How to Finance Library Work

What will the library use for money now? How can the board complete the job?

Those problems now face the library board of Wayne, and the new addition and repairs to the city library will soon be roughly closed in as the funds run out. The bond issue of \$20,000 voted May 10, 1949, for improvements have proved inadequate for the repairs now being necessary.

So to complete the job (if possible), to finish the interior of the new addition, paint it, finish the basement and add a little necessary furniture, the board needs another \$6,000 or more.

Mrs. M. A. Miller, librarian, said today that the library board plans a meeting this week, with interested citizens welcome, to try evolving a plan for financing the work to completion. The bond issue when voted was barely adequate for the building.

Members of the Wayne National Guard "threw everything they had into the battle with the flood and hung on tight."

The guard unit from Wayne was called into the South Sioux City flood area Monday evening to assist in flood operations. According to information from South Sioux City, they worked continuously without any sleep under emergency conditions until people were evacuated from the area.

About 34 men from the 568th Field Artillery Battalion at Wayne responded to the call. They were headed by Capt. R. C. Nelson, company commander.

Headquarters were set up in the council chambers of the city hall at South Sioux City and an emergency communication system was immediately established. Working in three shifts, the men worked along the dike and the city hall.

From then on it was just plain "killing" work.

As the situation grew worse and manpower was needed more desperately on the dikes, Capt. Nelson squeezed his own day of work along the dike early Tuesday morning. They stood shoulder to shoulder with the civilians that were left, in a desperate effort to keep out the river.

When the dike broke the men were immediately revamped into emergency units and started moving civilians and stock trapped by the water.

Guard members were working in an area about five miles wide and eight miles long, affecting the entire western end of South Sioux City on the up-river side.

3 Traffic Accidents in Area Past 4 Days

Three traffic accidents were reported in the Wayne vicinity within the last four days. All were investigated by Sheriff Hans Tietgen.

Russell McVintie, 27, who is employed at Winside, suffered arm and shoulder bruises, and his car was demolished, when he went into a ditch one and three-quarters miles west of the "four-mile corner."

He was driving west when he came to the bridge. The car slid across the bridge with three wheels on and one off, then hit the edge of the bridge and went over into the ditch.

## School Work Carries on at Peru Teachers

Dr. V. Morey There Following Tragedy "When I arrived in Peru Tuesday afternoon, a sense of numbness seemed to have settled over the entire group there," said Dr. Victor P. Morey, president of Wayne State.

Dr. Morey was in Lincoln Tuesday at the office of the State Board of Education when the telephone call bringing news of the tragic murders and suicide at Peru State Teachers college came to Albin Larson, board secretary. Wayne State's president accompanied Mr. Larson to Peru.

"It was my impression that the authorities there, together with State Board President Hyde Sweet of Nebraska City, found the proper approach to the tense situation in an efficient manner," Morey stated. "Information was given to the public immediately, and an organization for carrying on the college work set up at once."

President Sweet-appointed R. A. Quelle, dean of the college at Peru, to an honorary post as acting president. Class work was under way again Wednesday morning, according to Ralph Carhart of Wayne, member of the state board.

The college tragedy occurred Tuesday at 11:15 a.m., when B. K. Baker, 54, psychology professor, shot and killed Col. Harold G. Williams, 49, and Paul C. Maxwell, 36, head of the department of education. Baker shot both men in their offices, then walked to his home and killed himself with the same revolver.

Funeral services had not been announced as the Herald went to press Wednesday. Mr. Carhart stated that he and Dr. Morey would attend the funeral rites at Peru. A board of education meeting will be held in Peru after the services to discuss Peru State faculty organization, he said.

The day's program was filled with vocational group meetings, conferences, panel discussions and talks given at a general meeting.

Out-of-town speakers included Don Twiford of Lincoln, state supervisor of guidance, Dr. Allen Burkhardt, Gwendolyn Jorgenson, Walter Steffen and Sgt. Forrest Delaney, all of Norfolk. Lowell Welsh of the Millard Trade school, Mrs. Waldo Rodene of Wakefield and Mrs. Clarence Wait of Doane college, Crete.

Also participating were members of the Wayne State college faculty and business men from Wayne.

## Hold Services at Wisner for Dr. James McGuire, 35

Wisner - Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at St. Joseph's Catholic church in Wisner for Dr. James McGuire, 35, who died Saturday in Denver.

Dr. McGuire was a member of the well-known McGuire family of Wisner. He was a son of the late Richard S. McGuire and Mrs. McGuire, who were the parents of 16 children. Fifteen of the McGuire children were graduated from Wisner high school. One child died in infancy.

Dr. McGuire died at St. Joseph's hospital, Denver, early Saturday morning. He had been taken to the hospital suffering from virus pneumonia Wednesday.

A week ago Dr. McGuire was a speaker at a medical convention at Omaha. He contracted pneumonia shortly after his return to Denver.

He was a dermatologist and had practiced in Denver several years. He served in the army medical department during World War II.

Dr. McGuire is survived by his wife, Rita; two sons, Timothy and Michael; his mother, Mrs. Richard McGuire of Wisner; and ten brothers and three sisters. Another brother, Elugh, was drowned while a student at Notre Dame University.

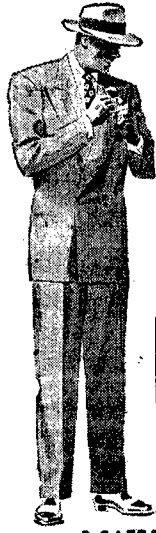

# Wayne Firemen Make 4 Calls Tuesday A.M. 7 Trucks Called to Gerhardt Grimm Blaze

## Blaze Destroys Livestock, Barn; Threatens Gas Tank

Everything from a serious farm fire to a false alarm joined in to give Wayne firemen a sleepless Tuesday night.

Seven fire trucks from six towns "ganged up" at the Gerhardt Grimm farm, nine miles south and two miles west of Wayne, about 1 a.m. Tuesday morning.

A fire started in the hog house of the Grimm place, a 60-mile-an-hour wind sweeping the flames the length of a football field.

The blaze destroyed two hog houses, a barn and a hay stack, and threatened to ignite a partially filled gas tank.

Also lost were 16 brood sows, 80 pigs, 7 calves, 300 chickens, 16 tons of baled hay, wagon and hay rack.

The loss, estimated at \$4,000 on personal property and \$3,500 on buildings, was partially covered by insurance.

Trucks from Pilsner and Winside were called first, and then calls went to Wayne, Wisner, Beemer and Stanton. Wayne sent two trucks, including the new truck just purchased by the rural fire district.

**Second Fire Call**  
The second fire at about 3:30 a.m. Tuesday had firemen, coming from the rural area south of Wayne in an effort to find the fire. Wind on the rural telephone lines made it difficult for the operator to exactly locate the call for help.

Finally, a more accurate report brought them to the Fred Anderson farm, 2 miles south and 1/2 west of Wayne. This was a field fire, causing moderate damage.

**Still at First Fire**  
One truck was still at the Grimm farm when the second alarm was sounded.

At 3:45 a.m., there was a rubbish fire on the Chris Tietgen property at the west end of second street. No damage was reported.

And still there was no rest for the firemen.  
At 8:30 a.m., a passerby noted smoke from a chimney at the old Boyd Hotel on Main street, and the fire trucks again went racing to the scene.

Investigation showed that Oscar Peterson who uses the premises to sell seed corn, had started a fire in the stove to warm the place.

## Average Teacher In Nebraska Gets Salary of \$2,057

A study of the salaries of Nebraska school teachers recently completed by the Nebraska State Education Association shows that Nebraska's school teachers are being paid an average salary of \$2,057 for 1949-50.

A total of 11,503 teachers and superintendents was included in the study.

The pay checks of high school teachers will average \$2,883 this year.

"There seems to be little relation between salaries paid classroom teachers and the size of the school in which they teach," Neal S. Gorman, director of the study, reported.

A wide gap in payment to elementary teachers as compared to high school teachers still exists in spite of the shortage of qualified teachers in the grade schools. Elementary teachers' salaries average \$2,085 in 1949-50, an increase of 3.4 per cent over the previous year.

The rural school teacher ranks the lowest with an average salary of \$1,683, which represents an increase of 4.3 per cent over last year.

Superintendents and principals received the smallest increase in salary, the survey showed.

## Withdraws from Commissioner Race

John Redel, Winside, who filed recently for county commissioner from the third district, withdrew his filing this week.

There is one other filing for the position, that of Elmer Monk of Winside.

William J. Misfeldt had been commissioner from the third district. When he resigned recently to manage a Winside lumber company, Oliver Reichert was appointed to fill out the term.

## Quit Feeding Hungry Gullies

Do you have a gully on your farm that has been eating away good soil, and that each year gets larger and deeper?

When these waterways get down to the clay subsoil it doesn't take long for them to become mean gullies and perhaps hazardous to farming operations.

Most gullies can be stopped easily at their beginning. They begin at the lower end of a natural waterway and keep eating.

These scars, in the beginning stages, are very easily healed. It is the large, wide and deep gullies that create a real problem. But catching them in the early stages prevents such a problem.

Good grassed waterways will kill these hungry gullies in a great many places. A good grassed waterway keeps the run-off water from your land under control and does not permit it to rush down the hill and tear across the bottom lands taking the good soil along with it.

Here are some recommended steps in making a good grass waterway:

Fill in the bare waterway with disk, plow or grader blade, leaving a broad basin-shaped waterway 25 or 30 feet wide, or wider, depending on the acreage drained by the waterway.

Then pack the soil well with rubber-tired tractor or soil packer.

A good covering of manure is valuable in the preparation of

the waterway. Work the manure into the soil with a disk.

Seed with Bromegrass at a heavier rate per acre than on hill-sides or pasture land as this can be planted somewhat thicker in a waterway. Many seed approximately 1 lb. to 50 feet of waterway at 30 feet wide.

The seed needs to be packed in extra well. A light coat of mulch is a great help in getting a good catch.

These are general recommendations that have been practiced with a high degree of success. The idea is to establish a system for getting run off water down to the lowest level, or point, under control and without damage to the soil.

This work should be done in April or in September.

## Ex-Waynite Engineer At Grand Island

E. J. Hunter, Grand Island, former Wayne State college faculty member, is now assistant to the post engineer at the Grand Island ordnance plant.

Hunter described his new work in a letter to Martin Ringer. He is in charge of all maintenance and building plans and has all the records of the physical plant. The army is activating Line One at the ordnance plant as a rocket loading plant.

Hunter is also keeping up the architectural business that he established in Grand Island when he left Wayne several years ago.

degree from Texas Wesleyan college and her MA degree from Colorado State College of Education in Greeley. She teaches methods and activities courses in the college here.

Before coming to Wayne State, Miss Smart taught in Texas and Colorado. While obtaining her latter degree, she also worked as assistant director of the community activity program in Greeley. The recreational work had a three-way aspect, college, town school and rural school work. The program was set up to furnish and to help the town with physical educational work.

The college instructor's hometown is Lamesta, Tex. Her parents reside there. Miss Smart stressed the importance of the teacher's knowing her students on their basis. The student-teacher relationship is a pertinent factor for successful teaching. Miss Smart said that all children have their own activity programs. She pointed out the need that these activities be carried on over into the school.

Miss Smart likes square dancing both for teaching and for herself. She enjoys this type of exercise. She prefers teaching college students, even though her employment extends to other levels.

Up to the Parents

That statement comes from Capt. C. J. Sanders of the Nebraska Safety Patrol.

The Patrol urges parents to impress the following rules on their children:

- 1. Remember—the streets are for cars—not scooters, tricycles or play.
2. Cross the street only at the corner. Look both ways, then for turning traffic, and cross only when the way is clear.
3. Never forget that bicycles are subject to the same rules and regulations governing automobiles, including the careful observation of signs and signals.

With about 2,300 children between the ages of 5 and 15 alone being killed in traffic accidents each year, Captain Sanders says, "it's time we quit laying the blame exclusively on the shoulders of the motorist, the child's immaturity and Fate. Parents must know that they are involved as deeply in this problem as anyone."

The pity of it is that under our present system of big government and big spending the average citizen seems to utterly fail to realize that he is picking up the check.

Uncle Sam's Payroll

It has been estimated that nearly six million civilians—about one-tenth of all persons employed in the United States—depend upon some form of government activity for their livelihood.

People in 21 states get more money from federal, state and local governments than they receive from industrial payrolls.

In 15 other states, government payments are more than half as great as the wages paid by manufacturers.

Besides the six million persons directly affected by government payrolls, other millions receive price support and conservation payments, pensions, relief payments and other forms of government aid.
