Public Hearing Slated for Beer Licenses

"Trailers are here to stay," sighed the council unanimously Tuesday night. Council members spent the major share of their meeting time discussing the problems and possible solutions to one of Wayne's most perplexing "growing pains."

April 27 may have looked like the end of the trouble, but that was only the beginning. On that day, just three months ago, the council sold all the 22 trailer units to the State and Logan Trailer service, Lake Andes, S. D., for \$100 each.

The trailer company was to move the trailers out and clean up the area. Some of the tenants couldn't move by the deadline date of June 15, and the area was not cleaned up. But, that problem, comparatively speaking, was a simple one.

The councilmen agreed that it would be too much of a burden to fill in the present area to keep it out of water. The trailers that are there now haven't been bothered too much by high water, but there is little "dry" room left for new units.

In casting about for a new location, tax delinquent land in the Roosevelt Park area was suggested as a possible location.

Stop Lights

Stop lights, too, got into the discussion.

The council was unanimous in its support for a stop or slow light at the corner of 12th Street and Main, near the playground area for young children at the Wayne State campus.

There were differences of opinion as to what extent traffic should be stopped or allowed in the area. It would be difficult for heavily laden trucks to negotiate the Main street hills if they were forced to come to a full stop.

Possibilities discussed were: (1) a full stop sign like those operating within the downtown area; (2) a stop or blinker light that would operate automatically during school hours; and (3) a manual or automatic system that could be controlled by the college.

The advantage in having a system that would operate continuously is that traffic would be slowed in its approach to the down-town area. Citizens in the college area, in particular, have expressed concern over the speeding traffic coming from the north into Wayne.

Off on a tangent, the council discussed briefly the possibilities of a system of four-post traffic signs to replace the overhead lights. The three overhead lights could be used to advantage at other corners.

Other Business

The council certified the Poll Tax list sent in by the county clerk's office. All males between the ages of 21 and 50 are to be registered on the list. A \$5 poll tax is collected from lists along with other taxes by the county treasurer.

Oscar Peterson was granted permission to move a house from the Western Shulzbein farm to East and 4th and 12th streets. He posted a \$1,000 bond check.

Gordon Shippe was granted a building permit to build a frame house at 11th and Pearl streets for \$8,000.

Public Hearing

A public hearing was ordered for August 8 concerning the issuance of beer licenses to Clarence Carlson and Calvin Miller. Both men have posted bond, paid the fees and entered their applications for the licenses.

Carlson plans to buy the property now owned and operated by Jack Bergel and Miller plans to buy the Betty Cafe. Since both men are planning to buy established concerns there will be no increase in the number of beer licenses outstanding at the council issues the licenses.

A legal notice giving full details of the public hearing will be published in The Herald at a later date.

The council also heard and passed all claims and salaries to come before it.



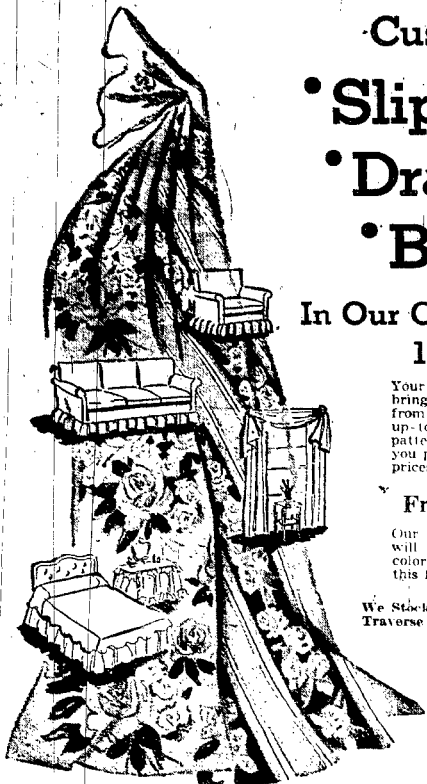

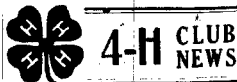

Wayne One of 73 Counties Active In PMA Program

The participation of Wayne county farmers in the Farmers' Conservation program, one of the 73 counties in the United States to do so, has greatly stepped up progress in meeting the soil and water conservation problem here according to Tom Roberts, chairman of the county PMA committee. He explained that a total of 1401 county farmers are cooperating in the program. 86 percent of the farmers in the county. County PMA committee members—farmers, who have been elected by their neighbors to administer PMA programs—have met with each of these farmers and they and the farmers have worked out a program based on the farmer's own plans. Agricultural Conservation payments for Group 1 practices have totaled \$7,342.53 this year. Group 1 conservation practices involve the assistance of private contractors.

Where assistance is needed to carry out approved conservation practices, the Agricultural Conservation program provides a share of the cost. Pastures have been improved by spreading phosphate. 282 tons received a practice payment of \$1,760.53. There were seven livestock and erosion dams built to hold back water during excess runoff and provide convenient watering places for livestock reducing the damage caused by trailing livestock to too few water holes. In building these dams, there were 753 cubic yards of earth moved and the farmer received a practice payment of \$753.90.

To date in 1950, there has been 181,800 feet of gradient terraces built on seventeen farms which already have received a practice payment of \$3,636.00. Cooperating farmers were assisted on a "share-the-cost" basis construction involving the use of earth-moving equipment in establishing permanent sod waterways to dispose of excess water. There has already been 23,844 cubic yards of fill made for a seepage waterway with an ACP payment of \$1,192 assistance.

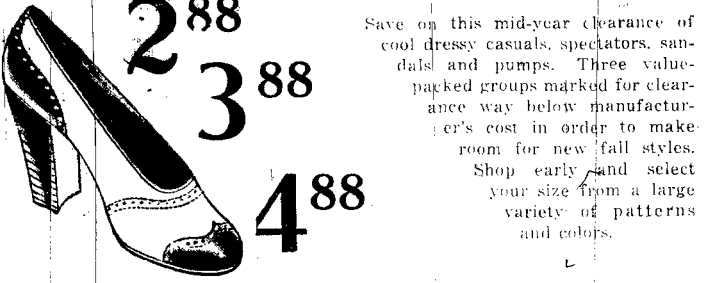

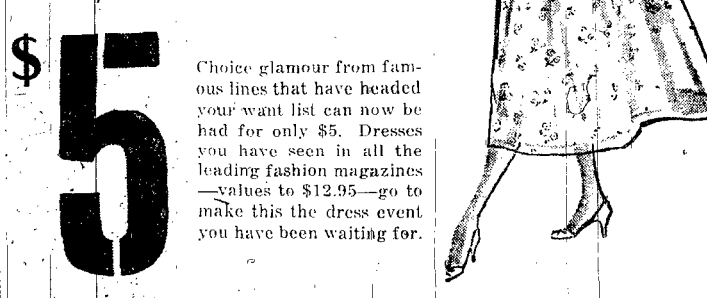
