Let's hope so. And let's hope a few care-less people will learn to leave those neces-sury sign posts alone, intact and readable.



Produce More, Live Better Americans produce more and live better that any other people. And one reason for that is the American, practice of using im-proved machinery to provide more jobs, and there paying jobs, for men and women a gery line of enterprise. At the same time, an essential part of this process of living better by producing more is economy in the use of manpower. This means putting men to doing produc-tive work and not wasting their labor on useless and unnecessary tasks. However, some labor groups take a short-sighted stand that is contrary to that sound principle.

However, some 'abor groups take. However, some 'abor groups take a short-sighted stand that is contrary to that sound principle. The recent disturbances within the rail-road industry over the size of crews needed to operate dised locomotives is a good ex-ample. These locomotives is a good ex-ample. The locomotive fire-men's union, however, demanded that the railroads put on a second fireman, who would have virtually nothing to do. That demand had been considered by the late President Roosevelt and by President Truman. Both boards inquired exhaustive-ly into the facts, heard the testimony of both sides, and decided unanimously that there is no need for a third man on the en-gine_for safety or any other reason. The union's domand was a "make-work" scheme, pure and simple. It would serve no useful purpose. It would waste highly-skilled and highly-paid labor. It would add greatly to the cost of running the rail-roads—and the bill would have to be paid by every one who rides a train or ships goods by rail. It is a good thing for the nation that the union at last withdrew its unreasonable demand.

It is a basic principle of democracy that might does not make sight. When that principle is disregarded by any individual or group of individuals, whether it be a labor union or an association of employers or a political party, our system of liberty and justice for all is endancered.
