





We compliment the city for the painted markings, the stop lights, and now the police car, all aimed at greater safety and protection for Waynites. We compliment our local police on their extra attentiveness.

Much of the credit goes to our councilmen and mayor. Mayor Houdersheldt recently held the first of a series of meetings with the city police force, stressing enforcement, and at the same time, extreme cour-

To help American families solve their money Problems the United States government is currently issuing at least one manphlet showing people how to keep household spending within the bounds of family income.

In the same breath, the Federal govern-ment will spend \$5 ½ billion more this year than the \$36 ½ billion it will collect in revenues

Higher or more taxes is one answer, Few of us would like to see higher personal income taxes, but there are possibilities of collecting several billion dollars in taxes from some industries that actually owe money to the government on paper, but somehaw haven't gotten around to handing over the actual-cash.

Two senators, Harry F. Byrd (Dem.) of Virginia and Paul Douglas (Dem.) of Illinois, have offered detailed answers to methods of reducing expenditure in the government itself.

Senator Byrd, among other things, would eliminate 250,000 civilian jobs in non-military agencies, lop off another 80,000 civilions from Military Establishment, reduce public works outlays by \$1 billion, and withhold Congressional approval from most of the 34 new spending programs outlined by Congress and the Bureau of the Budget, and consequently recommended by the President in his 1951 budget.

Budget, and cousequently recommended by the President in his 1951 budget. Senator Douglas' long list of budget-paring proposals includes one to reduce excessive vacation privileges of federal

paring proposals includes one to reduce excessive vacation privileges of federal employees.

Both senators favor the Hoover commission recommendations for streamlining and consolidating government agencies.

However, within the last two months, many of President Truman's "streamlining" proposals, based on Hoover's recommendations, have died on the floor of Congress because of senatorial haggling.

Now, with the adjournment of Congress a month away, it seems unlikely that anything can be done about deficit spending.

Why don't you talk over some of the problems and possible answers to the deficit budget during the summer? Keep in mind the basic points and responsibilities of a federal budget . . and the fact that a budget not only affects the fiscal year 1951 or 1952, but 1955 and 1970 as well.

Talk this over with some of your fellow citizens like a family would. Maybe we can straighten it out for the 1952 budget.


