Lucky "First Baby" of 1950 Will Receive Many Useful Gifts

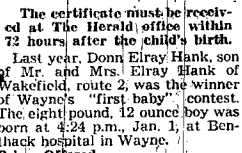
Must Report Birth Within 72 Hours

Firemen of the Wayne County Rural Fire district have purchased a Ford F-7 truck from the Laverne Fire department in Minnesota.

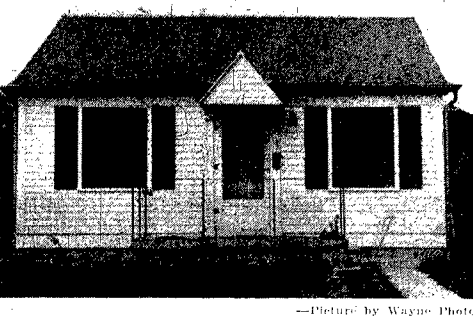

# Gives Year-End Report on Extension Work

## County Agent Not Busy? Who Ya Kidding!

**Report Shows Work of 1949**

People might sometimes wonder how county agents spend their time during the year. Wayne county agent Don Warner has as many as 100 hours in the fire as a cattle raiser most of the time and recently compiled a list of the activities he and his office participated in during 1949. Along with this, plans for 1950 are already in the making.

Warner released his 1949 year-end report this week. It also included a few plans for 1950.

**4-H Banquet**

Along with the start of the year were the 4-H club banquet in January. Albert Watson's talk on Europe at the farmers day program and the spell of bad weather that kept everyone busy and close about home.

Along in March, meetings were again scheduled, but due to muddy roads, few were able to attend meetings of 4-H trainers, the PFL conference at Omaha, 4-H club officers training and sheep management and livestock loss prevention.

Farmers had some little trouble in getting their corn into the ground because of the non-freezing of the soil which was protected by the first early snow. Next came the corn borer and green bug for the oats. Of note was the fact that where best fertility was available the green bugs didn't damage the oats.

**August Shows**

In August the shows began. Brown Swiss Canton, Wayne, Junco, Fair at Randolph, District Dairy at Norfolk, Junior Fair at Wisner, Hampshire Type Conference at Omaha and Duroc Congress at Lincoln, and several county fairs. Wayne county 4-H members bought beef calves for next year's projects at the Wayne calf sale and also at the county fair.

Recognition for good work was given to those deserving at the county fairs, and the Wayne county soil conservation district was also awarded the Louis Willers, Norris Schroeder and David Rees farms were selected as standouts in conservation work. The Ted Hook farm was named as progress winner from Nebraska for 1949.

Only a few of the 4-H events have been held and the problems of the year are still being solved. Disasters. On the whole it was a good year, crops were good, prices were good, and accomplishments many. Tributes go to those rural leaders who have made the past 12 months possible.

Plans for the coming year include a number of 4-H field days. The annual extension meeting on Jan. 19, including a social evening of movies and square dancing.

Phyllis Ross, new home agent, plans two demonstrations for club extension leaders on clothing construction. The first is scheduled for Jan. 4 at the Wayne RFA building and the other on Jan. 6 at the home of Mrs. William Whyte at Waspick.

**Week of Activities**

A week conference meeting is to be held in Lincoln Jan. 5 and 6 with demonstrations and equipment highlighting the two-day meeting.

Other meetings, conferences and demonstrations have been scheduled for later in the year and will be announced before they are due. Warner stresses the important part that 4-H actually plays in the lives of Wayne county boys and girls. As an example, the 4-H work that was accomplished the past year, the following figures are given:

**4-H Accomplishments**

Beef club members produced over 55,000 pounds of beef from which they received nearly \$30,000, swine members produced 27,000 pounds of pork for which they received \$9,000, dairy club members raised calves valued at \$2,500.

The county's 4-H girls prepared 2,000 meals, canned 1,500 quarts of food, sewed nearly 200 garments and improved 175 rooms.

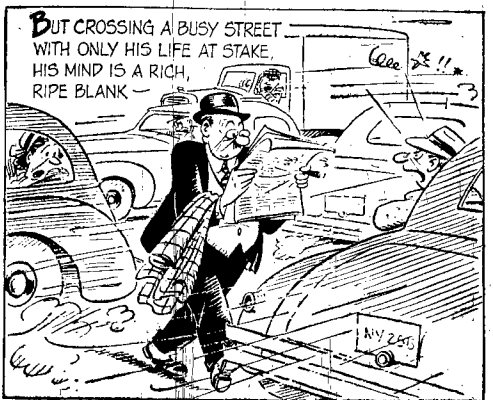

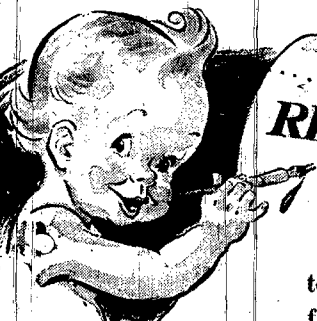

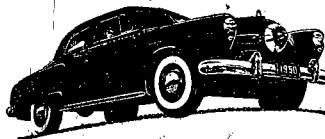

Bill Kropp fouled out shortly after halftime and Kaskey started hitting for the Wildcats from

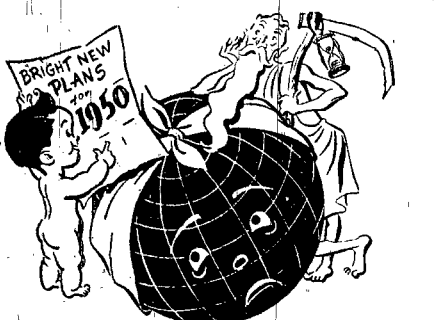
Kropp's position. Kaskey was high for Wayne with 14 points.
