Henyan Death Recalls Man's Racing Career

Former Waynite Was Also a Flyer
Paul J. Henyan, 59, whose death April 25 was reported in The Herald last week, was a pioneer automobile race driver.

Henyan lived in Wayne with his family in the early 1900's. His automobile racing began when he moved east. He drove with Barney Oldfield for a number of years.

Relatives here also recall stories of his learning to fly at the time of World War I. On one flight he gained altitude too quickly; air pressure burst his ear drums, thus curtailed his flying.

Henyan had gone to his hotel room at Bloomsburg, Pa., in early evening and left a morning call with the hotel clerk, April 25. When the night clerk failed to rouse Henyan, he went to the room and knocked. He summoned aid, broke into the room and found the body. A physician who was called said death had occurred around midnight and was due to cerebral hemorrhage.

Sherbahn Yards Could 'Bake' 400,000 Bricks in 3 Weeks

Wayne Firm Shut Down in 1916

Talk of the manufacturing industries that are present in Wayne today might well lead to the question: "What manufacturing was going on in Wayne years ago?"

One thriving industry in Wayne 50 years ago was that of brick making. Two yards were in operation for a number of years supplying Wayne and surrounding territory with building brick.

John F. Sherbahn established one yard on south Main street where the Logan Valley Nurseries are now located. John Lewis started and managed the other business in Pioneer Wayne.

The Sherbahn Brick Yard employed a total of 20 men for the season, which started in early April and ran through October. Charles Biese, employed in the plant for seven years, recalls the operation of brick making as one which required a busby body and the knowledge of several jobs required in brick making.

He recalls that the entire process of brick making covered a period of slightly over three weeks.

Clay was dug from the pit and taken in cars up to where it was pressed into the proper size. Bricks were taken into the kiln where they were built up, tier on tier, to a height of approximately 12 feet.

400,000 Bricks

The burning of the bricks in the kiln required about three weeks time. More than 400,000 bricks could be burned in the single kiln at one time at the Sherbahn yards.

This represented a capacity output of approximately 50,000 bricks per day.

Clearing the kiln in preparation for the next batch of bricks consisted of loading them on to wagons and hauling them to the railroad for loading. Frequent train service to surrounding towns solved the problem of transportation.

Used in City School

Bricks that were made by the Sherbahn plant were used in the construction of the Wayne Ice and Cold Storage building and the inside walls of the Wayne city school, as well as other business places.

Competition from other brick-yards caused the shut-down of the Sherbahn yard in 1916, and the dismantling of the kiln several years later.

Only remaining evidence of one of Wayne's first industries is the pit that is on the west side of Highway 15 on South Main street.
