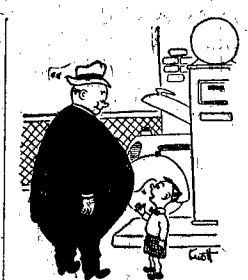
Cramer talked on the weekly newspaper business.

Former Wayne Teacher to Leave U of N

May Make Her Home in Wayne

An Interview by Adele Gramer Student-University of Nebraska

Everyone in Wayne remembers Elsie Ford Piper as a friend. They remember her as chairman of the Latin department at Wayne State and as the first preceptress of the former girls' dormitory, known then as Terrace Hall.

But she is best remembered as that well-groomed, attractive young lady who did so much to give help and counsel to girls at Wayne State from 1910 to 1925.

And does she remember Wayne? "I shall never forget my arrival there," Miss Piper says.

That hot, dusty road up Main street from the station to the college on the hill seemed five miles long. Then on frequent occasions after that, my galoshes were continually getting stuck—and pulling off—in the deep mud of that same street.

Since 1925 Miss Piper has been on the staff of the University of Nebraska. She has decided to retire with the end of the current school year and that announcement is made this week. But her memory is rich with achievement, rich with experience.

Those who attended Wayne State before 1925 knew her well. Most of us who have been there since have often heard of her. And here at the University of Lincoln—all the girls know "Elsie Ford."

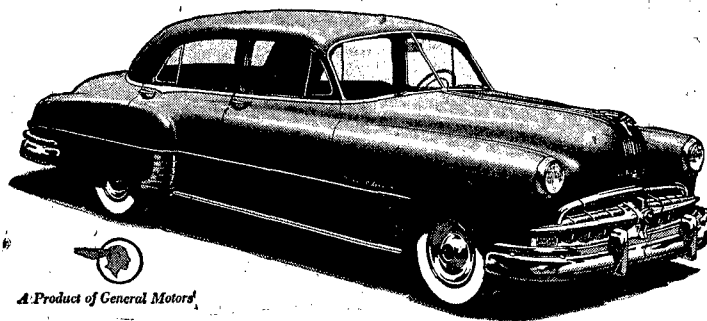
