Where Do You Live from Wayne?

A lesson was learned concerning fire calls last week. Wayne firemen did some costly hide-and-seek maneuvers in trying to locate a farm fire—all because of an error in instructions.

Loss of even a minute can be quite extravagant when a fire is raging.

When you consider the distance of your farm from Wayne, do you figure from the center of Wayne, from the city limits, or from the Wayne section line?

For the sake of uniformity, all mileages should be figured from the intersection of Main and Seventh streets, at Highway 98, whether you live north, east, south or west.

Take a minute, now, to figure the exact distance of your farm from that Wayne corner. Remember it! It may mean a lot in case of fire.
