# Waynites Jam Citizen's Party Caucus; Nominate Houdersheldt for Mayor

## Choose Meyer, Bahe, McClure For Councilmen

A crowd of 150 Wayne voters attended the caucus of the Citizen's party at the city auditorium on March 1, electing the pattern of recent years when such caucus meetings were poorly attended.

In fact, one councilman said more citizens attended the meeting from the third ward than actually voted at the last city election.

Nominated for mayor of Wayne was Glen Houdersheldt. Houdersheldt is a member of the Wayne school board at present. W. C. Swanson was also placed in nomination, but final balloting was held for Houdersheldt and Swanson.

With Wayne's one-party system, nomination is about the same as election. Last year, however, a brisk write-in campaign developed, giving the caucus nominees stiff competition.

The incumbent, Mayor L. W. McNatt, had declined to be a candidate.

City Clerk Walter S. Bressler, City Treasurer Leslie W. Ellis, and Carl Nuss and C. N. Olson for the board of education, were all nominated by the general caucus.

In the city wards, the following nominations were made: Bernard Meyer, first ward; Ed Bahe, second ward; and L. E. McClure, third ward. The three men are all on the council at present.

Wayne's city election will be held April 4.

## WITH THE EDITOR IN— 'Operation Portrex'

(Special to The Wayne Herald from its editor, Mark E. Cramer, now aboard the USS Worcester which is taking part in the nation's huge peacetime maneuver in the Caribbean, called "Operation Portrex.")

ABOARD THE CRUISER USS WORCESTER Thursday, Feb. 23

As every N. E. Nebraska boy who has been in the Navy already knows so well, a ship like this is meant for business. Comfort of the officers and crews come second. Quarters are sparsely furnished, but designed strictly for efficiency, and to save space.

The ship is 667 feet long, which on Main street in Wayne is about the distance from The Herald office to the Baptist church corner.

On each side of the Worcester at its pier in port is an aircraft carrier. On our left, on port side, floats the new Franklin D. Roosevelt—a lot longer, and bigger, than our ship.

On our right, or starboard, the carrier, Saipan. Both of them have swarms of black fighter planes on deck like so many saucy Nebraska bumblebees.

Floors of our quarters (pardon me, sailors—the decks) are of solid steel. Your wife and mine could really have fun scattering those cute little rags around in the cabins. (You know—the kind that always slip when you step on 'em.)

Thursday at 1 p.m., our ship was under way down the bay, leading a pack of armed giants out to sea. (One p.m. is 1300 o'clock in the navy.) Out in front of us is a group of destroyers and minesweepers to clear the way.

At the mouth of the bay, the call to "Battle Stations" sounded through the ship and the ship's crew really came alive, everyone except we greenhorn guests.

After some of the scurry and noise on deck, we decided to go on deck and see what was going on. It wasn't that easy. Every hatch was closed, and each one seals water-tight. (The hatch is the "stairway door" up to the next floor, or deck.)

So, under simulated battle conditions, we are spending our first night out of port with no lights—no smoking on deck. But a movie, "The Great Dan Patch," starring Gail Russell, is set for 8:00 in the ward room—for all officers and guests. Another movie is "on" in the mess hall for the crew.

braska studying architectural engineering. The next three years were spent in sea duty with Mr. Netherda acquainting himself with the Asiatic Pacific.

Upon receiving his discharge in 1946, he returned to Wayne State and continued with his schooling, selecting English as his major field.

The past summer was spent at Colorado State in graduate work on his masters degree.

Mr. Netherda believes that one thing that should be stressed more at the present time, not only in college, but in high schools is the attention that is paid to English. Many college students go through college without a thorough knowledge of English and find that it handicaps them the rest of their life.

"The degree of success that a person achieves in most cases comes from his relationships with other people either verbally or through his ability to write clearly and fluently." Mr. Netherda states and because this is true, he suggested that emphasis be placed where it will do the most good in perfecting English.

For improvement in preparing teachers he believes that a plan that was suggested recently of five-year periods, that is, a five-year period to be spent in college learning subject matter, methods, principles, etc., with the fifth year to be spent in the teaching field where the would-be teachers or more or less serves an apprenticeship. If he is satisfied with the actual test of teaching, then he will be well qualified.

Mr. Netherda is a good example of the high type of instructors that are prepared by the Wayne college when they possess the necessary traits to join the teaching profession.

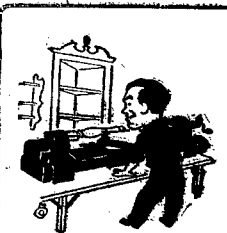

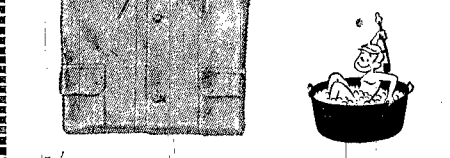
