During the war years Kennon was a State department attache in Moscow. In 1946 he made public a design for "containment" of Communist infiltration and Soviet Union military power.

Union military power.

The plan was publicized by a few magazines, and metropolitan dailies, and then all but forgotten

all but forgotten.

However, the State department picked up some of Kennon's ideas and made use of them in Europe and to some extent in the Arabian states area. The State department did not publicize that fact.

Kennon had predicted, in 1946, that if the United States exerted its influence through business and military power Russia would be forced to; go to war, yield to an internal revolution or lose her satellites (by revolution) and world influence, within three or four years.

(by revolution) and world influence, within three or four years.

Kennon predicted that unless the United States bypass the United Nations machinery and do a little "coaxing" herself Russia would slowly but surely grab one country after another and spread the Communist fifth-column throughout the world.

The American State department chose not to bypass the UN.

At the same time, the State department surreptitiously sent military missions to Greece and Asia Minor, and encouraged American corporations to get a strong toehold in oil-producing countries of the Near East.

With a moderately firm hand on the Mediterranean area, the United States succeeded in saving Greece and Italy, and Yugoslavia revolted.

But the Far East seemed to have for-gotten. Chiang was ordered to mediate with the Chinese Reds, the mediation fail ed and the great "white wash" of the State department ensued.

However, now in 1950, Russia is in-finitely more powerful and influential in Europe than she was at the time of the Yalta conference and State department decision.

If Kennon's plan had been adopted Russia would have been stopped at the Odor river in Poland or there would have been another war immediately. The United States was holding the whip hand . . . sole posses the of the atom bomb.

A few days ago, President Truman spoke of his "Red" quarantine." The quarantine is practically a carbon copy of Kennon's line of containment except that the quarantine line has bulged out over five or six European and Asiatic countries.

It may be too late to contain Russian power and influence except at the expense of a crippling war. Or, perhaps the quarantine line will continue to bulge over Korea, Formosa and the Phillipines.

President Truman is just four years too late.
