Soil Men of Five Counties Meet at Wayne Make Plans for Remainder of '50

A five-county meeting of conservation men was held Wednesday, June 7, in the Wayne County Soil Conservation office. Purpose of the meeting was to carry on a conservation program in the first half of the present year and to make plans for the remainder of the year for the work unit conservationists.

Representing Wayne county at the meeting was Herb Kollmorgen, George Gregory of Thurston county, Clark Moore of Dixon county, Chester Anderson of Knox county and Charles Fenster, Pierce county. Wallace Buck, head of the district conservation program, reviewed what has been accomplished to date in northeast Nebraska. He stated that this has been the most successful year in conservation, both as to amount of work accomplished and interest shown.

More applications than ever before have been received from farmers this year to carry on a conservation program. An item of added interest, Buck noted, was that farmers seem more desirous of carrying on an all-round program of conservation including contouring, terracing and grassing of waterways.

John F. Ahern, 62, Member of Wayne Pioneer Family, Dies

John F. Ahern, 62, life-time resident of Wayne and member of one of Wayne's pioneer families, died suddenly of a heart attack Monday about midnight in Pierre, S. D. He was in Pierre covering his sales territory.

Funeral services will be held at 9 o'clock Friday morning in St. Mary's Catholic church with Rev. William Kearns officiating. Born in Wayne, Oct. 8, 1887, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Ahern, pioneer store owners in Wayne. The Aherns came to Wayne from Jackson in 1881 to establish Ahern's store. He attended Wayne high school and the Nebraska Normal college. After a year at the University of Notre Dame he attended Armour Institute, Chicago, from which he was graduated in 1909 with a degree in electrical engineering. He was then employed by Underwriters Laboratory in Chicago. Mr. Ahern returned to Wayne in 1913 and has traveled for a women's ready-to-wear firm since that time. Always interested in sports, John Ahern was an enthusiastic golfer, fisherman and baseball fan and played his abilities helping pay his way through college. He played on early Wayne baseball clubs. He was also a veteran of World War I, a lieutenant in the engineer corps. He married Nell Thorndike in Sioux City, Aug. 11, 1921. Survivors include: his widow, four daughters, Ann of Hartington, Frances of Minneapolis, Minn., and

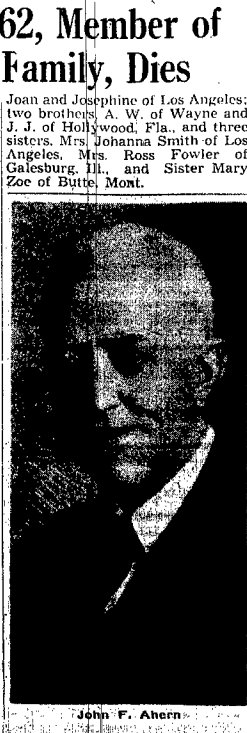

830 Begin Summer Session at College

Dr. Morey Gives Student Welcome at Convocation Enrollment at Wayne State college for the summer session stood at 830 Wednesday. Late registrations are expected to push this to the 850 mark for a post-war record. Practically all students are enrolled in courses leading to Nebraska teaching certificates. A count Wednesday showed that 45% of those registered are veterans. This enrollment figure is about a three per cent increase over the 1949 summer session enrollment. An all-college convocation, held Wednesday morning, welcomed students to the 1950 summer session. Dr. Victor P. Morey spoke on the essentials of a liberal education, pointing out that the best traits needed for an educated person are cheerfulness, ambition, hard work and self control. Education is a personal thing, needing enthusiasm and energy for achievement, he reminded students.

Church Invitation Rev. S. K. de Preeze, president of the Wayne Ministerial association, extended an invitation for students to participate in programs of all Wayne churches. Edith Sundell, chairman of the college's convocation committee, directed the program which included vocal solos by Bob Stevens, accompanied by Don Baugous and the "Alma Mater" sung by an octet, Russel Anderson directing.

PMA Says Farmers May Extend Maturity Dates on Crop Loans

Farmers who reseeded their 1948-crop oats and barley to mature April 30, 1950, may now extend their loans to mature April 30, 1951, the Wayne county PMA committee announced today. Corn loans on 1948 farm-stored CCC-corn crops may be extended to mature July 31, 1951. Applications for such extension must be made to the FMA county committee prior to the final date for delivery specified in the delivery instructions. Producers who reseed their grain for the third year will be paid the storage percentage for the 1949-50 storage period at the time of extension of the loans. The time in which farmers may apply for resealing loans on farm-stored 1949 crop wheat, corn, oats, barley, grain sorghums, rye and flaxseed has been extended. They may extend their 1949-crop loans on these commodities or convert the 1949-crop purchase agreements into loans for the extended period.

Boyd Hotel On Way Down

An old landmark on Wayne's "main stem" will disappear fast in the next few weeks. Demolishing of the old Boyd hotel building located on the corner of Second and Main streets, started yesterday. Workmen are busy today inside the building. Wrecking work will not be noticeable for some time, or until the outside walls start coming down. A contract was let Monday to the Lehmann Wrecking Company of Sioux City, by the State National Bank, owners of the old hotel property. The agreement calls for the old frame structure to be completely razed and the corner cleared within 90 days, according to Rollie Ley, the bank's board chairman.

Omaha Conventions Set for June 13

The political picture had its "grass roots" beginning in Wayne Saturday. County democrats chose two delegates to attend the Democratic state and congressional pre-primary convention in Omaha June 13 at a county convention held here June 3. Mrs. Irving Moses and Kenneth Olds, both of Wayne, will represent Wayne county at the convention. Alternates are Martin Ringer of Wayne and Mrs. Grover Bass of Carroll. County Chairman Kenneth Olds presided over the convention at the district court room in Wayne, Republican Meeting. The county Republican party members, who are allowed three delegates to the Republican state and congressional pre-primary meet, chose two delegates at their county convention Saturday afternoon. The Republican pre-primary is also June 13 in Omaha. Delegates are Mrs. Fred N. von Seggern, W. E. Von Seggers and T. S. Hook. Alternates are Dr. O. B. Proett, Mrs. Lawrence Ring and Charles McDermond. County officers were introduced at the convention Saturday and short talks were given by Senator Norris Schroeder and Charles McDermond. T. S. Hook, county chairman, presided. Hook has been appointed chairman of the credentials committee at the pre-primary convention. Von Seggern will serve on this committee also.

Laurel Man Hit, Injured

The Wayne department was called about 11:45 p.m., and Paul Rogge, F. A. Milder, John Ream and Bill Miller answered the call with the new rural fire truck.

Omaha Firm Buys College Bond Issue For New Dormitory

The Omaha firm of Kirk Patrick and Pettis Bonding Investment has purchased a \$435,000 bond issue for the new dormitory now under construction at Wayne State college. The low bid carried an average interest rate of 2.14 per cent. The Omaha firm, which specializes in municipal state and school bonds, agreed to pay a premium of \$1,080 for the privilege of handling the bonds. The firm is no newcomer for Wayne bonds since it helped the four Nebraska State Teachers colleges set up the original bonding program for their dormitories. Action on the bonds was taken at a meeting of the state normal board and the Wayne dormitory corporation Saturday, June 3.

Ask for Applications On '51 Wheat Acreage

Farmers, on whose land no wheat was seeded for harvest in any of the years 1948, 1949 or 1950, may apply for a 1951 wheat acreage allotment, according to Chairman Tom Roberts of the Wayne county production and marketing administration office. Applications for the allotment must be in by June 24, 1950. Forms are available at the PMA office. The application must contain evidence that the land for which allotment is requested is suitable for the production of wheat, and that the operator will be dependent on farming for his livelihood.

Case of the Criminal Coon

Mrs. Clara Loberg, who lives near Carroll, has no use for raccoons, nor for people who raise baby coons as pets and let them escape. Mrs. Loberg's reasonably justified conclusion follows a Sheriff Holmes chase of several weeks that was only just recently solved. Day after day, starting in April, the woman would go out to her henhouse to find from three to five hens dead, until she had lost over two dozen plump layers. Suspecting a weasel or mink, poison-baited traps were set for the varmint. But no luck. The windows were screened; the screens were torn away. The crime continued but the Lobergs became wiser. Noting that the dead hens were still warm when found in the morning, they concluded the killer struck just at daybreak. They parked the car near the henhouse and "laid way" for the culprit. The unsuspecting animal, a raccoon, showed up just before 4 a.m., and slipped quickly into the henhouse through the top of the roof. Shots from son William quickly put the thief out of commission. A collar around the animal's neck indicated Mr. Coon had once been someone's pet. Although peace once more reigns at the Loberg hen house, Mrs. Loberg laments: "It's certainly no pleasure to care for chickens through the winter's snows, carrying water and feed to them, and have this happen."

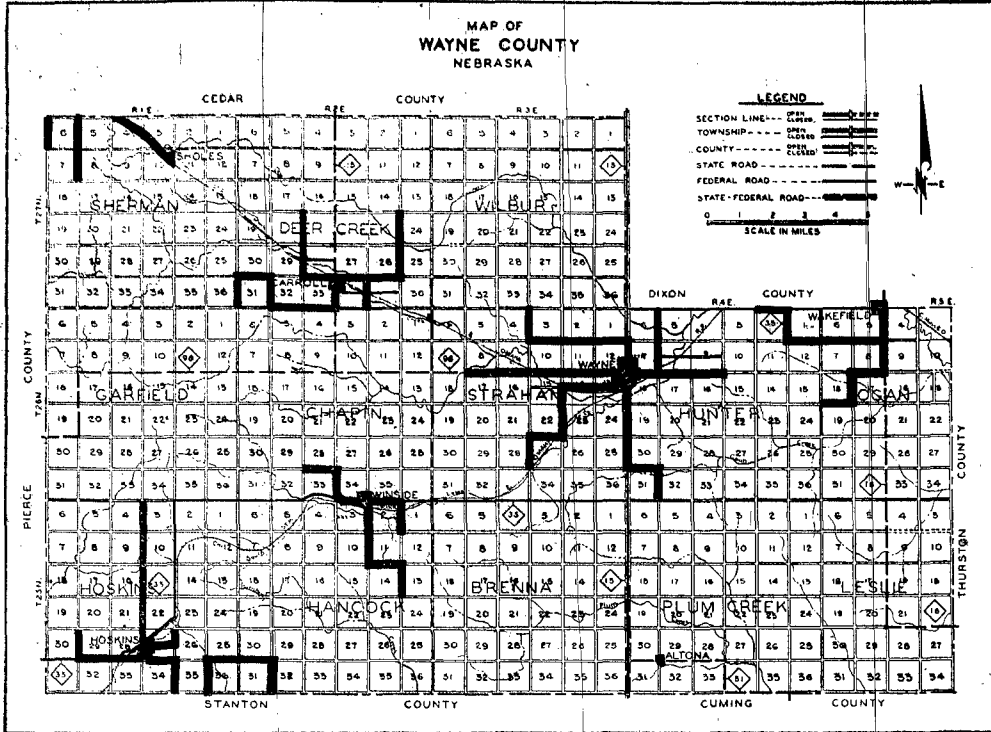

View Operations of Eight Different Farms

Farms Show Soil Conservation, Cattle and Sheep Raising

The operations of eight different Wayne and Dixon county farms provided an all-day educational show Thursday for 200 spectators who made the two-county tour by the Wayne and Dixon County Cornbelt Livestock Feeders association.

Under the guidance of Don Warner, Wayne county agent, one group departed from Wayne and met the Dixon feeders on the Eric and Merlin Alberts farm nine miles south of Wakefield. A loud speaker system permitted a discussion of the points that were outstanding about the farm and practices that are employed.

William Loeffel, chairman of the annual husbandry department of the University of Nebraska, commented on the programs that feeders follow.

The Alberts 500-acre farm produces all the necessary feed for the 1,500 to 2,000 cattle that are fattened there each year, Eric Alberts explained that he feeds red clover for an economical gain, and feeds enough corn, in addition, to prevent bloat.

This practice of pasturing cattle on legumes has paid off handsomely, Alberts believes, in the 20 years he has been practicing it.

A cattle crossing had been built over a wet creek to meet the need of a much larger bridge. Steel poles driven in both sides of the creek and leaving a passage for water and then covered with planking and earth. The bridge is substantial enough to support the weight of a vehicle.

Alberts was unable to say if it would withstand flooding and long usage because of the comparatively short time it has been in use.

The 50-car caravan next stopped at the Charles Kinney, Jr., and Robert Thomsen farm. This was an example of an agreement whereby landowner and tenant benefit mutually through a livestock share agreement.

Through their conservation program they find that they can maintain the fertility of the soil while adding weight to their beef.

The present cattle were purchased in November. In January they were put on ground corn, silage and hay. They are now pasturing them out. These cattle should be

ready for market near the middle of August.

Roy Sundell Farm

Roy Sundell's farm, located one-half mile south of Wakefield, featured pigs. He farrowed 30 sows in a central house, then transported them to clean ground. He found that the death loss due to common diseases is greatly lowered through this practice.

Use of auto-gate, electric fence, self-feeder and automatic watering reduce labor to a minimum. Moving the pig lot to fresh ground is not too much of a task since "A" houses are mostly used.

Sundell has found that no floors are necessary in the houses as long as there is good drainage and the houses are moved often enough. He carries on a complete program of conservation in conjunction with his feeding.

Dinner was held in the Wakefield park with the meal served in cafeteria style. Introduction of guests was made following the meal.

Visitors on the tour included Ast Moseman of Dakota county; Mel Hanson, WOW; Pete Peterson, WNA; William Loeffel, E. L. Gross, and Clyde Noyes, all of Lincoln. Marvin Dunklau, head of Wayne county feeders association, and Emil Mueller, vice president of Dixon county feeders, were also introduced.

Larry Brock Farm

First stop after dinner was made on the Larry Brock farm, seven miles northeast of Wakefield. A new crib and bins with labor saving devices were the main feature of the Brock farm.

An 18,000 gallon water storage tank with 2 1/2-inch fittings gained considerable attention for its practicability in case of fire. Brock explained how the tank was purchased when an oil company disbanded. He had it made for use as a reserve water supply, and one that would be available in a fire truck.

Paul Hansen of Dixon, has day lot accommodations for 80 steers, which he is now feeding. He explained that the occasional marketing of cattle in Chicago pays off in advance when one watches the market closely enough to note when the added cost of transportation will be offset by the increase of the prices being paid in Chicago.

Feeding 1,600 Lambs

Leslie Froth is feeding between 1,600 and 1,700 lambs in dry lot on his farm located northwest of Lincoln. These Texas lambs were purchased three weeks ago and are on feed of chopped hay, molasses and shelled corn. He fattens each group on a comparatively short period before marketing them and manages to feed between 5 and 6 thousand lambs per year.

He stated that the greatest loss or gain to be made on sheep was the death loss. Close observation as to feeding, and an eight-foot wire fence to keep out dogs and coyotes were precautions that had to be made.

Feeding sheep was pretty much of a gamble, he felt, but one that has to be taken by most feeders.

The Max Ash farm was the seventh stop on the tour. He keeps his steers on full-feed of Bromo grass and will sell as light weights in July or August. Through buying in the fall and wintering them on silage and alfalfa, he feels that they are economically fed and will pay off substantially through this program. At present he is feeding 16 steers.

340 Texas Steers

Final stop of the day was made at the Kris Kvols farm nine miles south of Wayne. The 340 Texas steers are on a full feed of corn and run on 60 acres of alfalfa. Kvols has figured that such a practice of feeding will allow him to feed 10 head per acre, and will increase weight and grade as rapidly as possible.

Water in the field is made possible by a 155-foot well with an electric pump installed at a cost of approximately \$340. This is run 12 hours of the day to keep the field supplied with water.

This completed the two-county tour which Don Warner declared to be the "best yet."

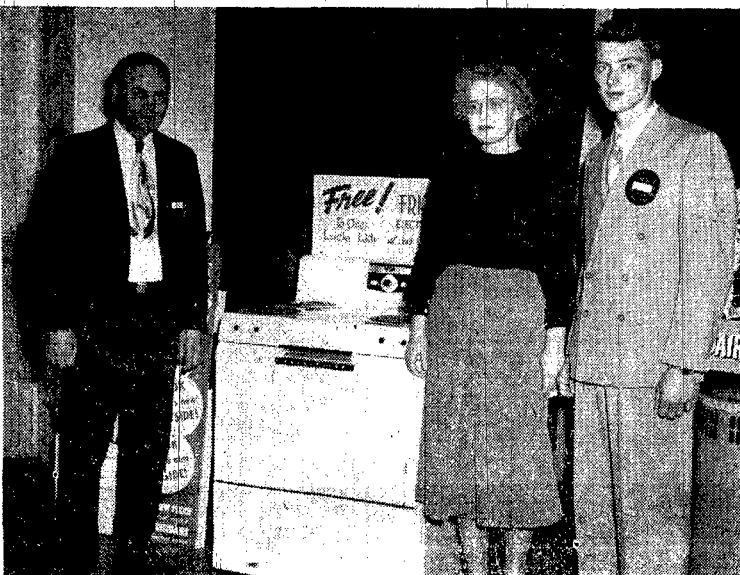

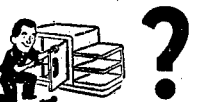

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A Law Is a Law

Are laws made to be enforced or to be broken? Infantile as the question seems, there is evidently a great variance of opinion in regard to the matter.

Some citizens think that laws are to be used like "spare tires," only when needed. This is the old "locking the barn door after the horse is stolen" philosophy.

Another group feels that laws should be enforced in large towns and cities, but not in towns like Wayne. "People wouldn't like it."

We frequently hear that enforcement of laws would alienate patrons who come to our town. "It might be bad for business."

It sounds sensible that the good laws should be separated from the bad, and that the good should then be enforced. And we are old-fashioned enough to think that the vast majority of American citizens, in Pook, Wayne, or New York City, want to see desirable laws enforced.

If the law designed to keep kids out of taverns is a good law, enforce it. If it is a poor law, repeal it. If the law forbidding sale of liquor to minors is a good law, enforce it. If not, repeal it. If laws governing traffic are good, enforce them. If not, change them.

A law is a law. Let's either hang on to the reins or get out of the carriage and walk.

While the government is preaching thrift to its people in order to sell its savings bonds, the government itself is spending billions of dollars beyond its receipts.

Swell Watermelon

A group of ministers and a salesman's organization were holding conventions in the same hotel, recounts the Detroit Free Press. The catering department was working at top speed, serving dinners to both.

The salesmen were having "spiked watermelon" for dessert. But the harassed chef discovered this alcoholic tidbit was being served to the ministers by mistake.

U. S. Needs a Fresh Start

Senator Kenneth S. Wherry of Nebraska, Republican Senate floor leader, declared that the future security and prosperity of the United States demands new leadership in government and a "fresh start" in both domestic and foreign policies.

He said this is the only way we can rescue America from the cold war which it is now losing and from bankruptcy which is threatened by the financial irresponsibility of the spenders now in power.

Senator Wherry said: "On the domestic front, the official record is plain that the alien-minded planners who are misleading the President, and through him the country, are seeking to impose upon the American people strait-jacket socialism."

Concerning the foreign front, Wherry stated that the "global socialism" of the Truman administration has increased the national debt to 256 billion dollars, brought a federal treasury deficit of five billion dollars a year, and tax levies that have reached the saturation point.

"If our country is to be strong economically, financially and spiritually, the present ruinous policies of spendthrift socialism in domestic and foreign affairs must be supplanted by sound Americanism," he asserted.

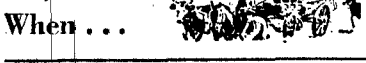
"We need to make a fresh start, and the first step is to put our own government house in order.

"We need a leadership that is not bound or embarrassed by secret agreements. We need to cleanse our government of subversives and the bad security risk of moral perverts.

"We need leaders in government who recognize that America's material resources are limited, and who will prepare our national defenses with that thought in mind, forsaking the exploded ideology that lasting peace can be bought with dollars alone or that prosperity can be secured by deficit spending."

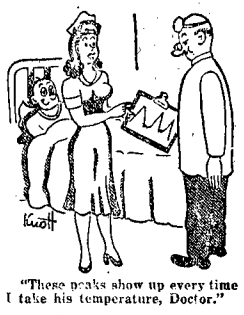

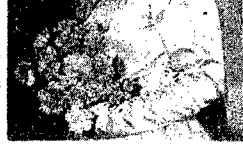

Tots Need Fresh Air, Sunshine

"Being a baby is a real hazard in either winter or summer" according to the Nebraska department of health, "but much can be done to avoid, or at least lessen, some of these hazards that are associated with hot summer days."

Summer is the season in which death from intestinal disorders has in the past exacted its greatest toll. A guard the infant must against such danger, care must be taken so that his food, especially milk, is pure and kept safe.

If there is any uncertainty concerning the water supply, the baby should drink water which has been boiled and cooled and kept covered. The baby and all his food must be protected against flies.

Baby himself, and all the things which he comes in contact, should be kept as clean as possible.

Plenty of fresh air and sunshine are essential for the best health of the infant. The baby's body should be gradually exposed to the direct rays of the sun beginning with exposure of only part of the skin surface for three to five minutes at a time, increasing the area of skin and time, once or twice daily.

Care must be taken to keep the baby free from prickly heat by keeping the skin clean and not too warmly dressed or covered.

If the baby is comfortable, he will eat his usual amount of sleep and eat and develop normally. In case the child shows symptoms of abnormal conditions, the family physician should be consulted at once.

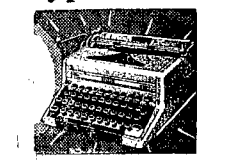

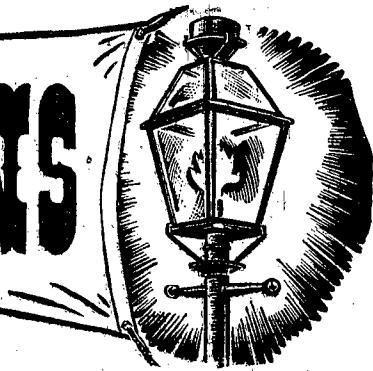

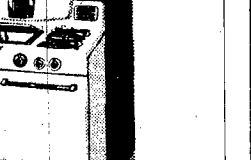
