The sensible old bird headed for Wayne, arrived just as the fire whistle was blowing a welcome to 1950, and then swooped down on Benthaek hospital for a prompt 12:02 a.m. delivery of Constance Dale—the first northeast Nebraska baby of the new half century.

Just three minutes earlier for a little later, and the six-pound, 14-ounce newcomer would have missed its "first baby" honors—and also the privilege of falling heir to numerous gifts offered by 21 Wayne merchants.

10-Pound Boy
Another stop on Mr. Stork's early 1950 travels was at the Wakefield Community hospital. There, according to reports received at The Wayne Herald office, was delivered ten full pounds of boy—Richard James Nolte.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Nolte, who live in northeast of Wayne, came into the world at 4:10 a.m., Jan. 2, with the assistance of Dr. C. M. Coe.

Baby Constance, "first baby" winner, attended by Dr. Walter Benthaek, came into the new world proudly displaying a full head of black hair.

She is her parent's first child, and also the first grandchild of the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dale of Wayne and Mrs. George Goetz of Hartington.

Father Jack Dale is a senior at Wayne State Teachers college and will graduate in the spring. The Dales live in one of the school's guesthouses.

Last year's "first baby" was a boy, Donn Elroy Hank, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elroy Hank of Wakefield, born on the same day in 1949, four-and-a-half hours after the turn of this year.

Sell 220 Auto Plates First Day

The first 1950 auto license plates for Wayne county have been issued to W. C. Andrews, Wayne, according to County Treasurer Jean A. Boyd.

During the first day, Jan. 3, 220 licenses were issued to Wayne county residents.

License numbers are reserved from year to year. Holder of the No. 1 license plate in Wayne county, C. W. McGuire of this precinct, has not yet claimed his license.

1949 license plates became delinquent after Jan. 31. The increase in fees by the last legislature has upped cost of passenger auto license plates to \$6 and \$8 and farm truck fees run between \$8 and \$45.

Chain Accident Involves Four Cars, Wrecker Driver Arrested, Held for Trial

Four cars and a wrecker played dominoes on highway 15 one-and-one-half miles south of Wayne early Sunday morning of the new year for a total damage of nearly \$700—all within a half hour's time.

One person involved suffered a slight brain concussion, and driver one of the cars was arrested and held for trial, according to Patrolman Clarence Mayhew who investigated the chain of accidents.

Mayhew said the accidents might have been much more serious due to the fact that quite a crowd gathered at the scene following the second crash. All accidents happened between 2 and 2:30 a.m. on Jan. 1.

Car No. 1 Hits Pole
Smash-up number one occurred when Frank Berlesler, Wayne, came north over the hill opposite the Otto Test farm. According to Mayhew, Berlesler was sleepy and ran off the road on the right side. The rear end of his '39 Chevrolet hit a telephone pole and then slid sideways along the ditch. He drove the car 150 ft. from the spot the car left the highway.

About \$200 damage was done to the car and Ruth Stammer, Wayne, a passenger in the car, suffered a slight brain concussion.

The Wolke Auto Service wrecker was called out and both wrecker and car were in the field on the east side of the highway.

Cars 2 and 3 Crash
At that point, Albert Topp, Pilger, came over the hill from the south, closely followed by Grover C. Bishop, Wayne. Topp slowed when he saw the lights and then stopped, thinking the cars were on the highway.

Bishop, however, right behind Topp, did not stop quickly enough and hit the right rear fender of Topp's car with his left front fender. About \$150 damage was done to Topp's car, a 1947 Studebaker.

Bishop's '41 Ford went out of control and rolled over on its top in the ditch.
People who had gathered at the accident scene managed to turn the car on its side to free Bishop and a passenger who were trapped in the car with the doors jammed. Damage to the car amounted to \$350.

Car No. 4 Hits Wrecker
Ed Wolke then brought his wrecker around to pull out the Bishop car. The wrecker was on the west side of the road heading up the hill, about 8 feet from the highway's edge, when Frank Bergies, Pilger, came north over the hill. He ignored the flashlights and flares, according to the patrolman, and hit the front end of Wolke's wrecker.

His car slid 85 feet sideways into the ditch.

About \$80 damage was done to the wrecker, and Bergies' '34 Chevrolet suffered \$150 damage.

Mayhew arrested Bergies on a charge of driving while intoxicated and not having a Nebraska operator's license. He held him in the Wayne county jail pending trial Jan. 3.

A. J. Atkins, music director at Wayne city school, has announced that a music clinic will be held that day, with the program given that evening. E. Wishnow of Lincoln will conduct the orchestra and will bring six artists to aid in the presentation, and to perform special numbers.

Proceeds of the program will be given to the Wayne county polo drive.

Burglars Break Into Three Offices, Obtain Only \$60

Three offices were broken into and entered during the two-day Christmas holiday and \$60 taken from Charles McDermott law office. Discovery of the burglary was not made until Wednesday afternoon when L. W. Ellis, attorney, noted that marks and scratches around the door frame indicated someone had attempted to enter.

Several offices are located above the First National bank where the robbery occurred, but the burglar was only able to gain admission to McDermott's, Burr Davis' and Ellis' law offices. Only loss that was discovered was Mr. McDermott's \$60 that had been left in a cash box.

Sheriff Hans Tietgen investigated the robbery. Fingerprints were taken and sent to Lincoln to be checked against state and federal files.

Cupid Slows Up, But Improves His Marksmanship

Dan Cupid has taken a beating in Wayne county during the past year. The county judge has issued a total of 63 marriage licenses during 1949. This is a decided drop from 87 marriages in 1948, 107 in 1947 and 91 in 1946.

Across the hall at the court house, Dave Harner, clerk of the district court, reported that married life in the county was running smoothly. Only two divorcees have been granted during the entire year.

In 1948 Wayne county had six divorces, in 1947 there were four and 1946 had a high total of 12.

Mrs. Henry Ley to Begin Capitol Commission Duty

First Meeting Is Called January 17
Mrs. Henry Ley, Wayne's new appointed member of the State Capitol Commission, will begin her official duties this month when she attends the first called meeting of the group Jan. 17.

Governor Val Peterson has called the commission for a meeting at 10:30 a.m. on the above date in the Governor's hearing room of the state capitol, Lincoln. Mrs. Ley received Peterson's request for acceptance of the appointment a few days before Christmas.

However, Mrs. Ley has now received an official certificate of the one-year appointment, and has executed and returned the required oath of office. The January meeting is expected to be an organizational meeting, she said.

Duties of the Commission
Today the state capitol commission deals with the responsibilities of general care, improvement, decorating and art work of the building. They will supervise additional repairs and art as such work is provided for.

Nebraska's present capitol was begun in 1922 and completed in 1932, according to the states' official blue book. The entire cost of the building, landscaping and furnishings exceeded 10 million dollars.

Started with Five
The first commission was composed of five members. They were: Governor Samuel R. McKelvie, the State Engineer and these three appointed members: W. E. Hardy, Lincoln; W. H. Thompson, Grand Island; and Walter W. Head, Omaha.

Names of the number of present commission members is not known here and the blue book does not list them. A wise provision of Governor McKelvie's administration established a state capitol commission, charged with the duty

State National shows a total statement as of Dec. 31, 1949, that balances at \$5,184,808.09.

The First National statement balance is \$2,855,926.51 at the close of business Dec. 31, 1949.

And the cash position of Wayne has improved more than \$100,000 over a year ago. The combined total a year ago was \$7,905,894.13. This year the two banks totalled at \$8,040,734.51.

Out of Old Nebraska

The Ghost Dance disturbance among the Sioux at Pine Ridge Indian Agency across the Nebraska line in western South Dakota, culminating in the disgraceful Wounded Knee massacre, Dec. 29, 1890, created a state of alarm throughout northwestern Nebraska and provided the Nebraska National Guard with its last encounter with the Indians.

Nervous settlers, alarmed at the restless Sioux, concentrated at Harrison, Fort Robinson, Chadron, Hay Springs, Rushville, Gordon, and as far east as Valentine, so as to be near protection in case the imagined Indian outbreak occurred. Regular troops were at Pine Ridge, and numerous calls were made upon the governors of Nebraska and South Dakota for arms and troops by the sheriffs and other officials of counties adjacent to the reservation.

Gov. Thayer directed the Adjutant General of Nebraska, Victor Vitanton, to supply Springfield beach loading rifles and ammunition to 14 different companies organized at various places in northwestern Nebraska. The first brigade of the Nebraska National Guard, under Brig. Gen. Leonard A. Colby of Beatrice, was alerted for marching orders.

Though there was no fighting after Dec. 29 (and very little then on the part of the almost defenseless Indians), the residents of northwestern Nebraska continued to be much excited, to leave their farms, and to rush into the towns. More than 130 families from the outlying country were concentrated at Chadron, dependent upon the public for shelter and food.

On Jan. 4, General Colby received orders to move the First Brigade into the northwestern part of the state, and two regiments were moved into the area by the earliest regular trains, their companies being stationed at various towns along the Nebraska-Dakota line.

Within a week, settlers from the country adjacent to the reservation had recovered from their panic and began returning to their homes. The presence of the National Guard apparently had restored the confidence of the people, and he began to take on a more normal aspect in both the towns and in the country.

Finally, conditions at Pine Ridge had so quieted down that on Jan. 15, Gen. Nelson A. Miles, commander of the regular troops, released the Nebraska National

Guard from further active duty and the men returned to their homes.

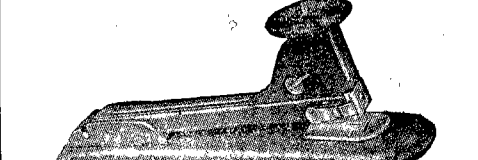

Town Without Sidewalks, Paving and Light Plant

A period of 66 years has passed since the incorporating of Wayne as an actual city. During this time several million dollars worth of public improvements have been added to the city, of which made over the resistance of people who thought the changes or additions weren't necessary.

People realized the need for an organization to handle the affairs of the growing city of Wayne in 1884, and so it was on March 21, that a group of men gathered to elect the first town council: A. B. Slater, chairman;

A. P. Chidder, clerk; Theodore Steele, treasurer; A. A. Welch, corporation attorney.

Turning to the records of the first meeting we find the board started off with the decision to have an ordinance to provide a system of license for peddlers, vendors of goods, or other valuable things, and auctioneers, and prescribing a penalty for the violation thereof.

No Sidewalks

Need for sidewalks next arose, since the dirt paths of the time were often so muddy, and soiled the long dresses worn by the women of that period. Evidently the women put their word in, for at the next meeting the following resolution was adopted.

"In the matter of the petition of Thomas J. Steele and nineteen others praying for sidewalk, it appearing that the petition was signed by more than the three-fourths necessary resident voters which said residents prayed for—IT IS ORDERED, that a sidewalk 4 feet wide, built of inch fencing, laid on 2x4 stringers, be built by each lot owner

on Lincoln street on the west side thereof, and extending from 1st to 6th st.

With the advent of an alert city council which accomplished many things, several matters were brought to light which were considered important to the future welfare of Wayne as a progressive city.

Mayor Henry Ley was head of the board in 1899 when it was decided to raise \$6000 through the issuance of bonds, for establishing and maintaining a system of electric lights in Wayne for the three wards. It was also during this period that record of the city expenditures was kept and published.

Here are some of the activities:

S. B. Short, building hook and ladder for fire, \$2.00; Peter Cost, salary for February, \$50.00; Cost of operating calaboose for year, \$150.00.

An ordinance was also passed to "test" any dog found running a large in Wayne and to establish a large in Wayne and to establish a poundmaster and providing his fees for the sale of such stock.

Light Plant

Nine years passed and the advance of having a municipal light plant was soon discussed and discussed before the council could get the necessary number of votes to authorize the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$4500 for the plant.

Things continued smoothly for a while and then World War I intervened. After this was over the council met the demand of the public for paved streets. Wayne was divided into three paving districts and the contract let to the Abel Construction company to pave the streets.

The first 74 blocks in Wayne were paved. Paving was to consist of the brick type paving, and since a storm sewer had been installed in 1919 at a cost of \$37,000 everything was in readiness. Work was not actually started on the big project until 1921, however.

Paving Districts

The paving of district No. 1 included 19 blocks from the bridge at south Main street to Seventh street, and one block on either side. Cost was \$166,937 to the lot owners, and \$51,898 to the city for curbing and intersections.

Paving district No. 2 comprised of 34 blocks and cost \$162,000 to the lot owners and \$71,656 to the city for curbing and intersections.

Paving district No. 3 consisted of 21 blocks at a cost of \$106,281 to the lot owners, and curbing and intersections costing the city \$35,615.

Paving appeared to be something that everyone was in favor of, and with nine miles of paving already completed within the city limits, paving districts 4, 5 and 7 were formed to add 54 more blocks of street improvement to Wayne.

Things came to a standstill as the paving department along with hard times and no more was done until 1934 when WPA paved nine blocks.

Today Wayne stands as a progressive community of well over 3,000 population, with its municipally owned light plant providing cheap and efficient service, with its large auditorium, public parks, and Carnegie library. Truly a far cry from the few buildings and mud walks of the little town of 1884!

OUT OLD NEBRASKA

By JAMES C. OLSON, Superintendent State Historical Society

James W. Dawes, who served as governor of Nebraska from 1883 to 1891, was born in McConnellsville, Ohio, Jan. 8, 1845, and removed to Nebraska in 1871, settling at Crete.

Dawes was typical of many ambitious young men who emigrated to Nebraska during the early years of its development, and who were to exert a marked influence on the state's history. When he arrived at Crete, young Dawes had behind him a common school education, two terms at Western Reserve College in Ohio, a term at a Milwaukee, Wisconsin, business college, and a law education which had admitted him to the bar of

Wisconsin. His education had been interrupted by periods of work on the family farm, and elsewhere, and his law training had been secured in the office of a cousin at Fox Lake, Wis.

Shortly after he arrived in Crete, Dawes went into the mercantile business, but soon began the practice of law, establishing the firm of Dawes and Foss. He early took an interest in politics and soon rose to a position of prominence and influence in the Republican party of Nebraska.

He was a member of the state constitutional convention of 1875, and in 1887 was elected state senator. Also in 1875 he was chosen chairman of the Republican state central committee, holding that position until 1882 when he was nominated for governor.

Dawes was elected governor in 1882 and re-elected in 1884. In both campaigns his Democratic opponent was J. Sterling Morton, the most eloquent man in Nebraska prior to the arrival of William Jennings Bryan, and one of the most effective vote getters the Democrats could put in the field.

Gov. Dawes' administration coincided with part of the period of Nebraska's greatest development. More than 11,000,000 acres of public lands in Nebraska were filed upon during his four years as governor. Agricultural and industrial production increased accordingly. Gov. Dawes was much interested in the progress of Nebraska's state institutions, and it was during his administration that the first appropriation was made for the State Historical Society.

Following his retirement from the governorship, Dawes went back to his law practice at Crete. He was particularly interested in the welfare of Deane College and for 37 years was a member of that institution's board of trustees. In 1888 he founded an oratorical contest which still is held regularly at the college.

During the Spanish-American War he served in the Army, continuing in the service until 1909. Following his retirement he moved to Milwaukee, where he died Oct. 8, 1918.

No. 33 in a Series—
KNOW YOUR FACULTY

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college, in the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Yalo K. Kessler has lived the past decade in Wayne. He hails from Ohio and has spent the greater part of his life in what the people in Nebraska would consider the east, but what Mr. Kessler states the Ohioan thinks of as mid-west.

While attending and instructing at Ohio Wesleyan University in Delaware, Ohio, a friend of his who was a librarian influenced Mr. Kessler to turn to the library field. After receiving his A.B. from Ohio Wesleyan in 1925, he attended Syracuse University in Syracuse, N. Y., and obtained his A.M. degree from that institution in 1926. More library work was in the future, and in 1929 he obtained his B.S. in Library Science from the University of Illinois.

Since coming to Wayne in 1930 and serving as assistant librarian at Wayne State Teachers college, Mr. Kessler has taken an active interest in both community and college affairs. Recently he was elected vice president of the Nebraska Library Association and also holds membership in the American Library Association.

He has aided in the advancement of the college's 40,000 book library. When the legislative bill passed giving the four state colleges in Nebraska right to grant liberal arts degrees, it was not too great a concern for the Wayne State librarians because of their planned selection of books. A broader selection of books was needed, and this had been in mind in time to meet the needs of this selection.

Mr. Kessler enjoys his work, but does find time to indulge in his hobby of tennis playing in good weather. During the past

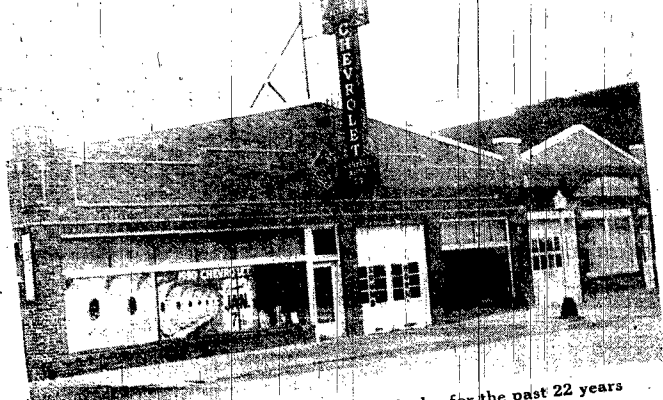

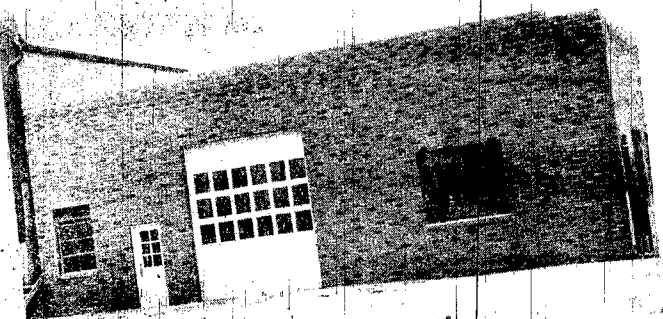

Losing Our Independence: In the last twenty years, there has been an insidious change in our concept of government. We have turned to it to perform tasks which always before were the duty of the individual and the local community.

IN BOOKLAND: The welfare state always leads to one of two conclusions. It impoverishes and enslaves the people and subjects them to ruthless dictatorship, as in Eastern Europe.

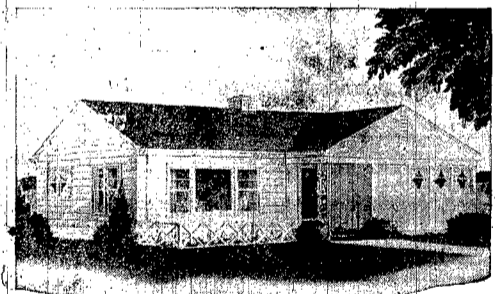

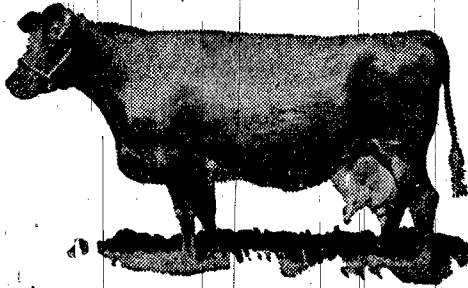

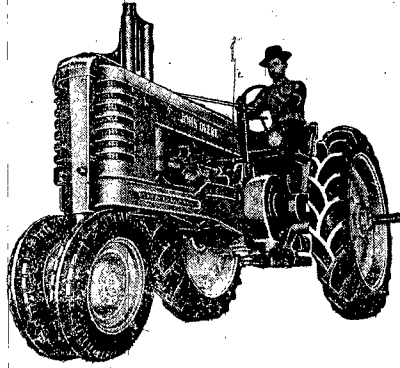
