Shut 'er Off . . . Please!

Already the daily press is carrying the stories . . . in almost every edition.

Their editorial and news rooms will settle down to a routine cry now, for about six weeks or so, and before every edition goes to press the hard-boiled make-up editor will yell, "How many more FINGER stories are comin'?"

What are they talking about?

Corn picker accidents. And several hundred Nebraska farmers will lose one or more fingers . . . or hands . . . or mangle an arm . . . in just such accidents in the next few weeks.

So what at The Herald want to issue this warning to our northeast Nebraska farmer readers: "DON'T TAKE CHANCES . . . SHUT OFF THE POWER before you reach into those rollers!" You probably wouldn't save as much as an hour's time for the entire husking season by neglecting to shut off the power first, anyway.

Sure—the story about the fellow who gets "shucked clean" of his clothes by a corn picker is always funny afterward. But we don't want to even have that kind of a story to publish around here, because for everyone who "just loses his clothes" in such an accident there are dozens who get injuries so serious that they become life-time handicaps.

SO PLEASE, FRIENDS—BE CAREFUL! We want to put your name in the paper . . . but not because you have lost a hand in a picker accident.

Healthy Sign

The meat eating habits of the American people were recently surveyed by a bureau of the U. S. Agricultural Research Administration. The surveys were conducted in 68 American cities in every part of the country, and were confined to housekeeping families of two or more persons.

Total meat consumption for the average family came to 8.124 pounds a week. Some of the families, of course, ate less, while others ate more.

Greatest consumption was in the case of beef—the average was slightly more than 3.2 pounds a week. Pork was next on the list of favorites with about 2.9 pounds.

Coming down to specific cuts of meat, pot roasts and other roasts appeared to lead in popularity. Ground beef also won wide acceptance. The greatest favorites in pork were ham, bacon and chops.

This is a country of avid meat eaters. The average family builds at least one meal a day, and often more, around meat. That is a situation in which taste and sound dietary habits coincide.

Current forecasts point to an increase in meat production and the meat supply. That is literally a healthy sign.

Settlers along the Platte and Elkhorn were greatly disturbed by a Pawnee uprising in the summer of 1859. The "Pawnee War" it is sometimes called.

Gen. J. W. Denver, sent out from Washington, had negotiated a treaty with the Pawnees just north of Nebraska City in 1857—a highway marker on U. S. 75 indicates the spot—whereby the Indians had ceded all claims to their lands in eastern Nebraska. Despite this, the tribesmen continued to be troublesome to settlers on the frontier, stealing livestock and plundering cabins.

Matters came to a head on July 2, 1859, when the Pawnees destroyed two post offices on the Elkhorn and drove off more than 100 cattle belonging to the settlers. In fear of their lives the settlers sent their families to the older towns for protection and petitioned the territorial government for aid.

In response to this petition, the territorial militia under Gen. John M. Thayer (later U. S. senator and governor) was ordered into the field. When Thayer arrived in Fort Union he found most of the settlers from the Elkhorn valley, and from among them raised a force of 194 men, including those whom he had brought from Omaha, the territorial capital.

Armed with rifles, provisions and the one piece of artillery owned by the territory, this force set out in hot pursuit of the red-skinned marauders. The fourth day out they were joined by a company of dragoons sent out from Nebraska City, and accompanied by Gen. Samuel W. Black who had been down there to deliver a Fourth of July oration.

When the expedition finally came upon its prey, it found the Indians unwilling to fight. As one of the men described it, the Pawnees "run and threw away everything they had, some took to the river and others up the same, the women to howling . . . and they were willing to do or say anything."

Indeed, the only casualty was a horse belonging to one of the Indians, accidentally shot.

The chiefs signed a treaty of peace, agreeing to pay for all damages and giving up six prisoners. On the return to Omaha these tried to escape and were shot.

Shortly after this difficulty the Pawnees were put on a reservation in Nance County and reportedly committed no further depredations.

KNOW YOUR FACULTY

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers College, in the hope that laypeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Every Wayne State Teachers college student taking advantage of the liberal arts degree will come in contact with Mrs. Faith Brown at some time because of the two-year language requirement within the degree. Mrs. Brown is a new member of the faculty this year, coming from Emporia college in Kansas. She teaches French and German, both beginning and advanced courses.

Chicago and her MA degree from Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill. She has done graduate work at Northwestern, at the University of Chicago and at Laval in Quebec, Canada. At the present time she is "tolling" over her dissertation, after which she will receive a Ph.D. in German.

Mrs. Brown has always taught languages, as instructor at Wright Junior College, at the College of Emporia and at Arizona State. She was born in a town not so far from Wayne, Dubuque, Ia., but lived in Chicago for many years. Mr. Brown teaches in Jackson, Tenn. Mrs. Brown's mother lives with her in Wayne at the new home which Mrs. Brown purchased recently.

The linguist tries to put into practice what she teaches. She believes that it is especially important to take her chosen subject from all aspects. Many records are played for her classes so as to help the students acquire the right pronunciation along with the grammar taught daily. The molding of the course requires a two-fold examination: by learning to pronounce the words, and to speak the words.

"Because of the extremely large classes that I have, much oral work is impossible," said Mrs. Brown. "She placed a definite importance on oral work and stated that she was sorry for this aspect. In her second-year French class-

ses many of the French short stories are used for class work. The excerpts from large pieces afford the students with an excellent background for the work. Mrs. Brown's outstanding hobby is music; she plays the violin. She smiles but proudly admitted that she had played in the Phoenix and Evanston symphonies. She has a large record collection and also maintains a "terrier-plus" dog.
