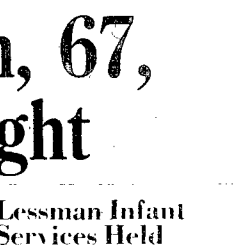

Rochester, N. Y.—How to Increase Church Membership and Attendance is the concern of Dr. Weldon Crossland, former Rhodes scholar (Oxford) and now pastor of the Asbury-First Methodist church in Rochester, N. Y. in his new book published Monday, Sept. 12, by the Abingdon-Cokesbury Press of Nashville and New York.

He is a brother of County Judge William A. Crossland. He served for a time as assistant pastor of the Nardin Park Methodist church in Detroit, then moved to the pastorate at Central Methodist church, Pontiac, Mich. Crossland has written other books pertaining to church work.

IN HIS LATEST book, Dr. Crossland presents a series of steps by which pastors can build up their church membership and attendance, including: (1) "Go straight to the people with your evangelistic program." (2) "Preach for a verdict." (3) "Invite counsel" after each service." (4) "Challenge young people to Christian commitments." (5) "Plan improved church services." (6) "Evaluate the real reasons for absenteeism." (7) "Appoint a public relations committee; distribute attractive bulletins; make the outdoor bulletin board speak." Dr. Crossland is also one of 17 prominent religious leaders in

America who have contributed to "The Ministry," an analysis of the minister and his work to be published Oct. 17 by the Abingdon-Cokesbury Press. In his chapter, Dr. Crossland discusses the work of the minister "As Leader of People and Program."

Lincoln—Nebraska World War 2 veterans were cautioned today to exercise care in filling out applications for GI insurance dividends.

Ashley Westmoreland, Lincoln regional office manager, said negligence may cause wasteful delays in payments of the \$2,800,000,000 fund.

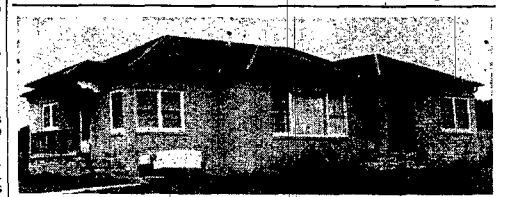
THE APPLICATION forms, which are available at all VA offices, post offices, Red Cross chapters and county and veterans service offices are very simple to complete, he said, but the small amount of specific information required must be legibly and accurately presented.

The VA official explained that the form contains only nine blanks to be completed. All the veteran has to do is follow a few plainly stated instructions. The form asks the veteran to give his full name, mailing address, home county, date of birth, branch of service, service serial number, insurance policy number and claim number.

THESE NUMBERS are not necessary in order to receive the dividend, but will help the VA identify the applicant. If the veteran does not know the numbers, he is urged not to write the VA for them because this will only slow down the agency's huge clerical task.

Rudd B. Bornhoff, Wayne county service officer, is assisting veterans dividend applications. Bornhoff's office is located over Larson's clothing store.

Women are Gaining New studies on number women by 477 to 586. This indicates that the women are gaining on the men because there were 115 more men than women in 1948 while the 1949 margin is only 61.

The decline in the freshman class is due to fewer veterans starting college this fall. Wayne's veteran enrollment dropped from its all-time high of 212 in 1948 to 155 in 1949.
