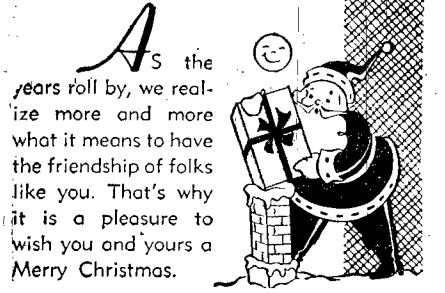



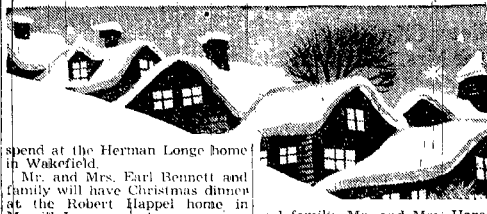

Statistics released by County Agent Don Warner show corn borer loss in Wayne county at 384,393 bushels. This represents a loss of \$518,931 cash due to the infestation of the pest.

Cedar county showed the worst infestation in the state, but Wayne, Burt, Washington, Sarpy, Dodge and Douglas counties also have heavy losses.

**Erosion Ruins Road Grades**

"One of the most discouraging and depressing sights in Wayne County is to see newly graded and gravelled road or highway ruined by one or two gully washing rains."

This has happened this past year in scattered places over the county, according to Herb Kollmorgen, local Soil Conservation Service employee.

He said such unnecessary damage is doubly expensive in that the farmer loses valuable soil and fertility, and the taxpayer pays for cleaning out the road ditch and re-gravelling the road. This erosion damage can be prevented by contouring and terracing.

Over 330 Wayne County farmers and landowners are now trying to prevent such damage "by having started complete soil conservation programs. This helps hold the water and soil, produces larger crops, and reduces road maintenance cost considerably."

"Money spent on cleaning out ditches could buy a lot of gravel for other roads," Kollmorgen said.

Results of Labor Monopoly

If anyone still doubts that the labor monopoly which has a strange hold on the basic industries of this country must be broken, they should consider the example of John L. Lewis, who heads and completely controls the soft coal miners. Mr. Lewis has said, in effect, that coal cannot be mined in this country without his consent, and that it can only be mined on terms laid down by him. He demands powers that are clearly the duty and responsibility of management. He has refused to enter into honest collective bargaining as it is generally understood. He has indicated a contempt for the government, as when early in November, he refused to send union representatives to a conference called by the chief of the U. S. Mediation Service on the grounds that they were too busy. Lewis is apparently determined to keep the vital coal industry in a state of turmoil and indecision, as when, long ago, he intimated that he might order another coal strike on Dec. 1. We see in all this the fruits of our failure to make organized labor subject to the anti-trust laws that apply to the rest of us. Suppose, for instance, that the owners and operators of all the coal mines combined and announced that they would stop producing coal, because they weren't satisfied with the selling price or had some other grievance. The government would crack down with all its force, and severe civil and criminal penalties would follow. Yet the unions can shut down great industries at their whim, regardless of the effect on the economy and security of the country. Labor monopolies must go the way of financial and industrial monopolies.

Politicians Are Busy

The next Presidential election is a long way off, but the politicians of both parties are busy building their fences and cultivating their fields. The national, state and local organizations are doing the usual groundwork — and, incidentally, finding the usual difficulties in raising as much money as they think they should have. Some men high in Republican circles think that their party must make a comeback next time if it is to survive as one of the two major political forces. So far, the GOP hasn't had much to cheer about. The New York senatorial election is in point. The Republicans put their best foot forward in John Foster Dulles, who is a world statesman of a very high order. The party, including Governor Dewey, went all out in the effort to elect him. The Democrats also had a very strong candidate in Herbert Lehman, who had made a fine record as governor. Mr. Lehman endorsed the Truman program — with one or two exceptions, such as the Brannan farm plan and won. It was a severe setback for the Republicans. A Fair Showing Even so, the Republicans did make a good showing. Mr. Dulles is nowhere near as well known to the rank and file of voters as Mr. Lehman. Yet the latter's majority was less than 200,000 in an election in which a very large vote was cast. The biggest test, it is generally felt, will come in Ohio next year, when Senator Taft must run again for his seat. Mr. Taft wishes to be the 1952 presidential candidate. He is the outstanding Republican now in Congress, and has the strongest influence in guiding party policies and tactics. His differences with the opposition are clear-cut. Opposes Welfare State He is passionately opposed to the welfare state, and to the Truman program in general. He is, therefore, one of the few top Republicans who could run against Mr. Truman, or another Democrat holding Truman views, with a positive program of his own. He would not adopt the "me too" attitude which brought so much criticism on Governor Dewey last time. About Eisenhower There is a revival of speculation concerning General Eisenhower as the GOP candidate. It is said that he has wearied of his work at Columbia, and has developed a new interest in public service. His vast prestige and public following would make him about as formidable a candidate as can be imagined. A tough Republican problem is how to offset Democratic strength in the great centers of population. In the New York race, for instance, Mr. Lehman carried only five counties, and four of these were in New York City. Mr. Dulles carried the rest. But the big majority Mr. Lehman piled up in the city did the job.

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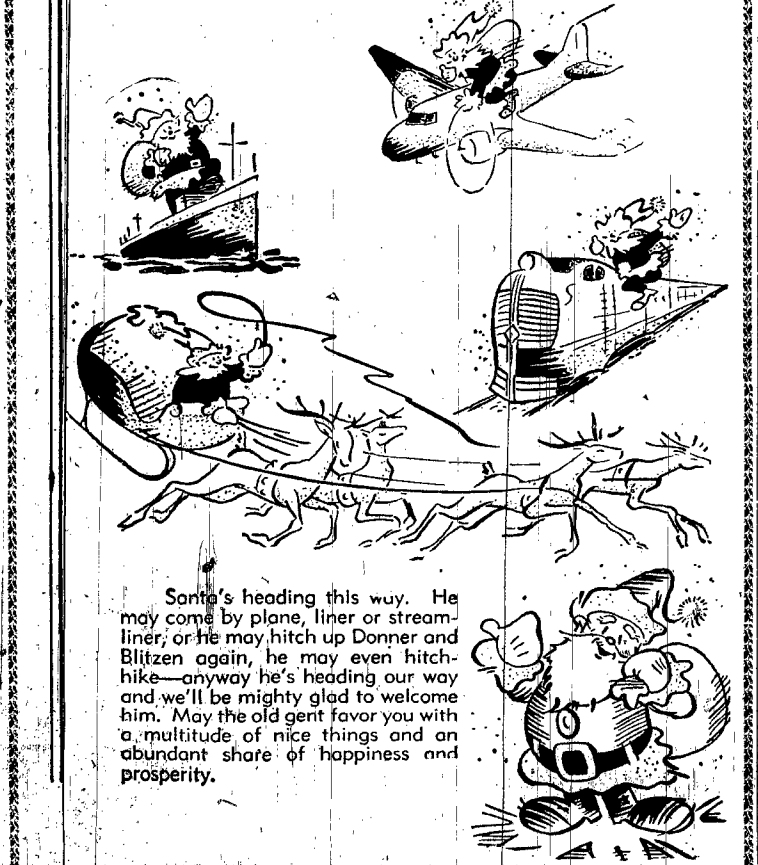
