Nebraska Highway Accidents Up; 85% Caused by Carelessness

State Patrolman Urges Increased Safety Education

More people have met their deaths on Nebraska highways in the first five months of 1950 than during all of 1949. Thirteen have been killed on northeast Nebraska roads alone, compared to only one for last year.

That startling information was just one part of a message to Waynites Tuesday concerning this state's traffic accidents. (May is being observed as safety month across the nation.) The highway story was told to Kiwanians by Sgt. Harry Brl, education director of the Nebraska State Safety Patrol.

Sgt. Brl said that throughout the nation one person is injured in auto accidents every second, that one is killed every 5 to 6 minutes.

The patrolman said that there is a great need for more safety education and that such education starts in the home. He placed the blame, and the opportunity for greater safety, squarely upon the shoulders of each individual driver.

Brl emphasized the increasing amount of traffic on Nebraska's highways, especially on highway number 30.

Yet, he said that most accidents are not caused by such elements as poor road conditions, weather, poor cars, or even teen-age drivers.

He placed the "why" of accidents on plain simple "carelessness."

In fact, he said that 85% of all accidents are caused by such "human failures" as:

1. Unconcentrated speed. (Brl said that at 60 miles per hour it takes a distance of 66 feet before a driver can even put his foot on the brake.)
2. Inattention, sleeping at the wheel.
3. Drunk driving. He called a drinking driver a "potential murderer."

A film at the end of the program further emphasized the effects of alcohol. It showed that three or four ordinary cocktails can destroy a driver's reaction enough to cause a serious accident.

"If you drive, don't drink; if you drink, don't drive!" was the lesson brought vividly home to the Waynites.
