extended loans will mature July 31, 1950.

Plans for storage structures and details of the loan program are available at the AAA office.

FHA Continues Vet Preference

Continuation of veterans' preference in Farmers Home Administration loans during the 1949-50 fiscal year has been announced by Ernest Frisch, state FHA director in Lincoln.

He said this policy was written into the farm tenant loan act by congress and is being constantly emphasized by the FHA administrator, Dillard B. Lassetter, Washington, D. C.

AN EQUAL responsibility of the Farmers Home Administration, Frisch said, is to see that the public funds represented in FHA loans and supervisory assistance actually bring about better farming, better use of the soil and natural resources, and better farm and home planning. He mentioned the agency's American agriculture and said that with most of the new loans going to them, the veterans may have a prominent part in carrying on that kind of American farm economy.

Close cooperation was pointed out between FHA and other agencies, including soil conservation service, extension service, production and marketing administration, veterans administration and others whose services are available to FHA borrowers.

THE STATE DIRECTOR said money loaned this year will be aimed at making such farm operation adjustments as the application of basic soil treatment, establishing permanent pastures, fencing, obtaining or improving foundation livestock, using improved varieties of seed, adequate fertilization of crops, better use of water facilities, effective pest controls and other better farming measures.

Calling attention to the "on-the-farm" training program of the veterans administration which many FHA borrowers are now using, he said county FHA supervisors may help families with long-time farm planning so that their farm enterprises can ultimately pay their own way.

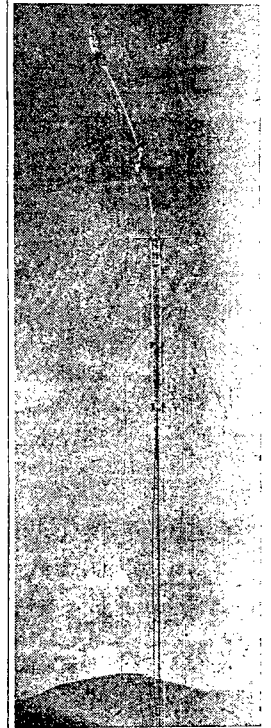

Also from that dizzying point, he will do one-handed hand-stands having little less than a knob-like arrangement to hold onto as the pole sways.

Then, swinging to the side of the spindly pole at its upper part, he will present difficult push-outs while the pole again sways through space. These offerings obviously are fraught with danger. The slightest slip would spell disaster. So, too, would the sudden development of any weakness in the pole itself.

Not a few lives have been lost in swaying pole acts because of faulty poles. But the Hustreis are confident their pole is flawless. What's more, to their knowledge, it is the highest yet perfected.

In addition to the stunts from the top of the pole, the Hustreis also offer a skillful, danger-laden arrangement of offerings from a ring mounted slightly below the top of the pole. From this rigging, which consists of hanging trapezes and rings, the Hustreis give a brilliant performance, all without any protective net between them and the hard ground more than 100 feet below.
