



Congressman Karl Stefan was kind enough to send us a list of available farmers' bulletins and leaflets from the department of agriculture. We were surprised to learn that our government printed so many bulletins on so many subjects—and these just on farming!

Scanning over the list we find a lot of practical bulletins for the farmer. There is literature on everything from breeds of horses to sheep scab and goose raising. There are even bulletins to tell you how to paint your farm and how to determine the age of farm animals by their teeth.

Pamphlets for the farm home also sound quite useful. Some of the titles are: "Simple repairs in the home." "Stain removal from fabrics," and even "Child's self-help overall." Also those on home canning and making sip covers could be quite useful.

On the other hand, there are some that we, personally, simply can't see much sense in ordering.

For example, what would we do with: "Herbaceous perennials," "Emmer and spelt," "Karakul sheep," "Infectious anemia," "Lespedeza culture and utilization," and "Growing the Jerusalem artichoke"?

We also, ignorantly probably, find no interest in "psocids," "Kobe, a superior lespedeza," and "Bicolor lespedeza." Add to that: "Pralpating domestic rabbits to determine pregnancy."

Mr. Truman's most recent recommendations on taxation have met an extremely

The President advocates that these taxes,
which are levied on a sizable list of commodities and services—including such "luxuries" as baby oil, commercial transportation for both passengers and freight, and
long edistance telephone and telegraph
charges—should be substantially reduced.
However, he added this al-important provise the loss in revenue must be offset by hew taxes, and that he will not approve any bill which does not accomplish
this plam.

The President is entitled to his views. However, the fact remains that the excise txaes—which manufacturers, retailers and others concerned say are a definite barrier to trade, and employment—were strictly war-time measures, which are still on the books many years after the war ended. It is also true that the goods and services they apply to are necessities in many cases, not luxuries. And it is further true that the only sound way to make up any loss of revenue their reduction or repeal would cause is to cut the cost of government—not to pile more taxes on our over-burdened individuals and businesses.

The present temper of Congress seems to be in favor of repeal of the excise taxes—even as it against tax increases of any kind. That is the right attitude. The enormously impressive Hoover Commission reports have shown where the administrative cost of government afone can, be reduced by three or four billion a year. Congress could make no greater contribution to our conomic stability and prosperity than by putting into effect a rigorous policy of eveny overnment activity and every bureau.
