'Operation Portrex'

(The following account is the last to be written aboard the USS Worcester, Mark E. Grammer, Herald editor, has now returned from his experiences in "Operation Portrex.")

We Go Ashore Wet but Wiser

March 8 is "D" day in this big invasion exercise called Portrex. Our invasion forces have been storming the defended Vieques Island, and putting both troops and heavy equipment ashore.

Paratroopers started the landing show this morning when 35 big troop carrier planes filled the air on shore with a following parachute invasion and dropped some 1500 men.

After the sixth wave of landing craft went in with troops, we observers were taken in to see the land action. But it wasn't that easy.

The sea was rough this morning and that made the business of putting guests ashore some problem. But we climbed down the side of the ship on a sea-ladder, or Jacob's ladder, to a small boat.

The ship's side is as high as your house... the ladder is two heavy strands of rope with wood steps between... and the little boat waiting for you is bouncing up and down on 20-ft. waves.

You get down this twisting ladder wearing a cumbersome life preserver, decide to step into the boat and it drops in a trough 10 ft. below you. Then a second later it bops up on a wave and is 10 ft. above your head. So, finally, you shove on about timing and jump in quick when the boat passes you going down.

After a mile ride, and fully soaked in this open boat, we were delivered to the Mt. Olympus, a command ship. There we climbed up the side of the ship (again as high as the Wayne post office) in a cargo net (heavy rope matting).

We walked across the deck, clapped down the other side (P. O. high) into the Admiral's barge, another bouncing boat to us though it has a cabin and gave us a dry ride ashore.

A lovely afternoon was enjoyed by all—bouncing around in a jeep flying a green "PRESS" flag. "I'm sure that jeep driver convinced us of his ability to scale the most impossible terrain—at top speed."

But now we had to return to our ship... tired, hungry, soaked in salt water... skinned skins—but we had lived dangerously! So all guests from three ships were put in a steel LCM (landing craft) one of those things that can be rammed on the shore, the front-end flopping down like the scotch board of a wagon.

The craft bounced and dived; we were on top of the world, then in a deep well of water and waves. All aboard were drenched again and completely! Then we came to the first ship. But our skipper would not put the men off that were scheduled for it—said the risk was too great. A man could be crushed getting onto a heavy steel craft out of a "trap" (1) sea ladder.

Then our ship was passed up for the same reason. So we were all taken on—to the "Big Mo" (Battleship Missouri) which had a steel gangway rigged. Here the executive officer met us, welcomed all drowned rats aboard, extended us the ship's hospitality.

That included: dry clothing, hot chow and a night's lodging. He also offered to send us home, then in a small boat—if we desired. We voted unanimously to get at once—we were wet anyway. A boat was lowered, and we were put in it by a hoisted net.

The Missouri has a large crane on the fan tail (rear). A cargo net was hung on the crane's cable, three men at a time clung to the net. Then the crane swung us out over the big, blue ocean—and lowered us to the bouncing boat below. And we came in—again.

Then we bounced home, climbed up that twisting ladder once more. And by now, I insist the ship's side is as high as our state capitol building. It was a pleasure to "plop" down and kiss the polished teakwood deck of the Worcester. She may roll if she wishes, but she doesn't bounce.

Sign Now for 1950 Conservation Plan, PMA Head Urges

Farmers of Wayne county may now begin signing up for the 1950 conservation program, T. P. Roberts, chairman of Wayne county PMA committee, announced.

Through the proposed program that is offered, Roberts explains, the consumers of the country share the cost of conservation practices, which benefit both the consumer and the producer.

He urges farmers in the county to talk over conservation problems with their local committee men and determine how they can best use the program that is available to them to solve their problems.

Payments are made upon a variety of soil improvements including filling of erosion ditches, construction of erosion dams, subsoiling to permit better penetration of water, and construction of open farm drainage ditches.

Other improvements include the application of superphosphate on leeches or perennial grasses, contouring of farms for livestock watering, standard terracing, and installation of tile drainage.

Mr. Roberts stated that payment on the projects would be 100 per cent for all projects undertaken, and that all interested persons would be ahead to sign for the program as soon as possible.

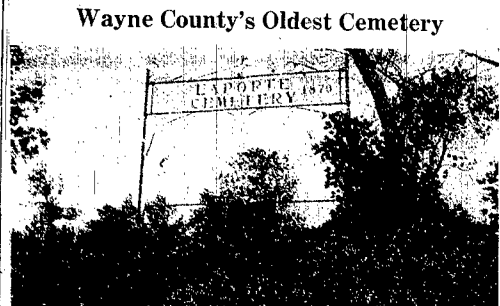

\$1,000 Diamond, 20 Bodies at Old Wayne County Cemetery

LaPorte Cemetery Started in 1870

If you're interested in historical spots, Wayne county has one. It's an 80-year-old cemetery, containing the bodies of some 20 forgotten persons and also the hiding place of a \$1,000 diamond. LaPorte cemetery, located six miles southeast of Wayne, stands as one of the county's landmarks, having been started in 1870 when William Hunter was buried there. Approximately 20 persons were buried there in the period from 1870 to 1910, the time the cemetery was in use. Few stones remain standing due to the weathering process, and the inscriptions on some have become so weather worn, they can no longer be read. Marking of the graves was in some instances neglected entirely because of the difficulty of bringing the stones from Sioux City, West Point or Norfolk. Among the bodies resting in the ancient graveyard are two civil war veterans and a veteran of the War

For those persons more interested in the diamond hunting angle, available information shows

undertaking the job of keeping the grounds in order, had the misfortune to lose the diamond setting from his ring. Subsequent search on the part of all the veterans upon several occasions failed to disclose the valuable diamond. The American Legion officially undertook the task of tending the cemetery grounds in 1937, after informally taking over that duty several years before. Carl Madsen, owner of the diamond, has since passed on, and the diamond has never been found since its loss in 1930.

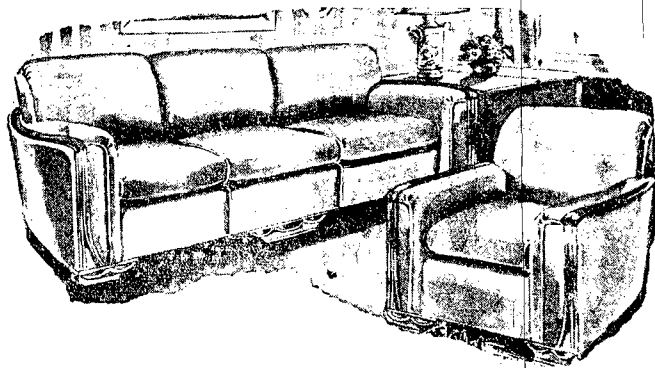

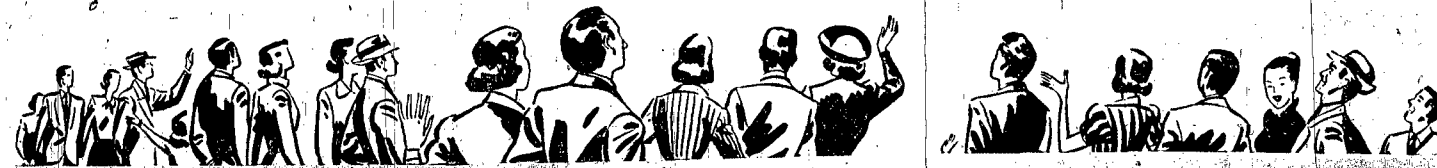
