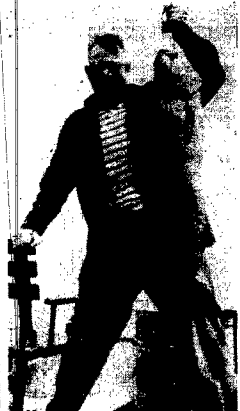

### Kiwanians Recipient of 'Schwarzenwalduhr' Gift

"Ich habe heute die Ihnen mit meinem letzten Schreiben avisierter Schwarzenwalduhr zum Versand gebracht." This was the opening of the letter received by M. B. Childs, secretary of the Kiwanis club, from Lothar Julier of Karlsruhe, Germany.

Translated, the sentence means, "Today I delivered for mailing the Black Forest watch of which I advised you in my last writing." Recipient of the letter and clock are the Kiwanis club of Wayne, who have been sending CARE packages to the Julier family for some time. In appreciation for these packages, Herr Julier presented by mail, a cuckoo clock to the club.

SINCE RECEIVING the clock three weeks ago, Kiwanians hung it on the wall of the Hotel Morrison where Monday meetings are held. Last Monday during their regular meeting, Dr. Sandriggers, head of the state hospital at Norfolk, was guest speaker.

He was well launched into his speech when the small bird in the new clock announced the hour of the day with a definite, insinuating "cuckoo," much to the amusement

of the congregated Kiwanians, and a little to the chagrin of Dr. Sandriggers, who eyed the bird a trifle belligerently.

In sending the clock as a gift of appreciation to the Americans, Mr. Julier gave a little history of himself and the people living in their small town of Karlsruhe, Germany.

HE EXPLAINED that since their community was located near the Black Forest, they were right in the heart of the watch and clock making industry. This was the fact that prompted him to send a gift that was appropriate of the area.

Included in his letter were several remarks about present conditions in Germany. Goods are fairly plentiful in the shops and stores of most cities and towns, but the prices of the articles are far above the buying capacity of the average German. This causes the same condition that would exist if they weren't to be had in the first place.

IN THE OPINION of Mr. Julier, if the German people were dealing directly with the Americans, reconstruction would be much further advanced than now. This is due to the unnecessary "doctoring

that takes place between the planning and the doing of reconstruction in the American zone of Germany.

The letter, sent to M. B. Childs, Secretary, was mailed "Luftpost," and took five days to arrive from point of mailing to Wayne.

At a meeting of the Kiwanis board of directors Monday evening, it was voted to auction the clock to the highest member bidder at next Monday's regular luncheon. (In a "generous" mood, the board decided to invite Auctioneer Tom Hughes for a free lunch Monday—after which he will be asked to conduct the auction.)

Proceeds of the sale will go to the club's fund for underprivileged children, after repaying Secretary M. B. Childs \$3.50 which he advanced for import duty on the clock.

Two new books for children just came this week. Oliver Hazard Perry, Boy of the Sea is one of the popular biographies which all the young folks like and this one will be no exception. The other book is Dicky and the Indians and we always know that a good Indian story will be welcomed by our young readers.

**ARE YOU A PARENT? OR A SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHER?** If you are we have two new books which will help you. The Child's Approach to Religion by Fox, and The Faith of Our Children by Jones.

**NOT ALL THE NEW BOOKS ARE FOR THE CHILDREN** for we also have Without Magnolias by Bucklin Moon. This book was the winner of the George Washington Carver Award for outstanding writing by or about American Negroes. The scene is Florida, any small town. The central Characters are a Negro family moving from lower-class to middle-class existence, cast against the shifting background of colored town on the wrong side of the tracks and the campus of the nearby college for Negroes. The story is dramatic, humorous, and, at times, tragic—and is told with real warmth and understanding, rather than acid bitterness as are so many books about the negroes.

**ONE NEW WESTERN**, one new mystery and three stories for the young people's shelf complete the count of new books at the library this week.

**YOUR LIBRARIAN** was gone for three days this week on a visitation to Laramie and Cheyenne, Wyo. After inspecting the library buildings there she wishes that we had oil in Nebraska instead of turpentine. Oil brings in such lovely taxes, which in turn build such lovely buildings.

**Rights Must Be Earned**

Albert S. Goss, Master of The National Grange, has written a telling editorial on the important subject of "Human Rights Versus Human Responsibility." He points out that the General Assembly of the United Nations has officially stressed rights which are theoretically owed the individual by the state, such as the right to rest and leisure, protection against unemployment, housing and medical care and other forms of social security.

Then Mr. Goss writes: "We believe the United Nations is tackling the whole question of human rights wrong end first . . . What the world really needs is a Declaration of Human Responsibility! People need to learn that they cannot expect something for nothing. Furthermore, self-government fails when a majority fails to realize that they must contribute as much as they take out. For example, the impossible economic situation in France today is the result of the people demanding more of the government than they give."

**No. 28 in a Series— KNOW YOUR FACULTY**

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers College, in the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Prof. George Costerisan holds the distinction of being the only male member of the Wayne State Teachers college staff who belongs to the honorary fraternity Phi Beta Kappa. Besides this honor, Prof. Costerisan belongs to two other prominent fraternities. He teaches education and geography in the college and throughout the school year conducts study centers.

Prof. Costerisan, who has been here since 1928, took a two-year course at LaCrosse Normal college in Wisconsin. He received his AB and AM from the University of Wisconsin and did advanced work at Wisconsin and Nebraska universities.

Mr. Costerisan was born in

Richland Center, Wis., where he graduated from high school and normal school. He began his teaching career in the rural schools and from there advanced to administrative duties. He taught at the university while doing advanced work. His subjects were science and mathematics in the high schools and then he was principal of Milton Union high school in Milton Junction, Wis., just before coming to Wayne.

Mr. Costerisan attributes part of his philosophy to the poem "Bridge Builder," by Dromogoolie. "The chief end of life is service to others as expressed by my favorite poem, 'Bridge Builder,'" he said. He believes that people should try to help others to live better and more happily.

"My main satisfaction that comes from teaching is seeing youth develop and find themselves," he said.

Mr. Costerisan has had several articles published in the Journal of the local educational association.

Mr. and Mrs. Costerisan have a daughter, Margaret. Mr. Costerisan's hobbies are gardening and different forms of church work. He likes working with young people in the Sunday school. He also has worked in the YMCA and as supervisor of the Sunday school of the Methodist church. Mr. Costerisan said, "The hobby I would like to pursue further is traveling." He expressed a profound desire to go to the distant places on the earth.

Mr. Costerisan stated that although he enjoys Nebraska, he still likes to get back to the lakes and hills of his native state, Wisconsin.



July-Sept. 1937, Rock Bluff was founded Jan. 6, 1856. The town soon developed into an important outfitting point for freight wagons crossing the plains, and the Rock Bluff landing was visited regularly by Missouri River steamers. A pioneer college, Naomi institute, flourished for a number of years under the direction of Prof. Joseph Patterson.

Perhaps the most notable incident in the town's history is furnished by the ballot box that went to dinner. In the election of 1866, Nebraska's voters were deciding whether the territory should become a state, and if statehood was achieved, whether the first officers would be republican or democratic. David Butler headed the ticket of the former and J. Sterling Morton the latter.

**THE POLITICAL** parties were quite evenly divided in the territory and the election was close. In Rock Bluff precinct, 107 votes were cast for the democrats against only 47 for the republicans, enough to put Cass county in the democratic column. The county canvassers decided, however, that because the ballot box had been taken to the home of one of the election officials over the noon hour the votes

of Rock Bluff precinct would have to be thrown out.

By virtue of this action Cass county went republican, and its representatives furnished the edge in the legislature that enabled the republicans to elect Nebraska's first two United States senators, John W. Thayer and Thomas W. Tipton.

Because of this celebrated case, Rock Bluff achieved a permanent place in Nebraska's political history. When the railroad came through Omaha, however, Rock Bluff like many another river town went into a serious decline, until today it reposes among the rather numerous ghost towns of Cass and other eastern Nebraska counties.
