Wildcats to Seek Win Over Kearney

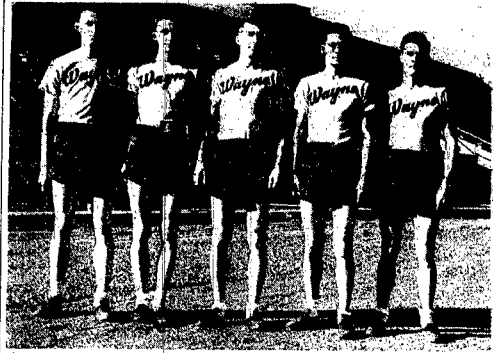

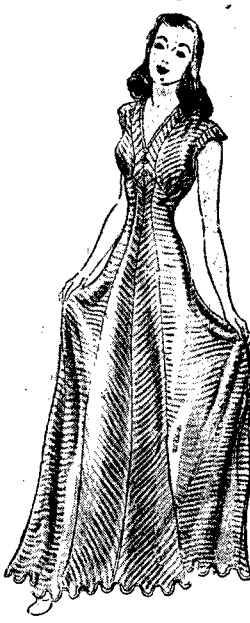

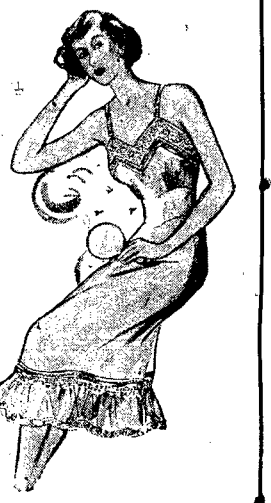
