

It Finally Happens

Simple words. So, we pass it on to Herail readers.

Great Britain gave the commercial and financial work something of a surprise and shock Monday morning with its announcement that it was cutting down the value of its money—from a pound base of \$4.08 (United States) to \$2.80.

That action was not unexpected, but when it came it came with something of a shock in it. That is a new low for Britain's money value.

Nine other countries made similar announcements at the same time: Australia, South Africa, India, New Zealand, Ireland, Israel, Norway, Denmark, Egypt. Later announcements came from Sweden, the Netherlands and France. And some eight or, more other countries. Canada was one of them, but its devaluation was only 10 percent.

what will be the effects?

They will be varied. But most important, this cutting down of the face value of the money of these eleven countries will reduce their buying power. Britain, for example, will not be able to buy as much in foods and goods from the United States, which is holding the value of its dollars where they have been.

Prices in these eleven countries will be high for the foods and manufactured products of the United States, Canada and Latin America.

ucts of the United States, Canada and Latin America.

In these eleven countries the people must depend more fully upon their own ability to produce the things they need for both living and production. Their sales in the world outside should be greater, for their prices will be lower, especially in the United States, Canada and Latin America. Their production at home should be increased and that would be good for them. At least temporarily, living standards in the eleven countries will be somewhat lower. But it is hoped that the drop will be only temporary.

The British government says that "in the long run the effect of the cut in money values should be a healthy impetus to world-wide multi-lateral trade." (That is, trade in many directions).

In the United States producers will face the competition of lower priced foreign goods offered here. At the same time, American goods exported to foreign lands must meet the competition of lower prices for inferior goods.

Perhaps we of the United States will have to wait to find out what will happen.

Perhaps we of the United States will have to wait to find out what will happen. But there may be this consolation: that it is widely believed that the action will 'in the long run!' be good for all nations concerned.

Just what "in the long run" means will
depend pretty largely on the attitude of
