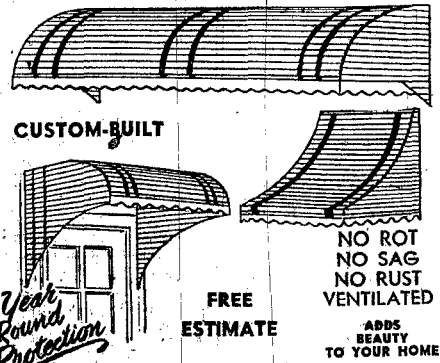

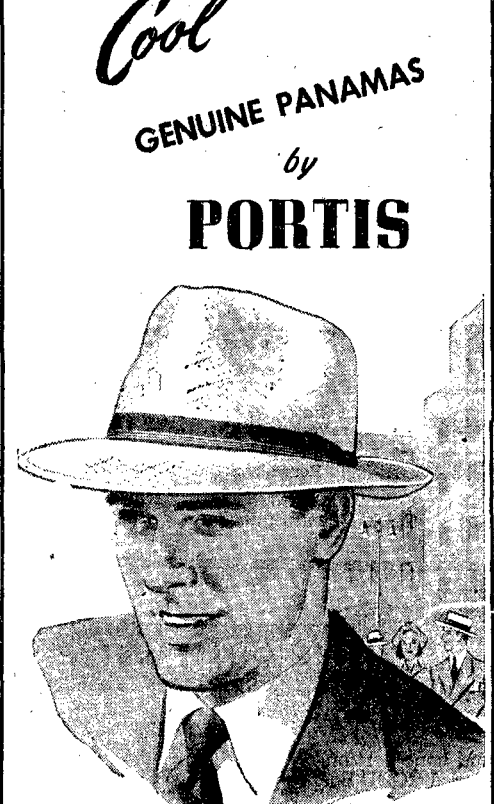

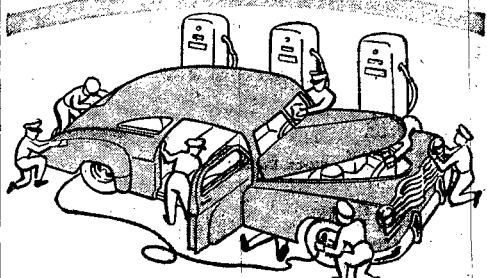

Rev. R. O. Louthan officiated at the services and David Mickey, professor at Peru State Teachers college and a nephew of Mrs. Stewart, sang.

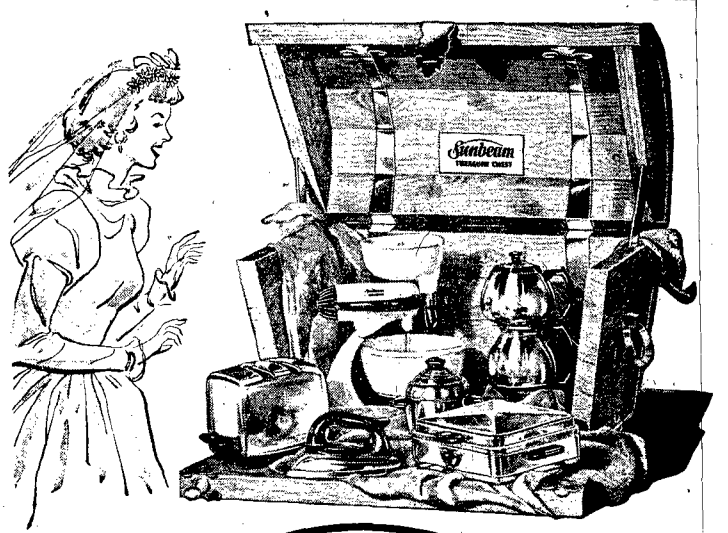

## 1898 Headline: 'Wayne Will Shine'

Headlines in The Wayne Herald issue of April 7, 1898, proclaimed "Wayne Will Shine." City fathers, then as now, were aware of the need for better lighting. "Something had to be done about it."

At the election held that month 52 years ago, new officers were chosen—the big business being that of voting on the street lighting issue. A total vote of 280 was cast, with a majority of 145 favoring the street lighting bill.

It was voted to issue bonds in the sum of \$4,500 for the purpose of erecting and maintaining an electric light system for the city of Wayne.

Since the first step was made in 1898 considerable progress has been made in keeping pace with the expansion of the city proper. As each new section of Wayne was completed, additional street lights were installed.

Street lighting of that time has been found inadequate. To meet a new demand city fathers of today are installing a new system of lighting for downtown Wayne.

The Wayne Herald of 52 years ago summed up the election at that time with the following paragraph on the action taken concerning the lighting:

"The present city officers elected are first class men and enterprising citizens who will see to it that the very best interests of the city are advanced and the will of the people carried out. The Herald feels like shouting Hurrah!"

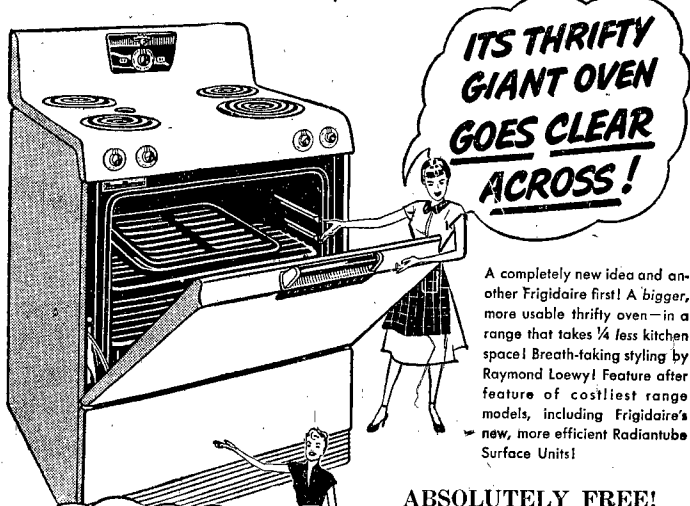

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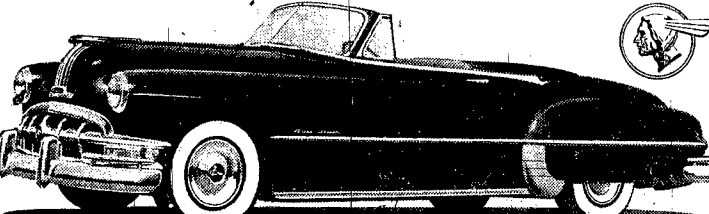

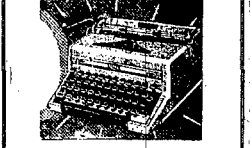
