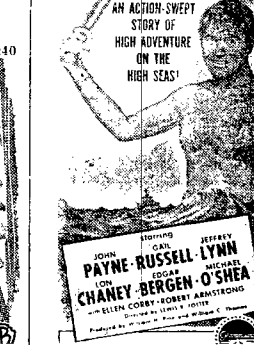

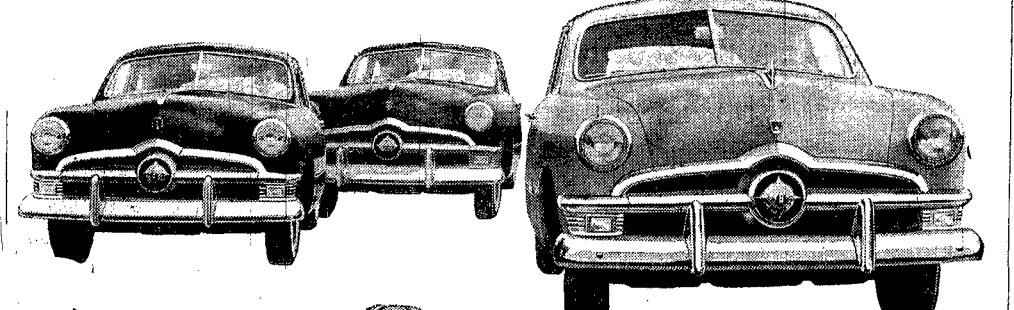

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Dr. Moore Is PTA Speaker

Dr. O. F. Moore spoke to the PTA in Hoskins March 14 on "School Consolidation." He gave a brief history of the types of opposition and the obstacles of school district consolidation. Dr. Moore presented the group with a history of the legislation concerning consolidation and gave a survey of what has been done in other states concerning the problem. The situation in Nebraska was outlined.

The provisions of LB 27, the reorganization of school districts act, were presented by the professor. Many questions were raised, having to do with the organization, machinery, and duties of the consolidation act.

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Plant Corn May 18-20 to Fool Corn Borer

Artificial Control Measures Given

(Conclusion of last week's story on the corn borer by County Agent Don Warner.)

Artificial control measures are divided into three groups, cultural, mechanical and chemical. The most important of these is cultural.

One good farming practice is to eliminate weeds from fence rows and ditches in which the corn borer can live by seeding these areas to grass.

Another is to select a mid-season planting date. Since the borer cannot live in stalks less than 35 inches tall, if corn is planted late enough so that it is less than 30 inches tall when the first brood is hatched, the borer will be eliminated.

This does not mean that late planted corn will escape because the second brood will select and attack the youngest, most succulent corn available.

So the best recommendation would be to plant corn around May 18-20 to attempt to get between the two generations.

Also, early maturing hybrids or hybrids earlier maturing than later varieties.

In regard to hybrid resistance, we recommend that you observe your neighbor's varieties and if they seem to suffer less damage than yours, all other conditions being similar, try some of that variety the next year in comparison to your regular hybrid.

Other cultural practices, such as burning and deep plowing are not generally recommended in Wayne county since the resultant drying out of the soil and erosion by wind and rain will reduce yields more than the corn borer would.

Mechanical controls are limited mostly to attempts to crush the stalks by means of various types of shredders. These have not proven to be of economical value. However, they do reduce the population of overwintering borers somewhat. Those that are left repopulate the generation and do about the same amount of damage the next year.

Chemical Control

Chemical control involves the use of chemicals placed on the crop to control the borers. Occa-

sionally this is effective if the eggs are all laid within a short period of time, if the farmer knows just the right time to spray (within 48 hours after he counts 50 egg masses per 100 plants) and if he can get into his field and spray at the correct time.

Chemical control is only effective during the short period of time between which the egg hatches and the worms enter the stalk, which may be only a period of hours, or at the maximum a week.

However, chemical control is expensive and is frequently ineffective since many of the eggs are laid before the chemical is applied or after it has lost its effectiveness.

Chemicals also kill insects which feed on the eggs or the larvae of the borer.

If farmers are interested in experimenting with the type of control, the University of Nebraska recommends an application of a wettable DDT at the rate of 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per acre, within 48 hours after 50 egg masses are counted per 100 stalks.

County PMA Man Recommends More Grass and Legumes

To farmers wondering what to do with the land taken out of allotment crops, Alfred Thomas of the Wayne county PMA committee, calls attention to two conservation practices under the 1950 Agricultural Conservation program:

1. Increasing the total farm acreage of biennial or perennial legumes and perennial grasses, or mixtures of those legumes and grasses.
2. Establishing for seed production and increased acreage of perennial range and pasture grasses, or pasture legumes.

Farmers of Wayne county should seriously consider these practices, the chairman advises. Where the land and climate are suitable, he particularly urges increased production of grass and legume seed.

Get your grass and legume seed early in the suggestion being made by Mr. Thomas.

He pointed out several advantages in early purchase of seed. To put off getting needed grass and legume seed this year may mean accepting inferior quality seed.

KNOW YOUR FACULTY

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college. In the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Coaching is more enjoyable than actual teaching, Jack Wink, head football coach at Wayne college believes, because it brings him into closer contact with the students. It is something they want to do rather than something that is required of them.

The coaching profession has its compensations because of this and because it is one profession which depends upon physical skill upon the part of the men the coach is instructing. It is one in which the results are evident in the achievements of the men participating and is thus a mental and physical combination.

Coach Wink has an enviable background for coaching in that he played on the University of Wisconsin's outstanding football team and also Michigan's winning team in 1947 as quarterback. He obtained his B.S. from Wisconsin in 1948 and continued at Wisconsin to earn his M.S. the same year. His first year of teaching was at New London, Wis., high school and he came from there to Wayne State Teachers college in 1949.

Instructing in physical education is interesting, the Wayne coach finds, and believes that in time schools will supplement some of the theory with more actual "doing" on the part of the students. Facilities in many high schools aren't sufficient to provide a complete sports program, and consequently the major sports are the only ones that are stressed.

Coaching of students to coach, Mr. Wink believes that practical experience is of prime importance. The handling of students in an activity in which physical motion takes place requires a different type of discipline than that of a school room situation. This can only be gained through actual experience on the part of the student teacher.

All students should take part in some phase of the physical program while attending school, he suggests, as it is a socializing factor in addition to giving many a chance to participate in sports otherwise neglected.

This wide-awake sports mentor finds Wayne much to his liking though somewhat different than his native Wisconsin. His diversions run in parallel paths to his profession in that he enjoys following the current sport.



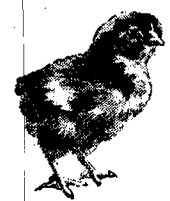

The principal purpose of a classified section, Schulz said, is to provide listings of business subscribers under descriptive headings so that a telephone user can easily locate a firm or professional man.

City Has 16 Dealers; 11 Sell Total Of 80 Models of Refrigerators

If you want to buy a refrigerator, and can't find the type you want in Wayne, you'd better look again!

Eleven dealers in Wayne sell a total of almost 80 models of refrigerators, bearing a dozen different brand names. You can pay any price from \$179.95 to \$449.95, and ranging from 7.4 to 11 cu. ft. One dealer is selling as many as 12 different models.

But the refrigerator line is but one phase of the appliance picture in Wayne as discovered by a thorough survey made the past week by The Wayne Herald.

Net result: Wayne is certainly one of the chief appliance centers in this part of Nebraska. If you can't find it in Wayne, there's probably just "no such animal."

The Herald survey covered every appliance dealer in Wayne—16 of them—to discover the following:

70 Models of Ranges

Twelve of the dealers handle ranges. There also about 70 different models available, in electric, natural gas and bottle gas.

A dozen brands of electric ranges

Some in 45 models, ranging in price from \$119.50 to \$399.95. One dealer handles as many as nine different models.

Gas ranges are available in seven different makes and 25 models, from \$61.50 to \$280.

Home Freezers

Four dealers sell four makes of home freezers, in 15 models. They come in sizes all the way from four to 30 cubic feet, and priced from \$193 to \$750.50.

Four dealers handle water heaters, both electric and gas, for a total of six electric brands, nine gas brands, and 31 models.

Nine Washer Dealers

In the washer field, there are nine dealers in Wayne. They handle 13 different makes and almost 40 models, ranging in prices from \$28.95 for an apartment-size washer to \$369.95 for the most expensive washer in town.

Two dealers handle five models of electric dishwashers; three handle clothes dryers; four sell a dozen different models of irons. One has a garbage disposal unit.

Although there are only four dealers selling radios, the number of models available runs to 77, five different makes.

Smaller Appliances

The picture is similar in the small appliance field, with numerous brands and models found available at the Wayne appliance stores.

This includes vacuum cleaners, food mixers, sewing machines, irons, toasters, waffle irons, coffee makers, roasters and many others.

Three dealers in Wayne handle furnaces, a total of 11 different models in gas, oil or coal.

Refrigeration is the specialty of the Wayne Farm Equipment company in the appliance field. The firm, owned by William J. 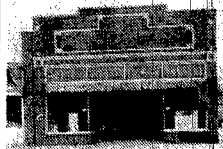

City Power Rate Compares With Lowest in Nebraska

Plant Constructed In 1898 for \$6,000

When a city of 3,500 can maintain a thoroughly modern light plant, it has reason to be proud. When that light plant provides electrical power at a rate which compares with the lowest in the state, and an uninterrupted service, the city can be doubly satisfied with itself.

That, in a nutshell, is the story of Wayne's municipally owned generating plant which, since its construction in 1898 at a cost of \$6,000, has grown to a major enterprise worth between \$350,000 and \$400,000. Present rated capacity is 3,000 K.V.A., with four engines—three using diesel fuel and one converted for dual fuel consumption.

The latest engine was added in 1947 at a cost of about \$115,000. This giant generator was converted to burn natural gas, one year ago, and the conversion has resulted in material savings. Those closely associated with the plant consider the conversion one of the milestones in local generation history.

About 20 years ago, coal fed engines gave way to the diesels. Now, history is repeating itself as more efficient methods of generation are found.

Consumption of electricity has increased 100% in the past 10 years, with each year recording a steady 10 per cent increase.

The peak load to date occurred on the Wednesday before Christmas last year, when a sustained demand of 1220 kw was recorded.

The time of year has a direct bearing on electricity consumption. Ordinarily, in November and December, the upsurge in demand occurs at about 5:45 p.m. Now, at spring's opening, this load occurs at about 7:15.

A sign of the times is reflected in a new "peak area." With the advent of electric cooking, new highs are now being recorded at 11:45 a.m.
