50x50-foot Pen For Steer Show

The Wayne county fair board approved the erection of a new pen at the fairground for the new Wayne county steer show. Approval was granted at a meeting Tuesday night.

The Wayne County Livestock Feeders association, sponsors of the steer show, asked the board to put up the pen. It will be a 50x50-foot pen with 8-foot steel wire matting. The big pen will be divided into three smaller pens. A loading and unloading chute and a holding pen will also be built.

Speed, Power Like Highway Patrol Cars

Wayne police will be riding in style within a month. The city council Tuesday night accepted the bid of Sevier Motors for a 1950 Ford police car.

The car has a standard 2-door Ford body and a Mercury 114-hp motor. It includes standard equipment plus plastic upholstery.

The council voted to accept bids for a police car several weeks ago. Wayne police will be able to check traffic violators and conduct a more thorough patrol of the city with the new car.

Other council business included: Ralph Carhart was reappointed by the mayor to the library board for a term of five years. His term had expired July 1.

The council ordered DDT, chlor-dane and fuel oil to mix a fogging mixture to control insects in the city. Cost of ready-made liquid is \$5 a gallon. The city can manufacture the chemical for \$1.75 a gallon.

Dale Lindsay was granted a permit to move a frame repair garage formerly owned by L. & L. Motors, from 213 West First to Walnut and East Seventh. Lindsay put up a \$1,000 bond to cover possible damage to power lines while the building is being moved.

Support Prices For 1950 Corn Announced

Corn produced in the commercial corn areas including Wayne county during 1950 will be supported through loans and purchase agreements at 90 per cent of the parity price as of Oct. 1, 1950, the county office of the Production and Marketing Administration reports this week.

The 1950 price-support program for corn, announced by PMA on June 27, is substantially the same as the 1949 program, says Roberts, county PMA committee chairman, except that only those producers who have planted within their farm acreage allotments will be eligible to participate.

Commodity Credit Corporation loans and purchase agreements will be available to eligible producers from time of harvest through May 31, 1951, the chairman explains.

"Although the official 1950 loan rate won't be available until the Oct. 1 parity price is determined, the rate for the commercial corn area would average around \$1.43 per bushel based on the May 13 parity price," Roberts points out. "The rate for the 1949 crop now being marketed averages \$1.40 per bushel nationally."

The 1949 crop local rate for Wayne county is \$1.31.

# Got Any Questions On Fishing Laws?

Regardless of how clear fishing and hunting regulations appear to be, there are many sportsmen who still fail to get the correct interpretation. They then ask others, who, like themselves, are often confused, and consequently acquire false information.

The Game Commission annually publishes fishing and hunting regulations in addition to a handbook of state game laws. Sportsmen, when still in doubt after reading any of these publications, are urged to write to the Commission office in Lincoln or contact their district game wardens.

As is true in the fishing season as in the hunting season, several regulations are misinterpreted more than others. Following are four of the fishing questions causing much concern. The correct answers as given by Bill Cunningham, supervisor of state game wardens.

1. Can I fish after dark with lights? Yes. Fishing is permitted with lights of any kind at anytime. Many anglers are under the impression that this is prohibited. In all probability they recall hunting regulations which state that the use of lights is not permitted for the hunting of game animals or game birds.

2. How many hooks or lines may I use while fishing in a reservoir? Between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., each licensed angler is entitled to use two poles and lines. Between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m., he can use up to 15 hooks. This applies to any lake, pond or reservoir and their inlets and outlets. The only exceptions are lakes in state recreation areas where a permanent restriction limits each fisherman to two lines with two hooks per line.

Elsewhere in any stream of the state each angler is entitled to a maximum of 15 hooks at anytime. The maximum number of hooks allowed on any fishing line at anytime is five. Throw lines or floats are prohibited at all times in state-owned lakes.

3. Is there any regulation against the use of arsenic oil? No, there is no restriction against the use of

arsenic oil in prepared fish baits or as a fish bait.  
4. What is the overall possession limit? The overall bag and possession limit is 25 game fish of all kinds combined. The individual limit on a single kind of game fish must not exceed in the overall possession limit. The exception is perch on which there is no limit. Carp is not a game fish.

A team of three juveniles robbed the Colson Hatchery of about \$60 during the noon hour Saturday. The Colsons and hatchery employees had left the building for dinner.

Sherriff Hans Tietgen reported that two youths entered the hatchery building through a window and rifled the cash register. The robbery was not reported to the sheriff's office until 5 p.m.

The sheriff picked up the three youths and recovered \$36.55 of the stolen money.

## 6 Game Areas Needed for 1951

Six new game habitat areas will be established in Wayne county in 1951, the Soil Conservation Service office reports. These are areas where woody cover consisting of overgreens and shrubs will be planted and fenced for the use of game birds and animals.

The Nebraska Game Forestation and Parks commission plants and fences the areas selected at no cost to the farmer.

Areas will be established on odd areas, waste land or good land, providing the farmer is willing to grant the use of such area for game for ten years. It must be at least one-half acre in size.

Any farmer who has any kind of area he would like developed for game, preferring to get in touch with the Wayne County Soil Conservation district office.

The Game Commission made plantings in 1950 on farms belonging to Bernhard Splitzger, William Ruth Claftom, Wayne, and E. L. Langenberg and William Detloff, jr., near Hoskins.

State cigarette tax collections totaled \$2,860,117 for the fiscal year ending Friday, the Nebraska cigarette tax division reported Thursday.

This was an increase of \$25,117 over fiscal 1949.

Administration costs for the current year amount to \$18,468.

Since the three-cent tax went into effect three years ago the state has collected \$11,503,991. Administration costs for the three years amount to \$56,551, or less than one-half of one per cent, a department official pointed out.

Collections this month amounted to \$360,853, compared to \$367,376 in June, 1949.

## How Good Is a Quarantine?

There are a lot of forgotten men in this world.

One such man, George Kennon, quietly left the State department several months ago "to return to the business world."

Nowadays, people think that men like Kennon "leave" their work in the State department either because they have served their usefulness or their way of thinking doesn't jibe with State department policy.

And like a lot of forgotten men, Kennon, if he had stayed in the State department within earshot of the administration, could have said, "I told you so."

He could have said, "I told you that Korea would be like that."

During the war years Kennon was a State department attache in Moscow. In 1946 he made public a design for "containment" of Communist infiltration and Soviet Union military power.

The plan was publicized by a few magazines, and metropolitan dailies, and then all but forgotten.

However, the State department picked up some of Kennon's ideas and made use of them in Europe and to some extent in the Arabian states area. The State department did not publicize that fact.

Kennon had predicted, in 1946, that if the United States exerted its influence through business and military power Russia would be forced to go to war, yield to an internal revolution or lose her satellites (by revolution) and world influence, within three or four years.

Kennon predicted that unless the United States bypass the United Nations machinery and do a little "coaxing" herself Russia would slowly but surely grab one country after another and spread the Communist fifth-column throughout the world.

The American State department chose not to bypass the UN.

At the same time, the State department surreptitiously sent military missions to Greece and Asia Minor, and encouraged American corporations to get a strong toehold in oil-producing countries of the Near East.

With a moderately firm hand on the Mediterranean area, the United States succeeded in saving Greece and Italy, and Yugoslavia revolted.

But the Far East seemed to have forgotten. Chiang was ordered to mediate with the Chinese Reds, the mediation failed and the great "white wash" of the State department ensued.

However, now in 1950, Russia is infinitely more powerful and influential in Europe than she was at the time of the Yalta conference and State department decision.

If Kennon's plan had been adopted Russia would have been stopped at the Oder river in Poland or there would have been another war immediately. The United States was holding the whip hand... sole possessor of the atom bomb.

A few days ago, President Truman spoke of his "Red" quarantine. The quarantine is practically a carbon copy of Kennon's line of containment except that the quarantine line has bulged out over five or six European and Asiatic countries.

It may be too late to contain Russian power and influence except at the expense of a crippling war. Or, perhaps the quarantine line will continue to bulge over Korea, Formosa and the Philippines. President Truman is just four years too late.

But Kennon is a forgotten man... shall we let bygones be bygones, or shall we look beyond our nose if we have another chance?

## What's Up in Congress?

The Senate proposes to the House of Representatives that Congress adjourn by August 5.

Senator Taft threw a monkey wrench into the Democrats' plan of Congressional adjournment by saying that the Republicans will "cooperate" to adjourn Congress early if the program is held down to five major points, which are as follows:

1. Extension of the draft law (following passage of the pending Social Security expansion bill).
2. Another attempt to pass a fair employment practices bill.
3. Continuation of the military assistance program.
4. Passage of the omnibus appropriation bill.
5. Passage of a tax bill reducing war-time excise taxes.

## Way Back When...

### 30 Years Ago

July 15, 1920—The Midland Chautauqua Circuit opens its 7-day entertainment in Wayne on July 30. The tent will be placed on the high school grounds. Last year Fred L. Blair agreed to contribute \$5 to the town of Carroll if that town presented paving that was ready to drive over ahead of that in Wayne. Fred drove to Carroll last week, drove over the paving and cheerfully yielded the road to the contractor. The library board elected the following officers for the coming year: president, Mrs. C. A. Chace; vice president, Mrs. E. W. Huse; and secretary, S. R. Theobald. The disregard for the city rule that no cars shall run on the new base of the pavement until the city opens it up resulted in the city council investing in a special watchman of the construction company powers to arrest anyone running cars on the base.

### 25 Years Ago

July 9, 1925—In the district court in Wayne yesterday, Judge A. A. Welch confirmed the sale of the First National Bank building and fixtures at Carroll to the Carroll State Bank. The county courthouse has been the scene of many legal battles during the last years, but never before was it besieged by a colony of bees. The building committee of the Wayne County Fair association met with Chairman Henry Korff and School Superintendent Pearl Sewell to consider plans for the new school building which is to be put up on the fair grounds this summer. Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Corvill, son and daughter, returned home Thursday evening from an automobile trip through points in New Jersey, Virginia and Pennsylvania.

### 20 Years Ago

July 10, 1930—At the request of hotel guests in Wayne the council voted to discontinue blowing the city whistle mornings at 7 o'clock. The Wayne American Legion post, meeting July 2, heard a short talk by Albert Borg, Wakefield, district commander. Four-hundredth anniversary of the Augsburg Confession is to be observed next Sunday by nine congregations of the First Lutheran church with special services at the Wayne fairgrounds. About 3,000 will attend, it is planned. Forty-three of the 79 rural school districts of Wayne county have caves for protection against storms. Frank Heine reports discovery of a pheasant's nest and eggs under the porch at his residence within a stone's throw of the business district. The new boiler ordered some time ago for the heating plant arrived at the past week. The Winslow library will be moved to the first of August from a room in the school building to one in the city hall.

### 15 Years Ago

July 11, 1935—Nebraska state normal board, at a meeting in Lincoln Monday, appointed J. T. Anderson, dean of men at Kearney Teachers college, to the presidency of Wayne State Teachers college to succeed Dr. U. S. Conn whose resignation as head of the school business effective Sept. 1. Northeast Nebraska judging school for 4-H members will be held at the fair grounds at Wayne July 17. Estimate of city expenses for the fiscal year May 1, 1935 to May 1, 1936 was made by city fathers at regular council meeting. The ordinance provides for total expenditures of \$162,400, the same as the year just closed. Three days of high-class horse racing with about 150 fast horses seeing action is promised to northeast Nebraskans who stream into Wayne for the three-day pari-mutuel race meet. Mrs. J. R. Rogers will be 100 years old July 22 and the occasion will be observed with a family reunion at the home of Mrs. J. G. Mines. The Ward Williams quarter section of land southwest of Carroll was sold at auction to Mayor Henning Hallin of Wakefield. Consideration was \$9,040.

### 10 Years Ago

July 18, 1940—W. A. Hunter, 80, pioneer whose life is closely entwined with Wayne county history, passed away at his home July 14. Mr. Hunter and his wife have for some time been the only ones remaining here of the colony coming to this region in 1870. Dr. H. D. Miller of Stapleton has bought the Dr. W. A. Emery dental practice. Bernard Pflieger, Albert Watson, Walter Fenske and Detlef Kal, have elected to serve as the four supervisors of the Wayne county soil conservation district. Safety Education conference will be held at the Wayne State Teachers college. On the program will be Miss H. Louise Cottrell, consultant in safety education at New York City. A small boot over 80 years old made from genuine leather is on display at the Wakefield harness shop. The toe is covered with copper. Mrs. Lowell Henney won the northeast Nebraska women's golf championship for the third time in her golfing career. Clara E. Smothers took the championship consolation title.

Since even at my age I would put that book on my list I assured her that I thought it a very good selection.

That Ain't Hay: The Hoover Commission has reported that \$140 million a year could be saved by modernizing the organization methods and equipment of the U. S. Post Office Department.



Upon inquiry by a newspaper correspondent here, the Department of Agriculture disclosed that the United States had stored wheat and barley in Canada but said some of it has been brought back to this country. Reporting that we still have six to eight million bushels of grain stored in Canada, the department claimed there is "not enough storage capacity" in the United States.

It has been revealed that the British government lost more than \$30,800,000 in 1948-49 potato operations. The United States lost \$90,000,000 in its potato-purchase program last year.

More than a million dollars of Marshall Plan funds has been authorized for geological and topographical surveys for British colonies in Rhodesia and Tanganyika, Africa, and additional funds for Administration has announced at least \$4,000,000 in ECA money to be used for the upkeep and development of Europe's African colonies. It was revealed. This includes \$1,035,500 to build 4,300 miles of paved highways in French West Africa and additional funds for paving roads in French Equatorial Africa and the French Cameroons.

Members who have been fighting for greater efficiency in government were interested in Defense Secretary Louis Johnson's disclosure that a stop order recently issued to one of the military services which had requested the purchase of 400 new typewriters. It was discovered that the Army Quartermaster Corps had 45,000 typewriters in stock, but lawyers at first ruled they could not be transferred. Later another law was found making such transfer legal.

Secretary Johnson revealed that one branch of service, which he did name, has paper on hand worth \$1,500,000 and that the Navy has enough anchors to last at least 50 years.

In a colorful ceremony here, Mrs. Karl Stefan was presented a medal by the Eloy Alfaro Foundation Auxiliary for assisting her husband in furthering the "good neighbor" policy and better relations between the Americas as well as her work in the Red Cross. Making the presentation was a previous recipient of this award, Senora Rodolfo de Herbruger, wife of the ambassador from Panama. Others attending the special luncheon included Mrs. Francis P. Matthews, wife of the Secretary of the Navy, and Mrs. Arthur Harris, wife of General Harris, formerly of Nebraska.

Paul H. Roberts, who is well known in Nebraska for his work of planting trees in the shelter belt, has been selected to take charge of eradicating the destructive spruce beetle in Colorado. Recently in charge of the Missoula, Mont., forestry office, Mr. Roberts came to Washington and called at the Third District office before flying to Denver, where he will now have his headquarters.

Reserve officers from all over the country have been here for their convention. Many Nebraskans were in the group and heard President Truman's address to the organization. The Korean situation came in for much discussion.

## Hog Owners Are Warned Of Infectious Rhinitis

If pigs sneeze frequently and their snouts later become "pushed in" or twisted, swine raisers should be on their guard. They may have a serious disease problem in their herds.

That warning today from the American Foundation for Animal Health pointed out that excessive sneezing, coughing and a peculiar look in pigs' faces may mean an outbreak of infectious rhinitis. The malady appears to be spreading in Nebraska authorities say.

Infectious rhinitis does not kill many animals outright, a foundation bulletin reports, but it may stop gains to the point where hog raising is no longer profitable. Even well-fed pigs fail to put on weight.

In many instances, farmers have mistaken infectious rhinitis for "bull nose." The two conditions appear similar, but bull nose starts from an injury, and infection with barnyard germs. It is not contagious. Infectious rhinitis, however, is caused by a disease organism, possibly a virus, which stays in a herd season after season.

If owners suspect infectious rhinitis, they should get an immediate veterinary diagnosis. Prompt control measures are of major importance in holding down losses.

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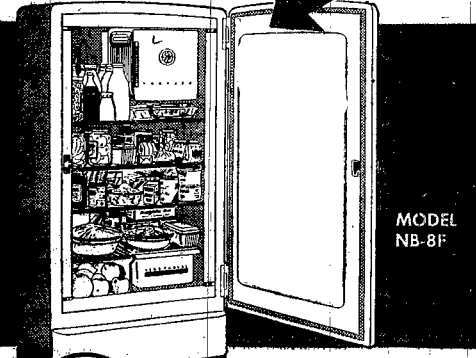



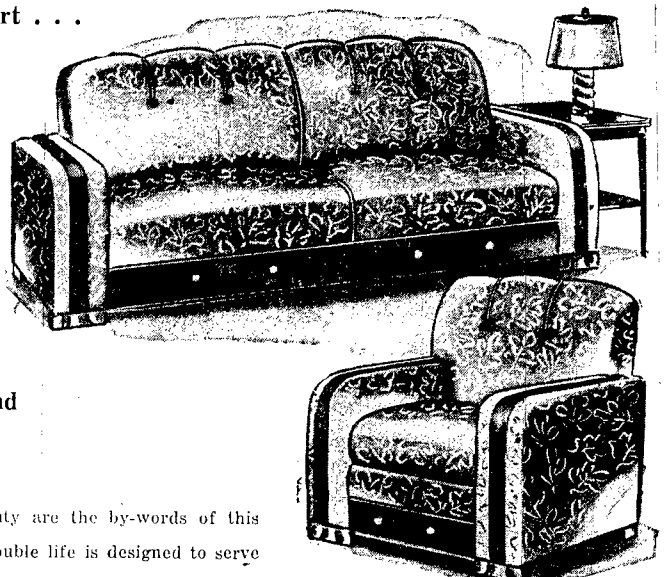
