Prisoners of War To Receive Benefits Rudd Bornhoff, Wayne county veterans' service officer, announced that residents of the county who were prisoners of war or civilian internees at any time during World War II can secure official claim forms from his office.

Persons eligible for benefits under the War Claims Act include military personnel who were prisoners of war in any theatre during the war and certain American civilians who were interned by the Japanese in the South Pacific after Dec. 7, 1941.

Former prisoners of war may receive \$1 for each day of imprisonment on which the enemy failed to provide adequate food. Under certain conditions, civilian internees may be entitled to \$60 for each month of internment.

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PMA Committee Making Survey Of Corn Acreage

PMA community committeemen have launched a survey of Wayne county farms to obtain a report of corn acreage during the past three years. Thomas P. Roberts, chairman of the county PMA committee, has asked corn growers in the county to cooperate on the survey.

These reports will be used to establish individual farm acreage allotments for 1950. This is particularly important because the new price support law thwarts that price support on the 1950 crop to set at 90 per cent of parity to cooperators.

Roberts also asked that any farmer who operated a farm which produced corn in 1947, 1948 or 1949 contact the PMA office if he has not been asked to furnish the data, or a written request for a corn acreage allotment should be filed by a farmer producing corn in 1950 on a farm where no corn was planted during the past three years. The last date for filing such a request is Jan. 25.

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# Lincoln Rabbi Tell Merits of Commandments

## Speaks to WSTC Students Tuesday

Rabbi Samuel H. Baron of Lincoln in an all-college convocation Tuesday, told Wayne State students that the Ten Commandments of the Bible are as valid for this day and age as they ever have been.

He pointed out that Hebrew people call the Ten Commandments "the ten words," or the decalogue. Consequently, they number an introductory statement as commandment number one and consider it as the preamble to the others.

Rabbi Baron said that the first commandment is the key-note to the Jewish month which does not permit Jewish people to believe either in the devil or in hell.

The Jewish fourth commandment asks that people at least remember the Sabbath if it is not possible to observe the day.

Although persons should honor their mother and father, Rabbi Baron said, the parents should in turn deserve the honor. "Thou shalt

not kill" means that war is as wrong as murder.

Modern society condones adultery in that divorce laws allow people to live in concubinage. However, he said, there must be a possibility of divorce because all marriages are not proper.

Perhaps the best solution to the problem he said would be to set up prerequisites to prove the responsibility of people before they obtain marriage licenses.

Baron scorned looseness of anti-embarrassment laws and the practice of slanders. He pointed out that covetousness is not the same as aspiration.

Praises WSTC

Baron also spoke at class meetings Tuesday. He had luncheon with the faculty members at noon and was with the students at an evening meal.

He praised the vision and influence of J. M. Pisk and the old Nebraska normal school. He complimented Wayne State on carrying the tradition and said he was quite impressed with the beauty of the campus.



# 1500th Telephone Installed in Wayne

## Floyd Hogan Gets Milestone Telephone

Martin Savidge Received First Phone in 1897

A milestone was reached last week for the Wayne Telephone Exchange when Manager W. G. Schulz announced the installation of the 1500th telephone in Wayne. Martin Savidge received the first telephone installed in November of 1897, and Floyd Hogan now has the 1500th.

Growth of the exchange has been especially rapid for the past 10 years. Since 1940 there has been a gain of 435 subscribers in town plus 41 rural customers, with 354 of the city customers having been added since the end of the war.

Not only are there 1500 phones in operation at the present time, but records show that they are kept in use. An average day will find 4,000 or more inter-city calls being placed, and an additional 300 or more outside calls being made.

During bad weather, or on special occasions, as many as seven or eight thousand calls will be made in one day.

To keep pace with the increased demands, a force of 10 employees is required in comparison with the 11 that were working in 1940. One new service truck, another switchboard and also other equipment have been added at a cost of \$25,000 in the past two years.

The first toll line was brought to Wayne in 1897 with the toll station at the J. C. Hostetter farm, now known as the William Von Seggern farm just north of Wayne. In November of the same year, the switchboard was installed by R. W. Pritchard in the Ahern building.

Thirty subscribers were handled by the Iowa-Nebraska Telephone Co., which later became the Nebraska Telephone Co. In 1904 the company branched out and installed the first farm phone.

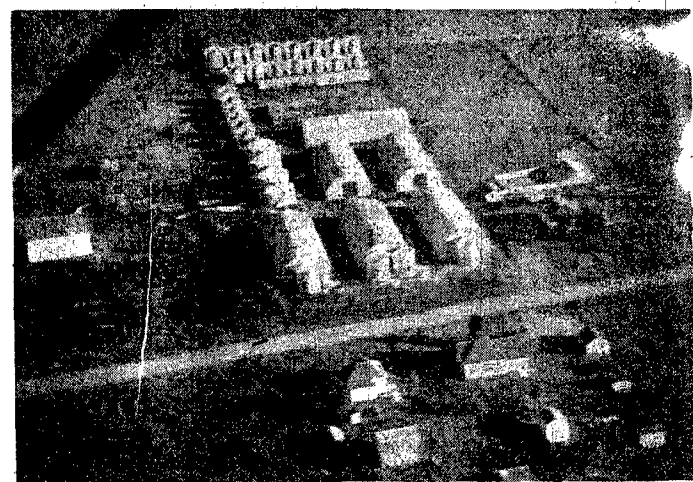

Spending Deluge If anyone wonders why the cost of the Federal government is just about the most critical domestic issue we face, a tabulation recently printed by Reader's Digest will make the reason clear. It simply shows the amounts of money spent by each of the Presidents from the beginning of the nation up to September 30, 1949.

In the early days, Federal spending amounted to peanuts compared with modern standards. Washington and Adams each spent a little more than \$34,000,000. Lincoln had a war on his hands, yet his budgets totaled only \$8,252,000,000. Thereafter, expenses went down again. McKinley, for instance, spent just over \$2,000,000,000.

The first really big budget came with the first world war and the Wilson administration—nearly \$47,000,000,000. Again expenses dropped, with Coolidge and Hoover together spending around \$34,000,000,000.

Then came the depression. President Roosevelt and the New Deal. During his first eight years in office Mr. Roosevelt's administration cost some \$67,500,000,000. The grand total for all the Presidents through 1940 was \$179,620,000,000. And that total, it must be remembered, covers more than 150 years of our history.

Reader's Digest leaves out the extraordinary expenditures of the World War II years—1941-45. It then lists President Truman's spending from the 1946 fiscal year to the end of September, 1949. It adds up to over \$191,000,000,000—nearly \$12,000,000,000 more than all his 32 predecessors spent except for the 1941-1945 period.

Here is a very revealing picture of the way the nation has gone. It is true that conditions have changed over the years. But it is also true that the government has expanded in every direction to a point far greater than most of us realize. Mr. Truman is now a symbol of that expansion, but he is not the major cause. Pressure groups of every kind have grown infinitely more adept and powerful, and officeholders of both parties have fallen into line. The results are our huge budgets, with recurring Federal deficits in spite of these budgets.

A noteworthy development is the concern over our fiscal affairs which is being expressed by people who are not conservatives. Speaking of taxes and deficits, Dorothy Thompson says: "This appalling discrepancy between what is spent, and what is raised occurs when the national income is near the highest in history! It is an absolutely reckless example of the spirit of 'after us the deluge.'" A great deal more pressure to cut the cost of government may be expected in the future than in the past.

Want to Make a Bomb?

Do you want to know how to make an atom bomb? In the December issue of Harper's Magazine, Dr. J. Arthur Campbell, assistant professor of chemistry at Oberlin College, who worked from 1943 on Manhattan Project research, tells you how, and in a very few pages.

However, don't get excited in the belief that Dr. Campbell has come out in a magazine of general circulation with the most "top secret" information conceivable. For he hasn't is the point of his article. For what he gives is an outline of a method, starting with the ore and ending with the explosion, which is known to physicists everywhere. The "secrets" of the bomb, he argues, are not in the method or the materials. Rather, to use his own words, they "are in the minds of thousands of men who have worked on the bomb project, the men who personally accomplish the myriad small steps leading to the final explosion." Later on, he offers this contribution to an extremely controversial question: "There is a very real question . . . whether further tightening of secrecy regulations will not merely result in the discovery of fewer secrets, and thus weaken, rather than strengthen, the security of the United States."

Be that as it may, the country has been stirred by allegations, started by a very popular radio commentator, to the effect that during the war atomic materials and much valuable information were given to the Russians, and that some very high government officials insisted that they be given it. There has been a series of denials, charges and countercharges. No one knows at this writing what the truth is. But, regardless of these developments, it is now generally believed that Russia, through infinite effort and with the aid of captured German scientists, has the bomb, has exploded at least one, and is producing bombs.

When this was first learned it came as a shock. Many American experts had leaned with happy confidence on the idea that Russia couldn't make the bomb before about 1957 at the earliest. Now there seems to be a similar kind of confidence which holds that, even though this forecast proved as wrong as wrong could be, Russian technology is in so low a stage of development that she can't produce enough bombs, or good enough bombs, to stay in the same league with us. No one can prove whether that view is correct or not. But it takes no expert to understand that it could be suicidal to depend on it. A good general always considers the worst possible eventuality when he plans his campaign.

Recent events again have demonstrated how the A-bomb is coloring all our lives. Its dark shadow lies over the entire world, and now to make it is no secret.

IN BOOKLAND

DO YOU HAVE TROUBLE FINDING TIME TO READ? So often we hear people complain about that in the library. Our answer to that one is, you will never "find" time for anything. If you want time, you must make it and if you really want to read you will make time. The man who succeeds is the man who reads. Lincoln walked twenty miles to get a book. He made time to read.

WE MUST ADMIT that not many books these days are worth waiting twenty minutes to read. Possibly you wouldn't even care to cross the street for some of them, but now and then a good novel comes along, and most of the non-fiction is very worth reading. Two exceptionally good novels which we have placed on the rental shelf, so that they will not be lost, are "Gentian Hill," by Elizabeth Goudge, and "Prince of Egypt," by Wilson. The first book by Goudge can be compared favorably with her popular "Green Dolphin Street," and the second book is a Westminster prize book about the life of Moses, making that rather austere, biblical character seem alive, young, and very human. The picture of Egypt in his day becomes very real as you read this story and even the miracle of the parting of the waves and the way Moses could lead his people to the promised land is explained so that it seems logical. We highly recommend "Gentian Hill" and the "Prince of Egypt" as two of the best novels that have come into the library in some time.

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college, in the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Thelma Myers, second grade supervisor at campus school, obtained her A.B. degree from Wayne State Teachers college in 1946, and in 1949 received her MA from Iowa University at Iowa City. Before coming to Wayne this year, she had taught in rural schools in four different towns in Iowa. During one summer she taught primary grade and in Grinnell college for a speech clinic. The work was done under the supervision of the Iowa Society for Crippled Children and the Disabled.

Miss Myers was born and reared in Iowa, where her parents still live. Her greatest interest is vigorous outdoor life such as hiking and living in the woods. She especially likes poetry and children's books and reading. Besides these versatile interests, Miss Myers likes traveling and has done a considerable amount of it.

The elementary teacher spent a summer at Camp Tarywood on Meyer Island off the coast of Seattle, Wash. It is the only camp for just Brownie scouts in the United States and is maintained by the scouts of Seattle. She spent another summer at the scout camp sponsored by Lewiston and Auburn, Me. She did counseling at both camps, and directed the art work in Seattle. Besides having taken a great interest in scouting, Miss Myers has had much Sunday school class work.

Miss Myers maintains that as a teacher one must realize that observation of the individual should be developed to the greatest extent. "The teachers must give every consideration to every child no matter what his environment may be," she said. No teacher knows but that she or he might be the bit of inspiration the neglected child needs to do something with his life. "The child must be helped to create his interests and must possess the continual desire for knowledge," she believes. The grade school teacher is the one who must foster and encourage these traits. Children should be led to appreciate the world about them, and should know the reasons for living.

"Self-confidence is one of the most important factors in training the child to have a real philosophy of life," Miss Myers said. A philosophy of life must be discovered while the child is still quite young. As a supervisor, Miss Myers stated the necessity to have enthusiasm and the willingness to give on the part of the practicing teacher who will soon be trying his own abilities at teaching. The young new teachers must realize the need for them to try new things in reaction to their teaching the students.

Miss Myers spoke of the friendliness of Wayne, and was especially pleased to be accepted into the community so quickly.


