Not Yet 'Too Late'

In an open letter to the public, published in The Wayne Herald last week, County Attorney Burr R. Davis discussed the seriousness of Whyne's traffic problem. His words included:

Attorney Burr R. Dawis discussed the seriousness of Wayne's traffic problem. His words included:

"To date we have been most fortunate as to injuries of persons and property, arising on the streets of Wayne... but when observing the operation of automobiles by some individuals, young and old alike, we wonder how long our good fortune can continue. Let us stop this careless operation before it is too late."

One of these weeks some individual is going to furnish us with a bloody story for our front page. And we'll probably lament a death or two in an editorial and add that very "too late" quoted above.

But at this writing, it's still not "too late." And with our concerned county at torney, we, too, "wonder how long our good fortune can continue." But what can we do? What's the answer?

Let's look at lit as simply and matter-offactly as possible.

First of all, is there a serious traffic problem in Wayne? Ask your officials or neighbors what they think. Or, better yet, "see for yourself. Take a walk some evening and note the speeders, listen to the sliding tires at dark intersections, look for in-a-hurry U-turn drivers. If you don't think the answer is "yes," look again.

Second, do we have reasonably adequate laws to regulate such traffic, to curb and punish violators? We believe a check of the written law, both local and state, will convince you there is.

Third, if we have both the violations and laws affecting them, then all we need is the enforcement of those existing laws; a clamping down to make them effective, punishment according to law.

And how do we get that? By grumbling to our neighbor, by putting our hands over our mouths and gasping "Oh!"?

As we see it, local law enforcement can be improved by these obvious means:

1. Furnish our police with an efficient prowl gar, and insist that it is used, fully and moroerly.

1. Furnish our police with an efficient prowl gar, and insist that it is used, fully and properly.

2. Follow up out interest in the problem with our full support. That means cooperating with police and city officials. That means cooperation between the council and the police. That means behaving ourselves—individually—and reporting the infractions of others.

3. If the proper soultment and the proper

tions of others.

3. If the proper equipment and the proper public support are not enough to keep our streets safe and sane, then it will be time to look to our law enforcing officials, either to make changes in our force of to add to it.

Let's let our city officials know that we you and I, personally—want something done before it is "top late."
