At least two accidents were caused here by Tuesday's coating of ice that stalled cars and cancelled meetings. Numerous smaller mishaps were reported by Sheriff Hans Tietgen.

Yesterday's avalanche of snow caused still further disruption, with Wayne wreckers doing a rushing business.

Local temperatures were recorded officially at 10 degrees below zero here in the Wayne area Wednesday morning.

The Northwestern Bell Telephone company reported a coating of ice on wires in N. E. Nebraska, with the heaviest coating in the Genoa and Albion vicinities.

A gloomy weather report gives further proof that a pleasantly delayed winter is here to stay. Although a slight warmup is expected for Friday and Saturday, average temperatures are expected to be up to 5 degrees below normal. Both colder weather and snow flurries are scheduled for Sunday.

Tuesday's ice sent a truck into the ditch near here and cancelled two Wayne basketball games.

Jim Bresser damaged his stock truck slightly and injured three head of livestock when the truck he was driving slid on an icy highway 15 Tuesday and went off the grade.

'49 Conservation Plans Included 51 New Farms

Covered a Total Of 8,834 Acres

The annual report of the District Supervisors of the Wayne County Conservation district shows that 51 new farms were written in 1949 covering 8,834 acres.

Terracing progressed far beyond other practices in Wayne county, with 120 miles of broad base terraces being constructed.

Norris Schroeder, secretary of the district, says a possible cause for this is the availability of contractors, specializing in this type of work.

Further breakdown of the work accomplished shows that 4,077 acres were contoured, 60 acres put in seeding pasture, 22 acres devoted to tree planting, five farm ponds were developed, 40 acres were drained and 156 acres were improved with outlets and waterways.

Wild life area development included 4 acres, and crop management accounted for over 14,000 acres.

Fall of '49 - One of Driest on Record

4.34 Inches in 4-month Period

1949's extremely dry fall in the Wayne area, and the fact that snow failed to appear before the turn of the year, put Wayne down with one of the driest falls on record.

In 1943, things were really dry, according to the rain chart, with but 1.81 inches being received in the four-month period from Sep-

tember to December inclusive. This compares favorably with the amount Wayne received during the same period in 1949, a total of 4.34 inches.

Total precipitation in Wayne for 1949 was 28.44 inches, 2.94 inches more than was received in 1948, and above average that has been received during the 36-year period since recordings have been taken.

Records kept at the State National Bank show that November of the past year was the driest with but .02 inch received, and that February was a close second with .43 inch. The low in February appears odd considering the amount of snow that lay on the ground.

Wet June
June was the heavy month for rain in '49, with 5.45 inches being received, a most a fifth of the total amount for the year.

In comparing the amount of precipitation this year with the driest dry year and the wettest year, 1939 takes a first with its 12.23 inches, not quite equalling one-half the amount of the average.

In 1945 Wayne received the "most wet stuff" when 37.73 inches fell.
