FOR 'farm flocks' for the past 32 years was \$2.26 and \$2.24 respectively. This means that for each dollar spent for feed the laying flock returned \$1.99. The \$8.87 total income per hen (with 81% of this income derived from the sale of eggs) was only slightly below 1948, but the feed cost per hen decreased \$1.25.

This represents a savings of 8c per dozen in feed cost alone. The return per dollar's worth of feed during the past year was \$1.82 as compared to \$1.46 in 1948.

Size of the farm flocks and egg production per hen continued to increase. Egg prices received increased 1c per dozen in farm flocks and 2c per dozen in commercial flocks. Farm flocks monthly egg prices for 1949 equalled or exceeded the monthly prices for 1948.

Developing and further improving the marketing program no doubt was a contributing factor. During the first 3 months of the past record year (October, November and December, 1948) farm flock record keepers averaged 45% production from their flocks.

This was a 4% increase over the previous record year. Commercial flocks had an all-time high total income of \$9.04 per hen. Feed cost was \$1.49 lower than the previous year, making it possible for commercial flock owners to realize \$4.92 per hen over feed cost.

This is all time high return, since separate records were started on commercial flocks in 1929.







War Taxes Still in Effect
Congress should repeal the war-time excise taxes that apply to various commodities, and also to rail, bus, and plane tickets.

The argument for repeal is based on two facts:
First, these taxes were strictly war-time, emergency measures. They were designed to discourage production of certain kinds of goods at a time when the whole nation was straining to live up to the needs of the war effort. The revenue the taxes raised was a secondary matter. The war has been over for years yet the taxes remain on the books.

Second, retailers, manufacturers and others who know what is going on, say that these taxes definitely harm the sale of affected items. For instance, an additional 20 per cent tacked on top of the price of a fur coat is enough to stop many people from making the purchase. Employment is thus adversely affected. And the volume of retail trade, which has so much to do with our prosperity, is less than it would be otherwise.

The items which are taxed should certainly not be considered frivolous luxuries in a nation which desires a high and improving standard of living. Their widespread ownership and use is one of the things which distinguishes this from most other countries.




