

100 Attend School Re-Districting Meeting

Construction Starts in County on Bins Capable of Storing Half Million Bushels

Wayne, Sholes, Wakefield Are Sites of Bins

A total of 62 new bins capable of holding 506,000 bushels of corn are scheduled to be erected in Wayne county within the next month, according to Tom Roberts, chairman of the Wayne county AAA.

Work has already been started in the state on the erection sites. Four contractors, whose names are not known by the local office, will erect the bins and have them completed by Oct. 20.

Wayne, Wakefield and Sholes are the three places where bins are to be placed for this county. The four wood bin, one-half mile south of Wayne on Hwy 15, is the location for Wayne bins. In Wakefield they will be located across the road from the county road maintenance sheds, and in Sholes they are to be placed along the railroad right-of-way west of the elevator.

Six of the steel bins have a capacity of 40,000 bushels, 20 steel bins a capacity of 64,000 bushels, 30 wooden bins a capacity of 130,000, two steel bins a capacity of 70,000, four wooden bins a capacity of 28,000, with an overall total of 506,000 bushels.

One of the four contractors, who is from California, states that work in Wayne county is beginning this week. His crew can erect five 4,000 bushel capacity bins a day.

Wayne county AAA has purchased four new 40-foot elevators to handle the corn as it comes in for sealing.

Complete Two Dams at Hoskins

The soil conservation service office in Wayne reports completion of two dams, both on farms near Hoskins.

Fred Green has finished a 4600-yard dam to be used to store stock water on his farm one-half mile northwest of Hoskins. The dam has a capacity of 6 acre feet of water and if ever completely filled the lake would be 21 feet deep.

Ernest Strate, of Hoskins has a new 3000-yard dam for the same purpose that will hold capacity of between 2 and 3 acre feet of water. Mr. Strate will install a stock water tank below his dam.

The soil conservation service acts as engineers for dam construction, staking out the dam and handling technical details.

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Select 10 for All-County Committeemen

One hundred rural and town school board members met Friday at the Wayne county court house and selected a 10-member county committee to study school problems with the view to making recommendations if re-districting of schools is deemed necessary.

Members of the county committee are: Otto Ulrich (district 16), Art Mann (district 69), Mrs. George Owens (district 44), P. E. McGuire (district 7), for rural town members; Roley Isom (district 26), Edwin Straker (district 9), Otto Wagner (district 52) and Fred Witter (district 89) for town board.

Two other committee members are Robert Waller (district 66), a non-school-board member, and Marie Wright, county superintendent.

The county committee will consider recommendations made after a survey by a state committee. The county group then makes its recommendations at the districts involved, and those districts then vote on the proposal.

Says "Law Good One" Dr. O. B. Proett, director of administration of the State Department of Public Instruction, presided at the meeting and told those attending that re-districting would take a lot of planning but, "I think you will find the (re-districting) law is a good one."

Wayne county is the fourth in Nebraska to organize under the 1949 law, other counties being Jefferson, Stanton and Pierce. The county has 85 rural districts and the five town districts of Winside, Hoskins, Wayne, Sholes and Carroll.

Annual Beef Calf Sale Here Thurs., Oct. 13

Wayne's annual 4-H and FFA beef-calf sale will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 13, at the sale barn here. Bidding is open only to FFA and 4-H boys from Wayne county. Tom Hughes will conduct the auction.

Leif Warner, county extension agent, left Monday for the Sandhills to purchase more calves. In the 4-H and FFA group of calves there are 25 Angus calves from the Charles Kryjlik herd at Wood Lake and 25 top Hereford calves from other western Nebraska herds.

The calves in this sale will be eligible for the special feeding class contest at the county fair next fall. Winner will receive the trophy shown at the fair this year. This contest should not be confused with the county fair open class fat steer competition which all Nebraska livestock feeders may enter.

Selling also Thursday evening will be 12 Angus yearlings, 12 Angus calves and several Hereford calves. These calves were acquired in cases where it was necessary to buy several calves or a calf crop in order to purchase the calves wanted.

The sale is sponsored by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce and the county extension service. The agriculture committee of the chamber reports that at the county fair there were three blue ribbon winners from last year's beef sale, four blue ribbon and two red ribbon calves in the 4-H dairy class purchased at the fair.

The Wayne Chamber of Commerce is now considering a plan to work with the Dixon county extension service in an FFA and 4-H baby beef sale for Dixon county boys and girls.

Increase in Enrollment Is 10 Percent

Wayne State's 1949 enrollment has reached 833, or 74 more than the 759 students during the 1948 first semester. This is approximately a 10 per cent increase and was predicted last summer by college officials.

Most of the increase is accounted for in the sophomore class which rose from 189 in 1948 to 253 this year. The seniors also made a big jump from 87 to 127. Slight decreases were recorded by the freshman and junior classes.

Women are Gaining Men students outnumber women by 447 to 386. This indicates that the women are gaining on the men because there were 115 more men than women in 1948 while the 1949 margin is only 61.

The decline in the freshman class is due to fewer veterans starting college this fall. Wayne's veteran enrollment dropped from its all-time high of 212 in 1948 to 155 in 1949.

Wayne's enrollment is actually at its highest level in the history of the college, despite the record 945 registered in 1940. Many of these students were taking rural school teaching courses when much higher certification laws forbade them to remain in college a full year. This summer Wayne trained more than 250 of these rural teachers when the college had an all-time high summer enrollment of 871. Registration for the current academic year will be above 900.

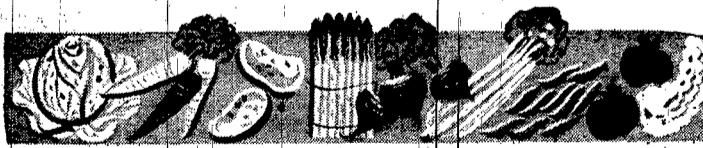

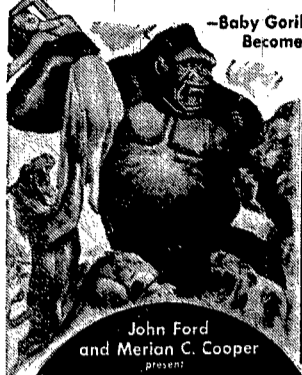

Study Centers Scheduled by Wayne State

Wayne State college announced plans in maintaining a special study center classes in 10 northeastern Nebraska cities. Teachers of the region may earn two or three semester hours of college resident credit in these classes while teaching in the communities.

Dr. Howard Tompco, dean of the college and director of the extension program, said, "The study centers are popular throughout our area and we expect more than 500 northeastern Nebraska teachers to take courses. Many rural teachers find the classes particularly valuable."

Seven Sessions.
The college requires that a minimum of 15 persons enroll in each class which meets either for seven six hour sessions on consecutive Saturdays or for ten four hour sessions in the evening once each week. Meetings will be scheduled so that the course may be completed before inclement weather makes travel too difficult.

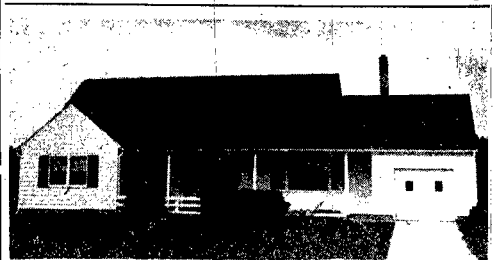

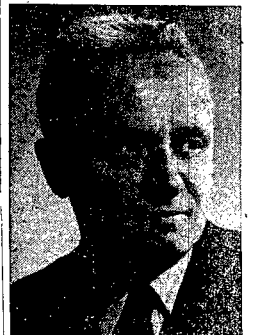

It Finally Happens
Editor's Note: The following editorial by F. W. Beckman in his Knoxville, Ia., Journal explains to us in our language just what Britain's devaluation of their money means to us.

Great Britain gave the commercial and financial work something of a surprise and shock Monday morning with its announcement that it was cutting down the value of its money—from a pound base of \$4.08 (United States) to \$2.80.

That action was not unexpected, but when it came it came with something of a shock in it. That is a new low for Britain's money value.

Nine other countries made similar announcements at the same time: Australia, South Africa, India, New Zealand, Ireland, Israel, Norway, Denmark, Egypt. Later announcements came from Sweden, the Netherlands and France.

Prices in these eleven countries will be high for the foods and manufactured products of the United States, Canada and Latin America.

In these eleven countries the people must depend more fully upon their own ability to produce the things they need for both living and production.

The British government says that "in the long run the effect of the cut in money values should be a healthy impetus to world-wide multi-lateral trade."

In the United States producers will face the competition of lower priced foreign goods offered here. At the same time, American goods exported to foreign lands must meet the competition of lower prices there—perhaps often lower prices for inferior goods.

Perhaps we of the United States will have to wait to find out what will happen. But there may be this consolation: that it is widely believed that the action will "in the long run" be good for all nations concerned.

Just what "in the long run" means will depend pretty largely on the attitude of both workers and employers at home.

The Nebraska College conference leaders have been pointing all season to the game with the capital city crew because of the upset Wesleyan blasted on Wayne in 1948 for their lone defeat.

So Far So Good

Wayne's opening three games have been Wildcat romps and good drills for their first test of the 1949 campaign. They scored five times against Westmar college of Leola, Ia., three times against Hastings college, and six times against Midland college, without revealing any of their fancier plays. So far the Wildcats have no casualty list because of injuries.

Wesleyan won't be able to rush any particular Wayne passer because the first eight backfield men have all checked effectively for Wayne and Coach Jack Wink has a versatile squad of receivers.

750 Yards Rushing

In rushing plays Wayne has already notched more than 750 yards to double their achievement by the airplanes.
