To Pay Farmers for Corn Over-storage

Come From 15 States For Herman Sale

Top Bulls Go At \$4,000 Each

Spirited bidding for the best animals at Leland Herman's, polled Hereford sale here Oct. 28, finished in a tie for the safe top two. Two bulls were knocked down to out-of-state buyers at \$4,000 each. A total of \$11,570 was paid by buyers from 10 states for 49 head of Herman's purebreds.

Average of the sale was better than \$150, a new record for Leland.

The sale, held at the Hereford Farm northwest of Wayne, drew an estimated crowd of 600 buyers and spectators from 15 states.

Buyers coming the greatest distance were M. P. Moore, of the Circle M Ranch at Scottsbluff, Miss., and Paul Choate of Hickman, Ky. Choate was the buyer of Hereford Baron the 13th, one of the two top bulls sold at the sale. Price, \$4,000.

John M. Lewis and Sons, of Larned, Kan., were the purchasers of the other \$4,000 bull, Hereford Mischief the 2nd. Both animals were champions at the Nebraska fair, and first in their class at the Sioux Empire fair in South Dakota.

Mrs. J. W. Nienow of St. Charles, Minn., was the buyer of the two top females at \$1,725 and \$1,625 each. The 29 females averaged \$150.

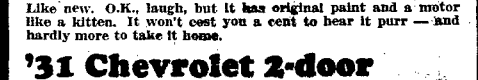

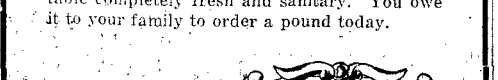
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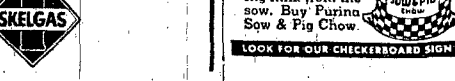
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'Business Must Face Challenge'—Governor

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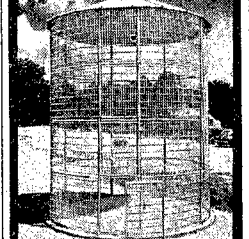

On to Crete!

This week we want to call on every resident of this entire area to get out and show some real enthusiastic support for Wayne State football. First of all—every member of that football squad, and the coaches, have worked hard and made personal sacrifices to win... to carry the colors of their college through victoriously... to put Wayne on the map.

And what a job they have done! Now, this Friday night, November 4, tomorrow night, those boys need your support as never before. They journey to Crete for their final game of the season with Doane college. Wayne must win this one to keep and clinch their first place position in the Nebraska College conference. Doane, like Wayne, has had an undefeated season thus far... so if there ever was a game in the NCC this fall where both teams had the will to win, this is it!

Unification Scrap Continues

The latest chapter in the long controversy between the navy and the air force shows how easy it is to effect unification of the services in theory—and how difficult it is to achieve it in practice. As the Wall Street Journal said, "You do not make two belligerent cats peaceful by putting them together in a barrel." The differences between the views of the forces are fundamental, they affect our whole concept of offensive and defensive war, and they are held with great passion and sincerity on both sides.

The layman, of course, is not equipped to accurately weigh the merits of the arguments over the B-36 super-bomber. Ranking navy admirals said in their testimony that it was a 1941 airplane in all essentials, that it would be easily picked up on radar screens, and that it would be pretty much of a sitting duck for our new jet fighters, and, more important, for the jet fighters that Russia is developing. The air force top brass, in answer, held that the plane is as nearly invulnerable as aircraft can be, that it is our basic offensive weapon, that it needs no fighter escort on long bombing missions, and that its speed, service ceiling and firepower make it able to deal with any jets.

Some British experts published a scientific study some time ago which cast doubt on the operational efficiency of the B-36 under combat conditions, and which also advanced the theory that in these days of swift development of the jet engine the piston engine may be on its way out for military planes.

Be that as it may, the navy, in the view of many, has one very strong talking point—and that is the too-many-eggs-in-one-basket idea. There seems little doubt that the air force heads believe there is no need for navy combat air strength, and that the air force should have it all. This was the reasoning that lay behind the order stopping construction of a 65,000-ton aircraft carrier after a start had been made on laying the keel. That order came as a body blow to naval men, who saw in it a plan to relegate their service to the status of a secondary, subsidiary force. The navy's position, as presented by Admiral Denfield (recently "fired" chief of naval operations), holds that "each service within budgetary limitations be permitted to design and develop its own weapons," and that the "views of a particular service are entitled to predominant weight in the determination of the forces needed by that service to fulfill its missions." This is one of the basic points which underlines the whole controversy.

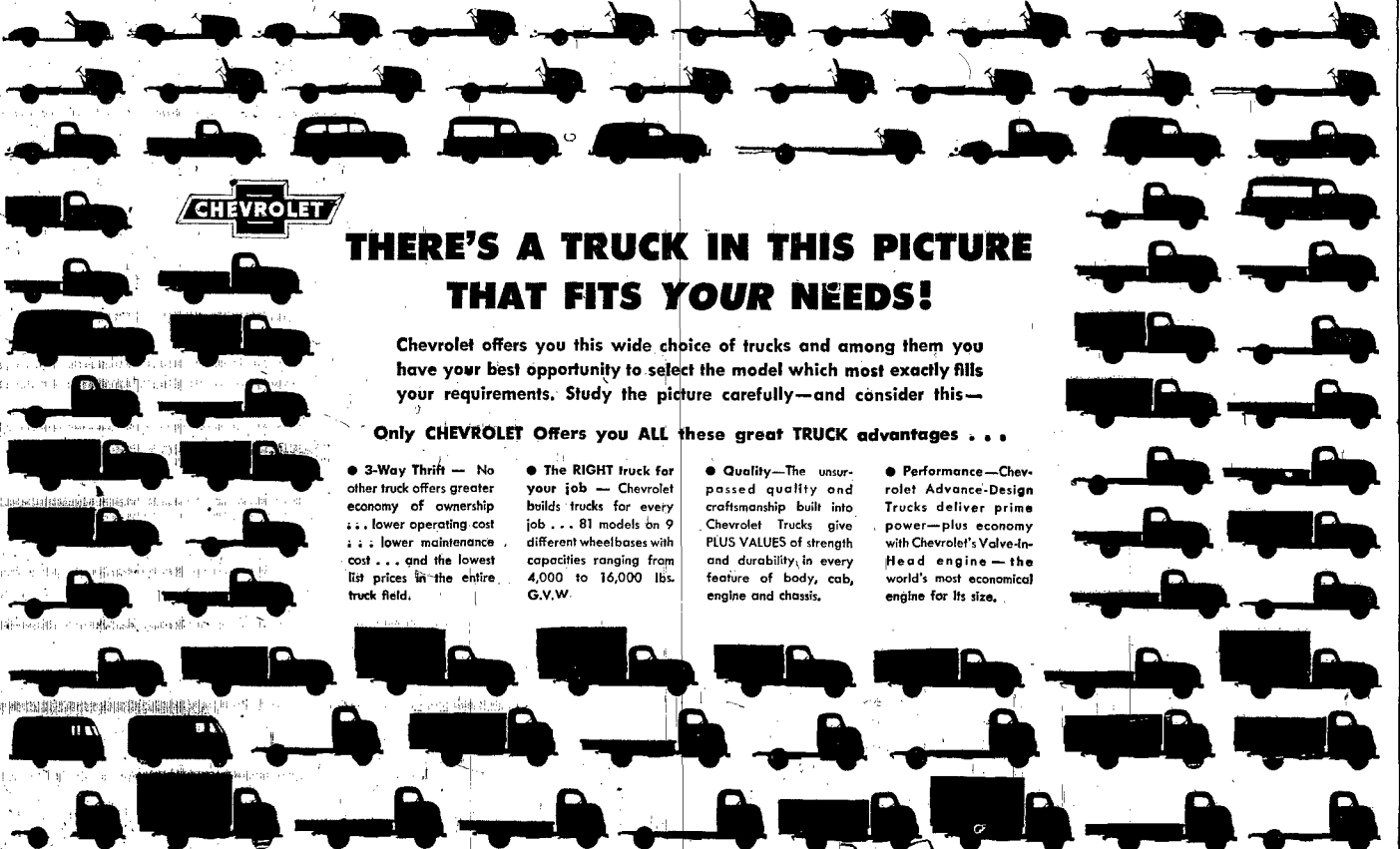

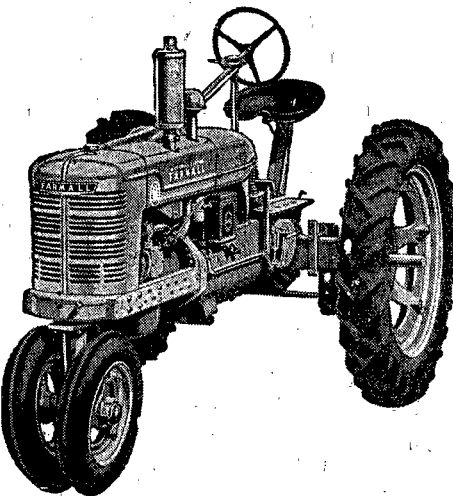

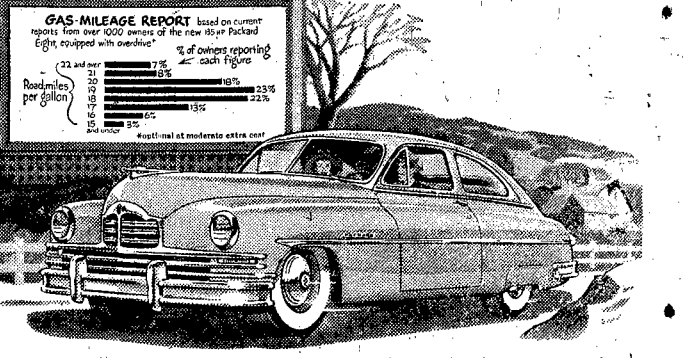
