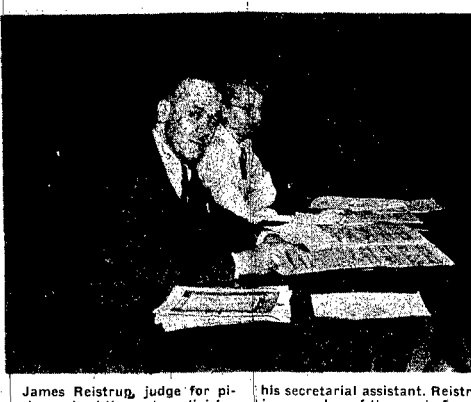

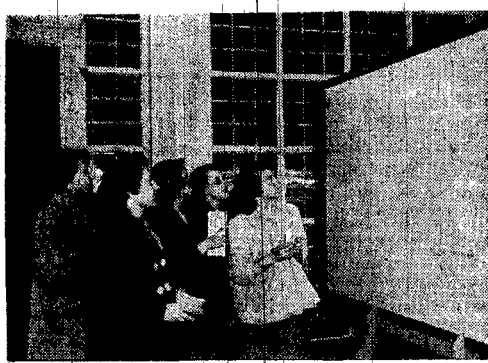

Psychiatrist Speaks Of European Problem At WSTC Convocation

Dr. Beryl D. Orris, noted Chicago psychiatrist, spoke to Wayne State convocation Tuesday on "Where Do We Go from Here?"

Dr. Orris said that the rehabilitation program in Europe is designed to straighten out political delinquents and to foster the young people, not to live by and for themselves, but to live for the world.

He pointed out the three real sources through which Europeans become acquainted with Americans are American films, American tourists and the information program in Europe is designed to straighten out political delinquents and to foster the young people, not to live by and for themselves, but to live for the world.

The psychiatrist stated that everyone in America is anti-something, but that no one is pro-something. The same defeatist attitude was found everywhere before the last two wars.

Cynical, Disappointed

The young people of Europe are cynical, disappointed young people, the speaker said. They are looking for stability to build the future. On that side they may choose totalitarianism, which includes communism, nazism, fascism. On the other side they find democracy.

"In determining a better future, each of us must know where we are and know where we want to go," stated Dr. Orris. "From this standpoint, all human beings should be able to work toward one goal."

The week in which Jan. 12 falls will always call forth discussion of blizzards in Nebraska, for it was on Jan. 12, 1888, that what was probably the state's most devastating single storm struck the people of Nebraska. There are some who claim that the Easter storm of 1873 was more severe, and others who talk about the great storm of March, 1913, but the veterans of '88 are able to hold their own against all comers—except possibly the veterans of '49.

Last winter brought Nebraskans the most prolonged battle with the elements in the history of the state.

To refresh your memory, the first storm hit Nov. 19. There was a great deal of snow between then

Firemen Answer Apartment Call

Wayne firemen responded to a call at 320 Lincoln street Wednesday afternoon to extinguish a blaze that originated in the furnace room of the Seymour apartments.

Dense smoke issuing from the basement led to the discovery of the small blaze which was quickly extinguished.

State and local highway crews, working valiantly to open lines of communication, found that no sooner had they got a stretch of road open than it was closed again by drifting or by fresh snow.

Trains all the way from the crack streamers to the office-a-week locs were stalled in the blizzard drifts. For days in many areas the only effective transportation was through the air, and Nebraska's many small-plane pilots rendered heroic service to their fellow men.

The Nebraska National Guard was called out and volunteers worked round the clock in an effort to liberate trapped livestock, homes, and even whole communities. But the job was too big for Nebraska and other western states alone, and on Jan. 28 Maj. Gen. Lewis A. Pick was named to direct one of the Army's most extensive peacetime rescue operations—Operation Snowbound.

The bulldozers and the weasels of the Fifth Army moved in, and during 23 days of operation opened 27,073 miles of road, liberated 152,196 persons from snafu-bound homes, took 35 sick persons out to receive medical care and hospitalization, and gave over 3,500,000 head of livestock access to feed.

County Retail Sales Jump 270% in 9 Years

'39-'48 Census Release Shows County Employment Near Double

1948 Retail Sales Total \$8.5 Million

Retail, wholesale, and service establishments located in Wayne county showed a substantial expansion in dollar volume of trade from 1939 to 1948, according to preliminary figures from the 1948 Census of Business just now released by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Retail sales in the county during 1948 totaled a big \$8.5 million, an increase of 270 per cent over the \$2.3 million in 1939, when the preceding Census of Business was taken.

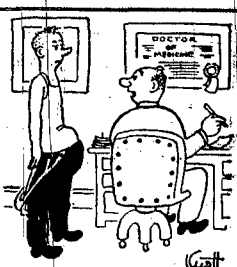
Wholesale sales in the county reached a total of \$4 million in 1948 as compared with less than one million in 1939. The service trades included in the census reported receipts totaling \$310,000 in 1948, compared with \$112,000 in 1939.

Employment Up
Employment in the county also rose over the nine-year period between 1939 and 1948 for the above trades. Establishments in those trades reported a combined total of 446 paid employees for the week ended nearest Nov. 15, 1948. This compared with a total of 288 employees reported nine years before.

These preliminary figures have been derived from a census report on Wayne county, which also includes data for the city of Wayne. Final figures, superseding the preliminary data for the county, will be included in a bulletin for Nebraska to be issued in several months.

The above figures from the 1948 Census of Business were released for publication just last week.

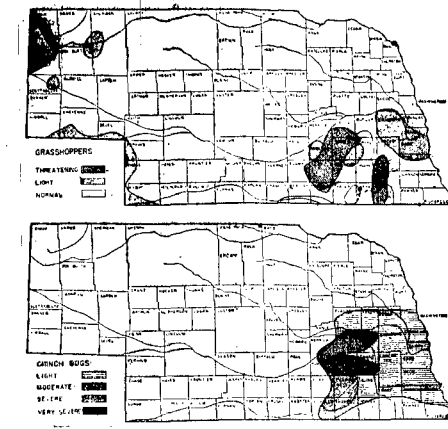

'Hoppers, Chinch Bugs Coming



These maps show the extent of expected grasshopper and chinch bug infestation in Nebraska during 1950. Degree of likely infestation was determined by University of Nebraska and U. S. Department of Agriculture entomologists and county agricultural agents from field surveys last fall. In top photo "threatening" classification means seven to 14 grasshoppers per square yard throughout the field. There is danger of spring damage and

general damage to late maturing crops. Light infestation means none to three per square yard with no general damage expected. For chinch bugs "very severe" means that more than 2,000 of the pests were counted per square foot last fall in bunch grass where they over-winter. Other classifications: Severe—1,000 to 2,000 per square foot; moderate—500 to 1,000; and light—200 and 500 per square foot.

No. 44 in a Series— KNOW YOUR FACULTY

This column features a short story each week on one of the faculty members of Wayne State Teachers college, in the hope that townspeople and college instructors may become better acquainted.



Dr. J. R. Johnson

Students long remember J. R. Johnson, genial history professor at Wayne State Teachers college. Practicing what he teaches in that every man has a philosophy and is a philosopher in his own way. Professor Johnson lives an individualized life. He explained that in many instances teachers and instructors are placed in a separate category because of their profession, and because of this are expected to assume a certain role. A person thus loses his individuality and identity in becoming just another teacher.

Part of Dr. Johnson's philosophy may be traced to his start in Indiana where the coal mines were the chief livelihood of the residents. From eighth grade through high school and college he earned his own way, part of the time being spent in the mines.

Before earning his A.B. from

the University of Nebraska, he attended the Indiana Business college at Vincennes, Ind.

Teaching, coaching and supervising were interspersed between summer sessions while Dr. Johnson worked on his masters and doctors degrees. While doing graduate work at Nebraska he was assistant in the history department.

Practical work in instructing in public schools occupied 12 years of his life, during which period he coached both boys and girls basketball teams, served as superintendent of schools for nine years and one year as dean of Norfolk's Junior college.

Since coming to Wayne in 1935 Dr. Johnson has instructed in history and political science. Fifteen months of this period were devoted to an intensive training of Air Cadets stationed at the Wayne college. Dr. Johnson was asked to submit his methods, techniques and materials used during this period after a testing program. Showed the cadets instructed at Wayne were advanced further than were those of other colleges participating in the program.

In comparing the quality of work achieved by the students in service during the war and the students today, he believes that overall work was superior to what is accomplished now. Part of this was due to the fact that practical application may have been stressed more than now.

The liberal arts program that was inaugurated at the four Nebraska Teachers colleges last year is a definite step in the right direction," Professor Johnson stated. "Stressing of subject matter so that the student who intends to teach is able to put the subject across is beneficial."

On other matters Dr. Johnson

is just as avid. As a spectator sports fan he chooses hockey as number one, with football a close second. Hobbies are to Dr. Johnson, "a lot of things a man can't have the time nor money to do," but collecting maps and "messing" around with old ballads are two pastimes he lays claim to as a pleasant passing of time.

Thus a lecture of the past to present finds life enjoyable by taking an active part in community life while maintaining his identity entirely his own.

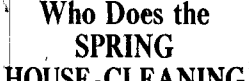

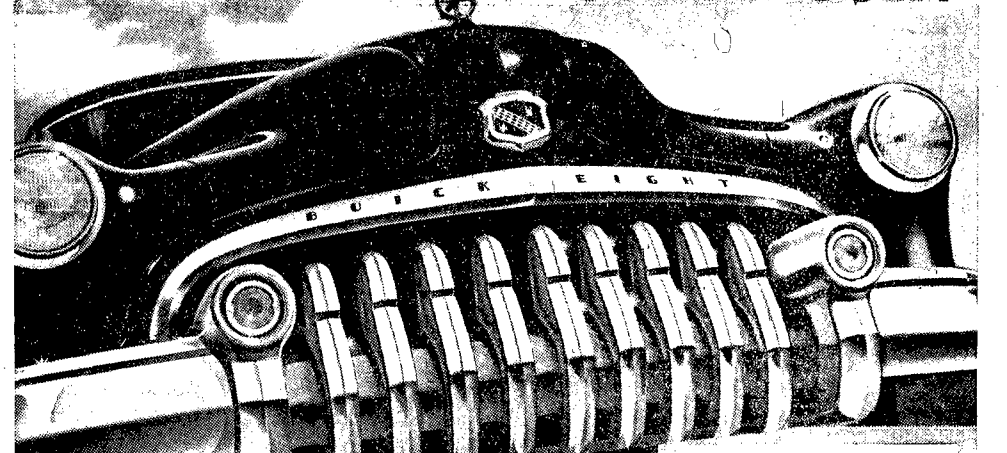

Wayne Inventors Build Mail Box and Shelf Bracket

Mail Carrier Al Bahe Invents Swing-Type Rural Mail Box

Slides Out of Way When Not in Use

After eight years of travelling a rural mail route out of Wayne, Al Bahe finally decided to do something about the inconveniences that often confronted himself and other mail carriers.

Answer to the problems is his adjustable rural mail box support. Mounted on a regular post, it is hinged so that it may swing in either direction and come back to its regular position by means of a spring.

To eliminate the necessity of having to reach further out of the window or get out of the mail vehicle, grooves allow the box to be slid forward and back on the support arm.

"The box support is built to all specifications demanded by government regulations, and will serve both the farmer and the mail carrier better than the old type," explained the inventor.

"Buggy Days Over" "The horse and buggy days are over—this type of box will give the farmer better and longer use since

it won't be broken by passing vehicles."

Production of the mail box support is not in actual operation yet, but Mr. Bahe hopes to have them on the market by the middle of May.

Mr. Bahe came to Wayne in March of 1942 to take over a rural mail route. He served as postmaster in Ohio for 11 years before that time.

Hall, Sorenson Produce New Type Bracket

An idea for a simple shelf bracket by a Wayne business man seems to have been the beginning for a new manufacturing industry. The "fool proof" iron shelf support is already nationally advertised, and has been distributed to almost a dozen states.

Inventor is Wilbur Hall. Partner is Clarence Sorenson.

"Bracket trouble, especially with ones that are used in greenhouses, have long been a nuisance of greenhouse operators," Hall says.

The inventor, owner of the Wayne Greenhouses long encountered trouble with slipping and unsteady brackets. Sometimes they would break, causing considerable loss.

A Good One Hall's new bracket has all the requisites of an invention that make it a good one—simple, sturdier and longer lasting. Through meeting his own needs with the bracket, that did away with trouble, he was ready to embark upon a larger scale venture.

This meant to supply other growers with his invention. Clarence Sorenson is the other half of the team that entered into the picture to produce the brackets. Patents were applied for and actual production started at the Sorenson Radiator and Welding Shop.

The brackets are made to fit on upright pipes and are simply slipped on. Placing of planks of shelves on them adds to the job of keeping them in place.

In 4 Sizes The brackets are made in four different sizes to fit simple, standard and longer lasting. Through meeting his own needs with the bracket, that did away with trouble, he was ready to embark upon a larger scale venture.

Since starting manufacture of the brackets, Sorenson has shipped orders to approximately a dozen states.

Making the brackets is relatively simple and requires no great amount of labor. As an increase in demand for the invention arises, Sorenson stands ready with plans for large-scale bracket production.

Possibilities for using the bracket principle in other ways are to be investigated at a future date by the partners say, "when the business that is now underway is settled down to a smooth running project."

The new firm is known as the H and S Manufacturing company.
