Proper Land Use

Froper Land Use Farmers either must conserve the soil or face government regulation, in the view of Kent Leavitt, president of the National As-sociation of Soil Conservation Districts. More than 500,000 acres of land are lost in this country each year by erosion and waste, and we thus face the problem of an ever-increasing population coupled with a diminishing amount of land. Mr Leavitt in a speech made at Port-

everincreasing population coupled with a diminishing amount of land. Mr. Leavitt, in a speech made at Port-land, Ore., offered three remedies, "First" he said. "farmers must change their thinking about the ownership of land. We should consider, eurselves as trustees for future generations. "Second, we must continue to develop the proper science of land use. "Third, we must get the proper land use applied to every! land-acre in America without changing the form of government." Mr. Leavitt has a strong point—its es-sence is that unless we, as a nation, volun-tarily take care of the land which sustains us, the politicians will force Federal con-trol down our thrpats. That has happened in England, where the Labor government has dictatorial authority over agriculture in all its phases. It would be the height of folly to say that it could not happen here.




