So said Joseph B. Phillips, International News editor of Newsweek magazine...

Mr. Phillips spoke on "Propaganda in the Cold War." He stated that the United States has much to learn in the art of propaganda...

Preventing War

The world traveler listed four ways of preventing war: ordinary diplomacy, economic aid, propaganda, and the use of force...

Mr. Phillips stated that his most significant impression of the Russian people during his visits there during the '30's was not their curiosity of our form of government...

He said that the Russian people actually felt inferior to us because of our material wealth.

The Newsweek editor further stated that if we are going to cooperate with the Russians, we will have to become more skilled in getting our ideas across to them.

One means the U. S. has used to tell the Russian people about the American way of life are the Voice broadcasts being beamed every day into the vicinities of the communist armies in China.

Turning to the far east, the speaker gave two reasons why the Russians have the balance of power: one, they now have the atomic bomb; and two, the victories of the communist army in China.

He said that the greatest mistake the U. S. made in China was its indecision and frustration.

'49 Corn Must Be Sealed by May 30, 1950

640,000 Bushels Sealed in County

Deadline for the sealing of 1949 corn has been set for May 30, 1950. T. P. Roberts, head of Wayne county PMA announced this week...

At present there are approximately 640,000 bushels of 1949 corn sealed in Wayne county. Qualifications that must be met for the securing of loans on 1949 corn, state that by March 1 the corn must have no more than 17 1/2 per cent moisture content...

The 1948 corn crop, totaling 1,250,000 bushels of sealed corn, has been partially stored in government bins. Storage distribution of this corn is as follows: Wakefield has 72,500 bushels stored in bins; Sholes, 33,000 bushels; Wingo, 45,000 bushels; Wayne, 137,000 bushels; and Carroll, 60,000. This makes a total of 338,000 bushels being stored in bins, with 195,000 bushels stored in elevators in the same towns...

Von Seggern Herd Rated Top

High herd in the Northeast Nebraska Dairy Herd Improvement association is that of W. E. Von Seggern, Wayne, according to tests recently completed by Harold Exert, tester for the association's 22 herds.

The Von Seggern herd of 29 Holstein cows averaged 11,712 pounds of milk and 440 pounds of butterfat per cow for the year ending October, 1949.

Average production per cow of the 198 tested was 7,953 pounds of milk and 319 pounds of butterfat. The average value of the product per cow was \$280, the average feed cost \$124, and the average profit above feed cost \$156.

The value of the product above feed cost ranged from a low of \$40 to a high of \$332.

Mr. Meese was formerly manager of the Wayne Gamble Store, and now has his own store at Canon City.

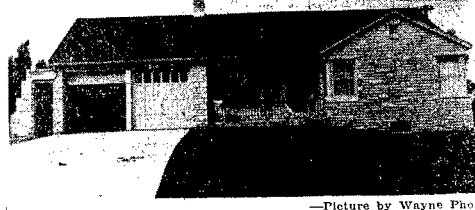
John Sals Heads Engineers Banquet

When two drinking glasses get stuck... one inside the other... instead of "breaking" them apart, do this: Fill the inside glass with cold water, then lower the bottom glass into hot water (your dish water will do). Glasses separate themselves.
