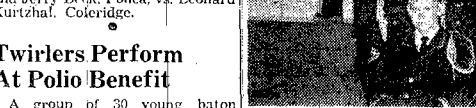
Conservationist Is Busy Speaker

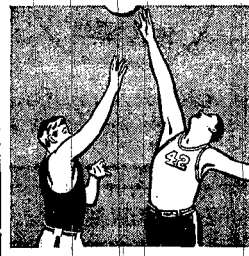

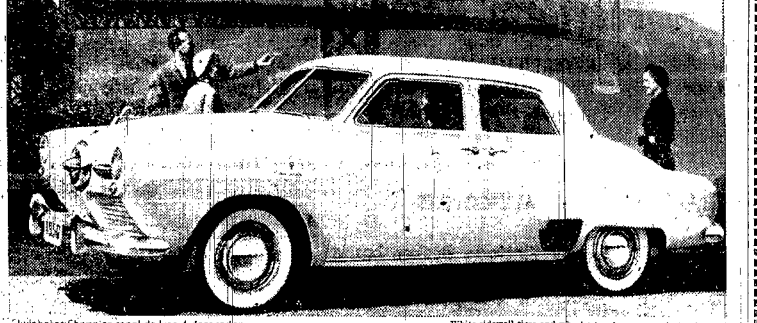

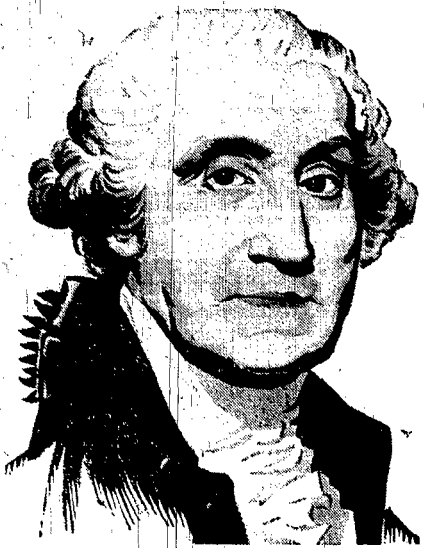

## No. 38 in a Series— KNOW YOUR FACULTY

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college. In the hope that the people and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Jessie Boyce, chairman of the mathematics department at Wayne State Teachers college, received her AB and MA degrees from Minnesota University. She has done graduate work at Harvard, Columbia and at Minnesota University; she only has left to finish her thesis for her Ph.D. degree.

Before coming here Miss Boyce taught all eight grades in

the Sioux Falls school. She was principal of the high school at Fairmont, Minn., and taught at the Teachers college at Madison, S. D. The mathematician was supervisor of mathematics and acting principal of the University of Minnesota high school. She has done much private tutoring and for awhile handled the sheet metal payroll in her brother's office in Sioux Falls, at the Sioux Falls Construction company.

Miss Boyce coached girls' basketball in the school in Fairmont, Minn. She played basketball at the University of Minnesota. Miss Boyce likes all sports, especially tennis and skating. The instructor stressed her interest in genealogy; she finds the study of family histories especially challenging to work out efficiently. She likes all types of handicraft; finding fancy work her favorite. She, like almost everyone else, likes traveling, and has done quite a bit.

Miss Boyce's home town is Sioux Falls, S. D., where several

members of her family live. Miss Boyce stressed the importance of rounding out the student's complete education before he goes from the college to teach other students. Her wish as a teacher, is to help the people to live up to the best traditions of the college. "This means," she said "among other things, that they become and remain proficient in their field, with a good command of its vocabulary and its basic facts, and that they perform in a sensible and systematic manner."

The instructor proved the necessity of a student teacher knowing correct English grammar even though he is a mathematics major. She said, "I feel that if they are accurate and orderly in their work with us, they will have real understanding and true mastery in their work after they leave us." Miss Boyce seeks to make each student a well qualified individual in whatever field he chooses.
