The Right to Work

There cannot be wrung from a constitu-tional right of workers to assemble to dis-cuss improvement of their own working standards, a further constitutional right to tional right of workers to assemble to discuss improvement of their own working standards, a further constitutional right to drive from remunerative employment all other persons who will not or cannot, participate in union assemblies. The constitutional right of workers to assemble to discuss and formulate blans for furthering their own self interest in jobs cannot be constituted as a constitutional guarantee that none shall get and hold jobs except those who will join in the assembly or will agree to abide by the assembly's plans."

That opinion was not written by some reactionary employer, with an anti-union bias. It was written by Justice Hugo Black of the United States Supreme Court, and it was unanimously approved by his colleagues in a case involving the right of states to prohibit the closed shop. The union had argued that the constitutional guarantees of free speech and assembly covered the closed shop. The court of last resort emphatically disagreed.

Mr. Justice Black wrote, in formal language, a principle which needs restating. It is simply that the states have the power to protect the right of a man to work without joining a union. The closed shop is a denial of that right. It makes it impossible for a man to work at his trade and support himself and his family unless he first joins a union and pays it tribute. How can that situation be reconciled with our concepts of individual freedom?

Several states have now outlawed the closed shop and other are considering it Justice Black's opinion—which has been buttressed by the opinions of other Justices—unequivocally guarantees that they have the right to do so.
