New Cream Grading Program

Nebraska's new four-day cream grading program, to become effective May 1, will cause numerous changes in the marketing of the state's butterfat.

Under the statute a farmer must sell his cream at least once in Each four-day period to insure first-grade price for his product. This law effects all Nebraska farmers wholsell cream.

The program has as its objective the im-provement in quality of cream used for but-ter manufacture. Basic provisions are as

provement in quality of cream used for but-fer manufacture. Basic provisions are as follows: On the first delivery of cream, and each delivery thereafter, the cream buyer must attach a four-day tag to each patron's empty container. This tag will bear the patron's name, date of delivery and buyer's identification stamp. The law reads. 'New producers cannot be paid for number one cream on their first delivery.' Thus local buyers will begin tagging about 10 days before the law be-comes effective. The law says that "the differential be-tween first grade cream and second grade cream shall not be less than five cents per pound of butterfat.'' Since the general quality of Nebraska cream and butter has not been on par with the products of many states, with a result-ant price penality on the competitive mar-ket, state officials believe that the new marketing regulations will be a definite aid to both the producer and consumer.
