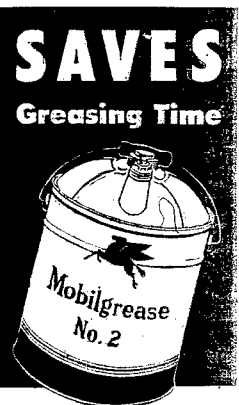

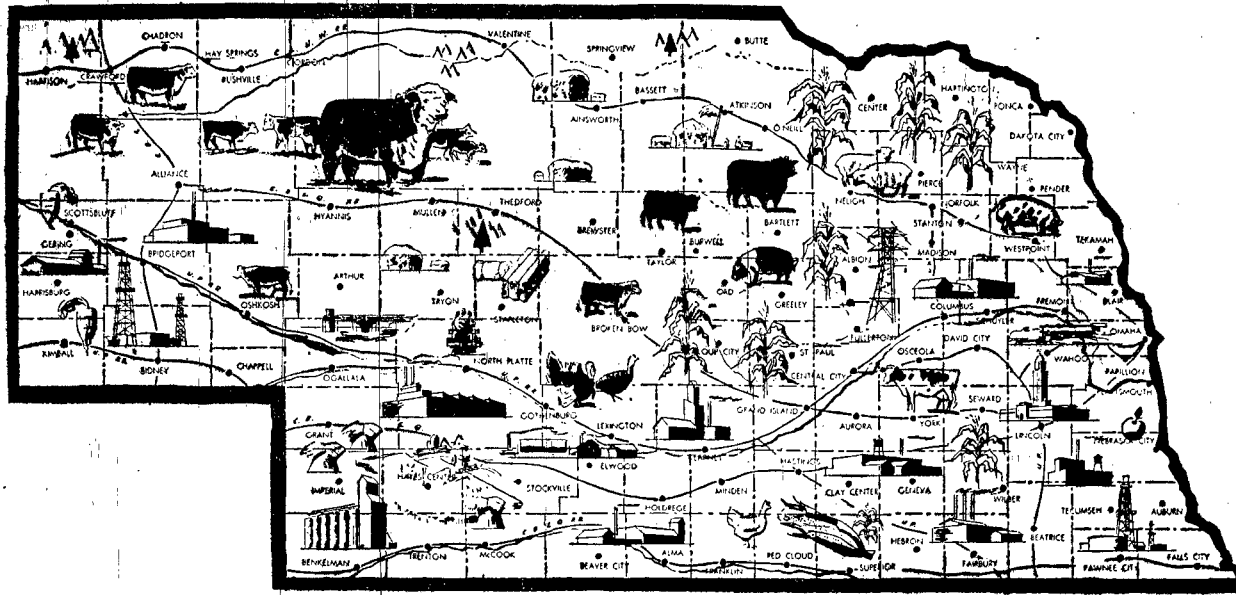

NEBRASKA STEPS OUT...

On March 1, 1867, Nebraska was admitted as the 37th state in the Union. Since then it has grown to a population of approximately 1,300,000 people. With an area of 76,653 square miles, Nebraska has a larger percentage of its land in farms and ranches than has any other state. She boasts the second largest earthen dam in North America—the Kingsley—which operates as a part of the state's publicly owned power and irrigation system. With more miles of running water than any other state, and an annual underground reserve of more than a billion acre feet, Nebraska's water supply is virtually inexhaustible, and one of her greatest natural resources. On April 4, 1895, the Goldenrod was designated as the floral emblem of the state. The Western Meadowlark was declared the state bird on March 22, 1929, and on February 15, 1937, the American Elm was chosen as the state tree of Nebraska.

At the geographic center of the United States, Nebraska is primarily an agricultural state. Principal products are corn, wheat, oats, barley, rye, sorghums, hay, sugar beets, soybeans, dry beans, fruit, clover and blue grass seed, cattle, sheep, hogs, and poultry. Directly dependent, to a great extent, upon agricultural raw materials produced within the State are many of Nebraska's industries. With more than 1,700 manufacturing and processing establishments, over 500 factories process food or kindred products. Meat packing constitutes the state's largest single type of industry. While most of this activity is centered

in Omaha, the world's second largest livestock market, other packing plants are scattered throughout all sections of the state.

For sportsmen Nebraska has become a well known fishing and hunting haven. In addition to fish found in large reservoirs constructed for public power and irrigation, good fishing can also be enjoyed in the more than 40 well stocked, state maintained lakes. Nebraska's rivers also provide excellent fishing grounds for those who enjoy this sport. While pheasant is the state's principal upland game bird, and plentiful in most areas, good duck and goose hunting is found in numerous sand-hill lakes in the northwestern section. With one federal and two state refuges, Nebraska is known throughout the world for its breeding grounds for migratory waterfowl.

Nebraska is criss-crossed with a network of railways, highways, and airways providing excellent transportation facilities. Serving the transportation needs of the state are eleven major railways, four airlines, and large fleets of trucks and buses. Water transportation on the Missouri River is also offered. Four large telephone companies plus many small exchanges provide telephone service for Nebraskans. The state boasts over 300 outstanding newspapers, 21 of which are dailies and over 280 weeklies and semi-weeklies. There are 18 radio stations in 12 cities plus two television stations.

According to life insurance actuarial figures, Nebraskans top the nation in life expectancy; and, at the present time, Nebraska is one of only nine states with 9% or more of its inhabitants over 65 years of age. The state has a total of 97 registered hospitals, approximately 1,500 physicians and surgeons, and 973 dentists.

In addition to scores of rural churches, every municipality, the smallest included, has one or more churches. The state has 5,166 operating public school districts including 494 high school districts. Added to these are 295 private schools. In the field of higher education Nebraska has four outstanding universities, 13 four-year colleges, and five junior colleges.

Even though there is no state income tax, and no general sales tax, Nebraska has no bonded indebtedness. While taxes per person for governments in other states have increased, Nebraska's have decreased to the lowest in the nation. From a percentage standpoint taxes for our state government were 37½% below the national average in 1949.

Here then, briefly, is an overall picture of our Nebraska... a state of abundant resources and unlimited opportunities... a state of outstanding agricultural and industrial importance... a state of prosperity and initiative... a state of friendly people. Yes, there is no state like Nebraska... a great place in which to live, do business, and raise our families.

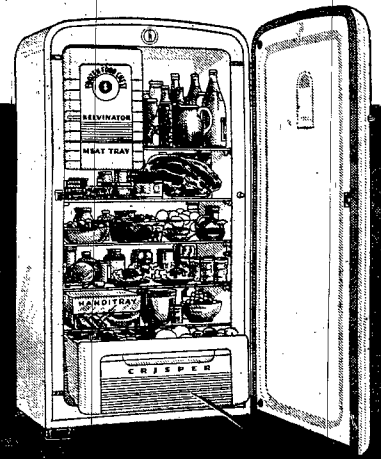

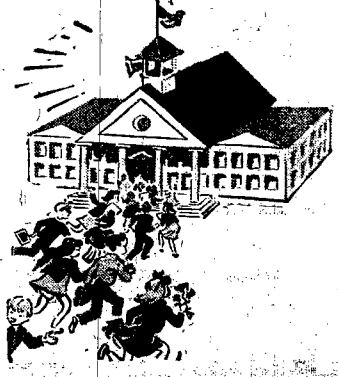

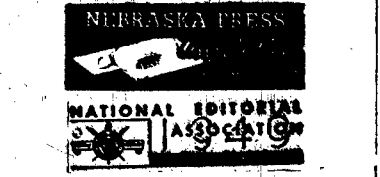

All of us, at some time, have wondered what makes Nebraska a great state. What is manufactured in Nebraska? How many acres of corn or wheat were produced last year?

Very few industries are worried about the next generation of managers... it won't matter if there aren't enough raw materials for the next generation to manage.

Capitalism fights wars and lines up trade agreements with little thought to the eventual circumstances. Russia, on the other hand, is an entirely different breed of cat. Following her communist "religion," she can wait for hundreds of years; it won't matter to "Mother Russia" whether Joe Stalin I or Joe Stalin XV sovietizes the United States.

The key to Russian strategy lies, very simply, in the Marxian rallying cry: "Workers and slaves of the world, unite; you have naught to lose but your chains." Russia has been making submarines for the past four years... that's a defensive navy. Russia has been building tanks, light bombers and fighter planes for the past four years... that's an army for dreadnaught land conquest, not for invasions of North America.
