Five minutes later, the closing date of Jule 1 was upanimously voted into the recoid— proving that suthority plus public demand equals quick action. Now of concern are the problems of housing for those still jiving there, and of the best means of ridding the city perma-nently of the infamous 'fire traps."

Looking at the Dry Years

Senator Hugh Butler has introduced a bill in the Senate providing for loans by the Commodity Credit Corporation of corn to farmers who have suffered failures of their corn crons

farmers who have suffered failures of their corn crops. The bill incorporates the principal pro-visions of the "Butler Corn Loan Plan" which has been widely discussed in the state, particularly during the drouth years. The bill would provide for such loans only for the purpose of seed and feed for carrying necessary livestock and pealtry through until the next year's crog. It would not permit the corn to be used for commer-cial feeding.

cial feeding. The loans would have to be repaid to the government, bushel for bushel, out of the

In his address to the Senate explaining the bill, Senator Butler pointed out that it would involve no cost to the government. "In fact," he said, "the government would save storage costs on the corn and would "receive repayment in new corn a year later."

later," "During the dry years," the Senator de-elared, "many farmers were forced to leave their farms because they did not have enough corn to carry their stock through the winter. We could have kept these people on the farm with my corn loan plan."


