When Incentive Is Small

It seems to be axiomatic that the greater degree of socialization or government domination of public health measures, the fewer practitioners there are to do the work.

Thus, according to Time, Russia has but one dentist for 14,000 people—and Russia markes the ultimate in socialization of all phases of medicine. Britain, which has gone a long way toward complete socialization, has one dentist for each 3,271 people. The United States, with its tradition of free medicine, has one for each 1,885 of the ine, has one for each 1,885 of the

medicine, has one for each 1,885 of the population. Various reasons account for this condition. One very obvious one is that, in a country where is bureaucricy runs the show, there is little incentive for men and women to go through the arduous schooling necessary to become a doctor or a dentist. The financial rewards, even for the most brilliant and hard-working, are severely limited by the state. Opportunity for research is small and medical men must deal with masses of forms and other red tape which demands hours that should be given to their patients. And, inevitably, advancement goes not to the most competent, but to those who are best able to curry favor with the political administrators, or who gain seniority through the mere fact of age.

of age,
America's standards of health, far superior as they are to those of Russia or England, provide the most persuasive argument for the retention of medical freedom.
And yet there is now a well olled federal program to put American medicine on the skids toward the Russian and European pattern.

#### Attention, Sidewalk Quarterbacks!

#### Why Dodge the Issue?

There has been endless debate over the problem of labor legislation, from all points of view. But one of the biggest difficulties is rarely manifoned. It is simply this: So long as labor menspolies are permitted to exist, the public, and the working man himself, will always be subject to exploitation. At the whith of one man or one group of men, it will be possible to stop the production of commodities which are necessary to the public health and comfort and the national security. That, indeed, has happened many times in the past—notably in the coal industry, where industry-wide bargaining has made possible industry-wide strikes and shutdowns and stoppages.

The way to prevent labor monopolies is the way we have prevented financial and industrial monepolies—bring the ishor unions within the scope of the anti-trust laws. Interpretations of the law, by the courts, have in effect upheld this special privilege granted to one group of our citizens.

The anti-trust laws were passed for an obvious reason—to protect the public against monopolistic combinations. In more recent, years, the unions have sought and

nave obtained a clear monopoly in their field. The rest of us are at their mercy. Neither labor nor management should be penalized or favored. This nation cannot be rmit monopoly of any kind. The unions nest be made subject to the same laws which govern industry.


Nebraska law requires that retailers refuse to sell beer to anyone under 21.
