### War Taxes Still in Effect

Congress should repeal the war-time excise taxes that apply to various commodities, and also to rail, bus, and plane tickets.

The argument for repeal is based on two facts:

facts:

First, these taxes were strictly war-time, emergency measures. They were designed to discourage production of certain kinds of goods at a time when the whole nation was straining to live up to the needs of the war effort. The revenue the taxes raised was a secondary matter. The war has been over for years yet the taxes remain on the hooks.

hooks.
Second, retailers, manufacturers and others who know what is going on, say that these taxes definitely harm the sale of affected litems. For instance, an additional 20 per cent tacked on top of the price of a fur coat is enough to stop many people from making the purchase. Temployment is thus adversely affected. And the volume of retail trade, which has so much to do with our prosperity, is less than it would be otherwise.

wise.

The items which are taxed should certainly not be considered frivolous uxuries in a ration which desires a high and improving standard of living. Their widespread ownership and use is one of things which distinguishes this from most office countries.
