Pilger Man Dies In Auto Crash At Highways No. 15 and 275

Gilbert T. Bernhardt, 34, produce station operator at Pilger, died last night at the junction of highways 15 and 275 when a car in which he was riding skidded, leaped over a deep ditch and smashed into a large Wayne sign, erected by the Wayne Chamber of Commerce.

Driver of the car was Alvis A. Kleinvein, 37, salesman at a Norfolk, who was taken to a Norfolk hospital in a Wisner ambulance with severe leg, arm and other injuries.

Kleinvein, former Schuyler resident, is reported in satisfactory condition.

The two men are reported to have been on a farm implement demonstration and were returning to Pilger on Highway 15, when Kleinvein's auto failed to make the turn, F. H. Look, of Hooper, was first to arrive at the scene of the accident.

Bernhardt was married and father of a 5-month-old child. He was in a severe auto accident west of Wayne about three years ago.

Corn Borer Control Confusing to Farmers

Here's Do's and Don'ts from the County Agent

"Can we do anything to control the corn borer other than just quit growing corn?" That is the question being asked by farmers today as they find a good share of their corn on the ground, going to waste, all because the borer weakened stalks and made them prey to strong winds. Corn yields are also down this year, due partly to the same infamous pest.

Such was the report of County Agent Don Warner this week as he forwarded methods of control following varied and confusing accounts in farm magazines and newspapers.

Here are some "do's" and "don'ts" concerning the corn borer, as recommended by the extension service.

Nature provides the best control and provides a check for this insect if allowed to operate in a normal manner. If the borer is exposed to the elements during an open winter it will not survive. Therefore we recommend the shredding of stalks in the fall to expose the borer.

By the same logic, plowing stalks is not economical or effective as a control. Plowing merely insulates the borers from the elements of weather and exposes the soil to blowing and erosion.

Burning Ineffective Burning of stalks is also ineffective.

Rev. H. G. Knaub, who has served as pastor of Trinity Lutheran church in Winside since February, 1937, recently tendered his resignation to accept the pastorate of St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran church at Bloomfield.

Rev. Knaub will assume his new position Dec. 1.

During the past year, Rev. Knaub has extended several calls, and on Sept. 27 tendered his resignation to the Trinity church council. Rev. Knaub and family plan to move to Bloomfield Nov. 29.

Rev. Knaub came to Winside in January, 1937, from Home City, Kan., where he served his first charge.

He has been pastor here the past 12 years and nine months. The Trinity church council has not yet secured a pastor to fill the vacancy.

Rev. Knaub has been prominent in community and church activities. For 10 years he served as scoutmaster of the Winside Scout troop. He also served on the county election board, the OPA board, and at one time coached the high school basketball team.

Since being pastor at Trinity, he has directed an enviable choir. He also organized the church Brotherhood and adult Sunday school class.

Accept 30 Plywood Bins At Wayne, Wakefield

Supply 138,000 Bushel Capacity

Triple A Chairman Tom Roberts yesterday officially accepted 30 plywood bins constructed for Wayne county by the Hamilton Container company, Los Angeles.

The contracting firm was represented here in the transaction by Hal Van Ereton. Joe Hunt was in charge of the construction work.

Each bin is 20 feet 4 inches in diameter and 16 feet high, with a capacity of 4600 bushels. Fifteen units are completed at Wakefield and 15 in Wayne. Mr. Van Ereton said his company has erected 500 such bins in Nebraska this fall.

Corn is already being received for storage, Roberts said. At Wakefield corn has been pouring into the new bins for nine days.

Large Steel Units In addition to the wooden bins, eight large steel quonset-type storage units are under construction for the county. Six of these are being built in Wayne and two in Wakefield.

Another 40 bins, round type and of aluminum, are also under way. Each unit will hold 3200 bushels. Fifteen are under way at Winside and 25 will be set up in Wayne.

Firemen and Farmers Join to Stop Don Meyer Field Fire

Tuesday's Blaze Stirs Fire Warning

A farm fire that swept through two fields and destroyed a large alfalfa stack Tuesday noon realistically pointed out the serious fire hazards of a dry autumn—tinder-like fields, grass and brush.

It took the full cooperation of the Wayne fire department and the firemen of a tractor and disk to finally stop the racing flames at the Don Meyer farm southeast of Wayne.

The flames reportedly started when Bob Meyer, brother of Don, was repairing a fence, and, with the utmost care and caution, attempted to eliminate a few weeds that lined the fence.

Alfalfa Stack Burns! An east wind quickly swept the flames out of control, sending them along the fence and road, through one stubble field, and then into the second, destroying a large alfalfa stack in its path.

Don Meyer, owner, was away at the time. A neighbor, John Grimm, was busily trying to confine the fire with the use of a tractor and disk when the Wayne firemen arrived.

At the very time of the call, Wayne firemen were destroying weed and grass fire hazards about the city. Weeds and brush were eliminated at Roosevelt park, the old skating pond and on lots in the northwest section of Wayne.

Citizens Warned

Following Tuesday's fire, the Wayne fire department issued a warning of the extreme danger of outdoor fires this time of the year. Citizens are urged to notify the department before setting any grass or weed fires.

# Sale of TB Christmas Seals Gets Under Way

## Annual Drive Will Start in Wayne Monday, Nov. 21

Work is under way this week on the Wayne county Christmas seal drive for the Nebraska tuberculosis association, according to Grace Steele, county chairman. Mrs. Merion Hamilton is co-chairman. The 1949 sales campaign, totaling \$120,000 in Wayne county, Mrs. Hill says.

The Nebraska Tuberculosis Association's 43rd annual Christmas seal sale will get under way this year on Monday, Nov. 21, when the familiar seals will go on sale in Wayne county. The campaign will run through Christmas.

Dr. J. Harry Murphy, Omaha, state president, said:

"We hope to make the 1949 seal sale the best ever conducted in the state," said Dr. Murphy. "On the success of the seal sale will depend the tuberculosis control work of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association during the coming year."

"A rough rule of thumb is safe to say that tuberculosis is a disease which takes the lives of more young people between the ages of 15 and 34 than any other disease kills Americans in the rate of one every 11 minutes, almost a thousand a week, close to 50,000 every year. One way for all of us to participate in the fight against tuberculosis is by buying and using Christmas seals. Funds from the sale of Christmas seals constitute the substance of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association, the county associations and the Christmas seal committees."

**Continuing Campaign**

The Nebraska Tuberculosis Association, working in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Health, Assistance and Rehabilitation, has participated in case finding, social service and rehabilitation programs directed toward the control of tuberculosis. It has conducted a continuing educational campaign against the disease through the use of motion picture films, talks and printed materials.

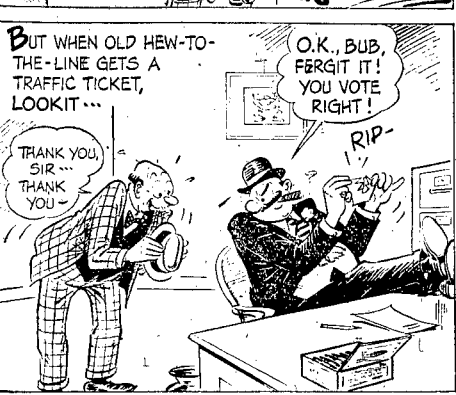

At Laurel, Coach Keith Gilliland reports even more injuries. Though not serious now, another game might easily develop permanent and unnecessary injuries for some boys.

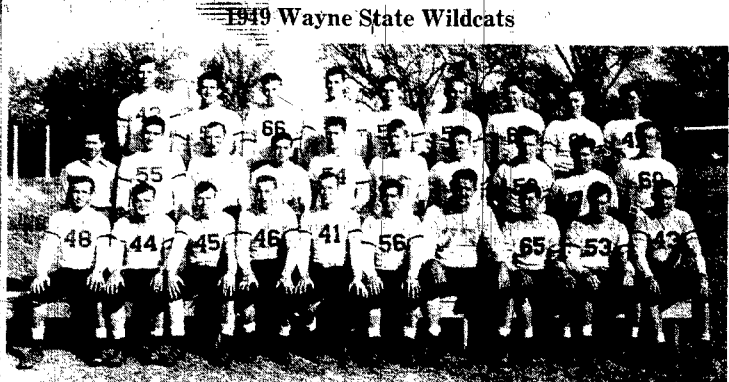

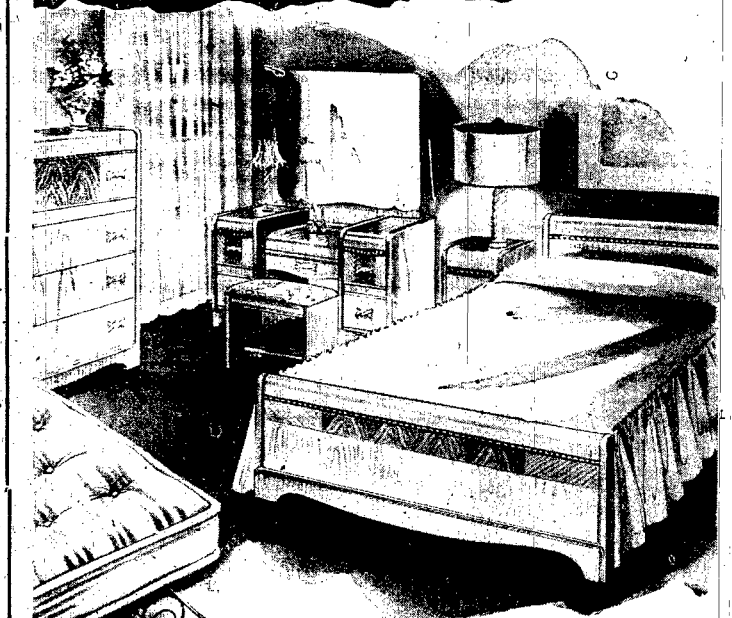

The Wayne city school band serenaded the departing grid men among their eggs and sausages with marches.

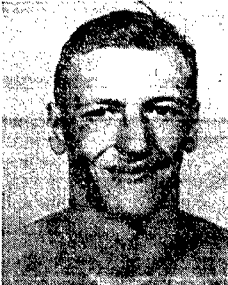
At the pep rally held at the college several speeches were made by members of the squad and Coach Jack Wink. The college pep band aided the cheerleaders with several chants and yells.

## 'Cats Have Envious 1949 Season Record

Opening the season against the Westmar team from LeMars, Ia., was a good starter for the Wildcats in giving them a chance to gain experience before meeting their first conference opponent. A 33-0 win was just as impressive as it sounded as it was Wayne's game all the way. Bahe, Kane and Strahan did the scoring to set the pace while Wayne's line held the men from Iowa scoreless. Governor Val Peterson gave a dedicatory address during half time ceremonies when the new Memorial stadium was presented to the college.

Second game was also played at home ground Sept. 17, when the Hastings Broncos invaded the Wildcats field. Their attempt to ston the 'Cats was just as unsuccessful as had been Westmar's. They lost a 20-6 game to the Wildcats as the Wayne men continued, to impress by quickly taking a strong lead and holding it. Coach Wink substituted freely as all players saw action during the second half.

On the trip to Fremont the Wildcats tripped the Midland eleven by a 37-7 score. A Joiner to Strahan aerial was ruled good early in the first quarter due to interference, and from then on the Wildcats continued to roll. Kane, Bahe, Sorenson and Strahan all enjoyed sharing scoring honors, while the rugged Wildcat line gave proof why it was gaining the name of being one of the toughest in the nation.

All games are not easy ones, and the Nebraska Wesleyan Plainsmen came to Wayne to prove that their 12-0 win over Wayne last year was not a fluke. In one of the best played games of the season the Lincoln men scored against the Wildcats in the first quarter to lead. Bahe scored the first TD for Wayne and Muller converted to put the Wildcats ahead with a narrow 7-6 lead. Ketterer pushed across the second Wesleyan tally in the third quarter and in the same period Kane ran 34 yards to even the score. Final score of the game was made in the last quarter when the 'Cats marched 62 yards and Bahe skirted end to ice the game.

Fans saw the traditional rivals of Peru and Wayne meet on the Wayne field Saturday night, Oct. 8, when the 'Cats continued their victory spree with a 28-6 win. Joiner scored first on a 1-yard smash, and the usual backfield stalwarts continued to crash through for the necessary yardage to score three more TD's. Again the line of Wayne held the Peruvians to scant yardage while dropping them behind the line of scrimmage on seven plays.

What might have been a loss to the victorious Yorkites, was turned into a 26-14 win for the Wayne gridsters on the York field. A mid-season slump seemed to have hit the 'Cats and Wooters of York gave the Wayne team some bad moments while going over for two TD's for his team. An intercepted

pass by Bahe and a 68-yard run-back to score put the 'Cats back in the game. Jim Strahan blocked a punt and recovered it to score the next tally.

Homecoming drew all the old grads back to see the up and coming Wildcat team, and they lived up to all expectations. Chadron grows them big, and it was a big and tough line that the Wildcats had to stop to take their 14-6 win. A crowd of 3,300 fans saw the pass combination of Joiner-Strahan click twice to go over for the only two Wayne TD's of the game. As usual the Wayne line did a fine job of holding the bigger Eagle line.

A unique feature of the Wayne-Kearney game was the scoring of all 22 points of the game by Wayne men in their 20-2 win. Most of the game was played around the Kearney 20-yard line, and again all Wayne players saw action. Cast smashed through for the opening tally, and Strahan gathered in a Joiner pass to count the next six points. Carlson stepped out of the end zone while punting to give the Antelopes their safety. A total of 225 yards was gained rushing in this game.

Grand finale of the season came when the Wildcats racked up their ninth consecutive victory in their win over Doane. This gave them the NCC championship and a record that any college team has a definite right to be proud of.

### National Recognition Given Wildcats

National recognition has been given the Wildcats this season with the record they have been compiling. At present they stand as the only college team in the nation to have a total of nine wins against no losses, and untied.

While stacking up this enviable group of statistics, they have earned several individual honors for themselves. They are rated a ninth best defensive team in the country while Kane and Bahe are rated up near the top in the amount of scoring they have accomplished during these nine games. Latest results have not been tabulated through the Associated Press or United Press where these results have been posted recently.

Alumni of Wayne State living in many states of the union have written to friends and former instructors in Wayne to mention that they have noticed that Wayne has been receiving this recognition, not only locally, but also in the areas where they are now living.

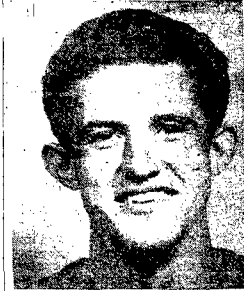

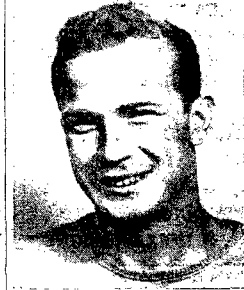

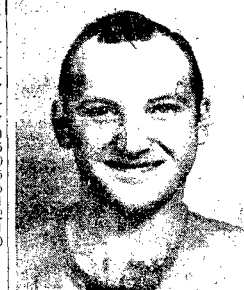

## Team Statistics Are Outstanding

Statistics for the Wayne State all-victorious 1949 football season that have been maintained by the college's public relations department indicate just how Jack Wink's squad has been able to win nine games and the Nebraska College conference title.

In 511 plays, the Wildcats netted 3,029 yards from scrimmage, 2,127 by rushing plays and 902 with 66 completed passes out of 122 attempts. In 39 punts Wayne booted the pigskin 1,881 yards with an average kick of nearly 38 yards. They hustled 18 kick-offs back 413 yards.

Wayne's 218 points were made with 53 touchdowns and 20 place-kicks for the extra point. Thirteen of the TD's were scored on pass plays. Of the 109 first downs chalked up by Wayne, 75 came on rushing plays, 26 on passes, and 8 because of penalties assessed against the opposition. Wayne had 62 penalties assessed against them for a loss of 499 yards. Losses from the line of scrimmage on regular plays only amounted to 228 yards. Wayne fumbled 11 times during the year and lost the ball on 7 of these bobbles.

The opposition didn't fare so well. In their 429 plays they made 1,394 yards, 1,003 by rushing and 391 by 55 pass completions of 103 attempts. Their 39 punts traveled 1,915 yards to average 33 yards. They were only able to return 15 punts for 124 yards but notched 626 yards with 37 kick-off returns. They scored 10 TD's, 5 points after TD and one safety for 67 points.

First downs marked up against Wayne include 58 by rushing, 13 by passing and 1 by penalty for a total of 72. Forty-eight penalties cost the opponents 366 yards. Wayne recovered 22 of the 38 fumbles made during the year and pushed their foes back 270 yards from the scrimmage point.

Fumble recoveries and stellar play weren't the only factors

in Wayne's defensive. Eight Wildcats intercepted 23 enemy passes to ramble 295 yards toward pay dirt.

Don Kane, Stanton sophomore, halfback, was the best ground gainer for the Wildcats. He scampered 681 yards in 111 rushing plays and tossed 41 passes that netted 547 yards. His 38 punts averaged 43 yards apiece. He also scored 6 TD's.

Al Bahe, Wayne senior, halfback, scored 79 points for Wayne by catching seven TD passes from Kane and drove 584 yards on 67 rushing plays. The 26 passes he caught advanced Wayne 279 yards.

Rollie Gast, Plainview sophomore, bucked 317 yards from his fullback spot and scored five Wildcat TD's. Dan Joiner, sophomore from Nebraska City and Wayne quarterback, tossed 21 completed passes to gain 310 yards for Wayne and score two TD's. End James Strahan, Wayne senior, caught 21 passes to push Wayne 254 yards forward and score six TD's.

Newcomers to the Wayne eleven showed well this season. Charles Carlson, Valley freshman halfback, racked up 153 yards in 31 plays.

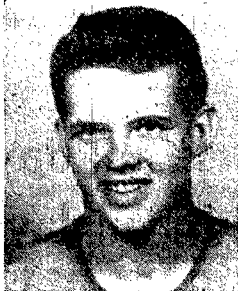
