

Kiwanis Club Hears First-hand Account of European Conditions

English Food Is 'Atrocious'

The food in England is "atrocious." Sweden has neither a shortage of food nor housing. The people of Norway and the Netherlands like the Americans. There are more windmills and wooden shoes in Denmark than in the Netherlands.

Such statements briefly summarized conditions in Europe, as told to Wayne Kiwanians Monday by Gwendolyn Jorgenson, Norfolk. This was Miss Jorgenson's 35th talk since her European travels.

Here are her personal observations:

England—Poor cooks; the food is terrible. Strict rationing has continued since the war hit. England's state medical plan? "They hate it!"

Americans.

Norway—Shortage of food. A single class of hard-working people. "They like the Americans!"

Sweden—No food or housing shortage. Many new buildings. No such things as slums and street urinals.

Denmark—"Everything is thoroughly clean." Children are as well cared-for here as in Sweden.

Netherlands—"Intense hatred of the Germans." The Dutch are very bitter, and have many reasons to be so; Jewish homes were destroyed during the war, many reprisals and starvings. 125 children were shot down in the street at one time with a German machine gun.

The Dutch are exporting their best, and making a surprising recovery. They have the "greatest admiration" for the Americans, and are deeply grateful for Red Cross packages.

Germany—Vast destruction of whole cities. Rebuilding is slow. Miss Jorgenson emphasized the

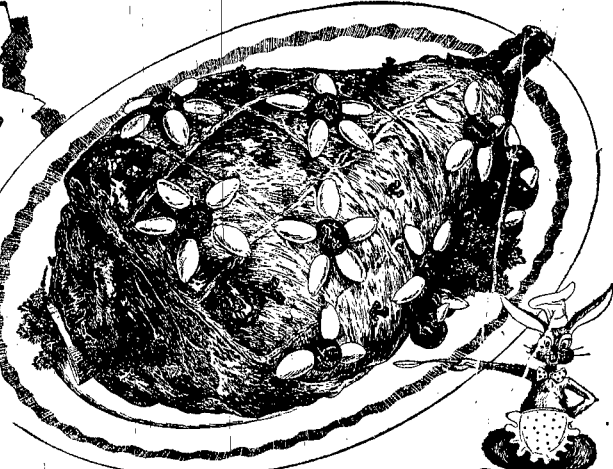

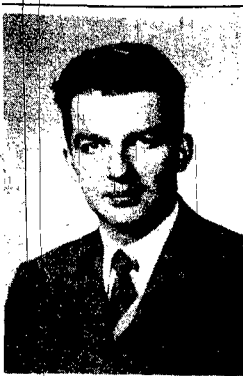

"Since coming to Wayne I've been having quite a time becoming adjusted to hills without trees on them," admitted Arthur Tingley, supervisor of seventh, eighth and ninth grades at the campus high school. He clarified this by explaining that in Wisconsin one is used to hills, but

that in most cases they are heavily forested.

Mr. Tingley completed his Bachelor of Education degree work at White Water State Teachers college and taught in junior high school before entering the armed service.

The next three years of his time was spent with the 44th Infantry Division during which period he gained a great deal of first hand information of Europe.

Upon returning to civilian life Mr. Tingley again took up the teaching profession and worked on his M.S. degree, receiving it in the first part of this year from the University of Wisconsin. He came to Wayne and took up his present duties immediately thereafter.

Guidance work is a field that Mr. Tingley has spent time on and one that he is especially interested in. The campus school is instituting a program of record keeping for each student that will enable the student as well as instructors to see what type of work the pupil has been doing in the past. Details of this program are being worked on by Mr. Tingley.

He enjoys working with students of the junior high level. Part of this he attributes to the fact that they are much more free in speaking their minds without fear of consequences, and because of this frankness, the teacher-student relationships are much more personal.

More men are being drawn into the field of junior high teaching, and still more will enter, he believes, as soon as salaries are sufficient to warrant the change. Even now many school systems consider junior high schools as secondary schools.

Wayne State's system of "living student teachers actual practice in teaching has the advantage of putting the student teacher under two supervisors during his term of actual practice. Mr. Tingley believes that because of this the student will have a check on himself from two different sources.

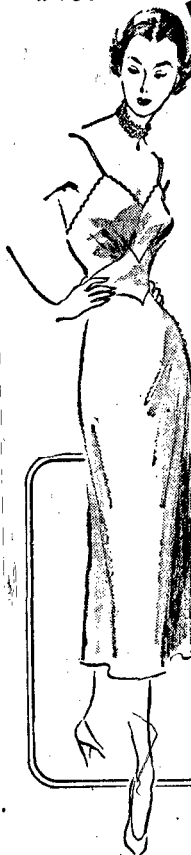

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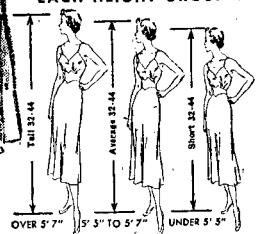
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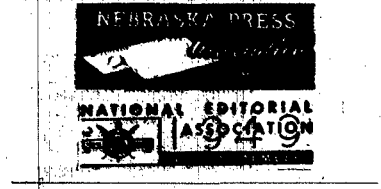

Five-minute Action

It's next to impossible for a public servant to please all of the people all of the time.
 But your Wayne councilmen came pretty close to it last week when they voted to close the city trailer camp, and also to hire an engineer to survey the city's street lighting.
 The need for those actions has long been voiced by a large majority of Wayne citizens.
 Regarding the trailer decision, a recent letter from the federal government was read to the councilmen telling them the trailers were now wholly in their laps. Five minutes later, the closing date of June 1 was unanimously voted into the record—proving that authority plus public demand equals quick action.
 Now of concern are the problems of housing for those still living there, and of the best means of ridding the city permanently of the infamous "five traps."

The government packs its surplus potatoes in brand-new sacks instead of available used ones. This practice resulted in a \$600,000 loss last year.

Looking at the Dry Years

Senator Hugh Butler has introduced a bill in the Senate providing for loans by the Commodity Credit Corporation of corn to farmers who have suffered failures of their corn crops.
 The bill incorporates the principal provisions of the "Butler Corn Loan Plan" which has been widely discussed in the state, particularly during the drought years.
 The bill would provide for such loans only for the purpose of seed and feed for carrying necessary livestock and poultry through until the next year's crop. It would not permit the corn to be used for commercial feeding.
 The loans would have to be repaid to the government, bushel for bushel, out of the next crop.
 In his address to the Senate explaining the bill, Senator Butler pointed out that it would involve no cost to the government. "In fact," he said, "the government would save storage costs on the corn and would receive repayment in new corn a year later."
 "During the dry years," the Senator declared, "many farmers were forced to leave their farms because they did not have enough corn to carry their stock through the winter. We could have kept these people on the farm with my corn loan plan."
 According to the Hoover Commission, \$7,000,000 could be saved if the Army, Navy and Air Force could agree on uniform underwear for their personnel.

Congressman Carl Stefan has been presented petitions signed by more than 5,000 Nebraskans urging enactment of legislation embodying recommendations of the Hoover Commission of government reorganization.
 The presentation was made by Norris Swan of Hastings, chairman of the Nebraska Junior Chamber of Commerce committee for study of the Hoover Commission report.
