





The pasky insects seem to be biting harder and deeper than ever. They're probably trying to avenge their carlier-in-the-season brethren that were knocked out by the

fogger.

Errorless fielding by Wayne's softball players has been more of a dream than ever. No one can expect a man to bother about "flies" when he's being eaten alive by mosquitoes. During the past week or so, those fielders have been getting more of a workout fending off hordes of "skeeters" than all the windmill artists on the mound combined.

One Pioneer Nite league game last week had just about turned into a rout of the fans until the fogger arrived in time to shoo away some of the pests.

Pienics, outings and ordinary evening porchesiting have turned into a trial by combat rather than a chance for peaceful

relaxation.

relaxation.

A special mayor's committee, slapping mosquitoes just as lustily as the rest of us, took cognizance of the predicament Friday night. They mapped out a plan for attacking every phase of the insect problem.

To be successful, the plan involves the cooperation of every householder in wayne.

cooperation of every nouseholder in Wayne.

The first three points of the four-step plan-involve the use of special spraying equipment. However, the fourth step, and probably the most important, has to be carried out by Wayne citizens.

The secret of mosquito-abatement programs is to get rid of their breeding places. The heavy July rains have left lots of puddles that are "heaven" as far as the mosquito is concerned.

He can breed only where there is stagnant water.

It will require only a few minutes for each family to check their yard and nearby vacant lots for possible breeding places. Trash heaps should be cleared away. . . they hold moisture and puddles several days after a rain. Gans or buckets that have water standing on or in them should be discarded or dried; garbage cans in particular are good breeding grounds. Water in bird baths should be changed several times a day. Drain spouts and gutters should be cleaned of refuse that would dam up water after a rain. Rain barrels should be emptied and put out in the sun to dry.

If every family in Wayne would eliminate these breeding places, the source of the mosquito problem, spraying would be much more effective. And we could look forward to enjoying our ball games, picnics

CAA Is Ready



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
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

There Is No State Like Nebraska

Agriculture

provides 80% of Nebraska's annual income



If we were able to see a birdseye view of the entire State of Ne-is, we would observe a sight rich in nature's beauty and man's in-yout would be a picture of rivers and lakes; vast fertile plains and hills; prosperous, aggressive cities and towns; and productive and ranches. It would be apparent from this over-all picture that ska is predominately an agricultural state.

With an area of 76,653 square miles, Nebraska has over 111,000 and ranches. These farms and ranches cover approximately 97% state's total land area, a larger percentage than has any other. The average farm size is 427 agres, and the farm population is balf of the state's estimated 1,300,000 people.

Nebraska's land can be roughly divided into three major areas:

1) The Loss Region which includes approximately the eastern onehirs to one-half of the state plus most of the area south of the Platte
liver. The allty soils found in this region are fertile, deep, and easily
liked. (2) The High Plains which lie in the western end of the state,

Nebraska's greatest natural resources are its soil and water which are the base for an agricultural economy that provide's 80% of the state's aroome. Agriculture in its wide range and diversification is the foundation of the state's growth and prosperity. It provides the "raw materials" for market centers and industrial production. Elevators, creamerics, processing plants, sugar beet factories and other food products industries thrive throughout the state as a direct result of the tre-



Cash income from farm marketings in 1949 amounted to \$918,-460,000. Crops accounted for \$328,591,000 of this total while livestock and livestock products accounted for \$391,869,000. Corn was the biggest single crop with farmers raising 239,330,000 bushels valued at \$275,230,000. Nebraska's other principal crops are wheat, oats, barley, rye, sorghums, potatoes, hay, sugar beets, soybeans, dry beans, fruit, and clover and blue grass seed. The value of all livestock on Nebraska farms and ranches in 1949 was \$601,008,000. Of this amount, all cattle (3,920,000 head) were worth \$486,080,000. Of ther livestock and values include: Horses (236,000 head) \$77,788,000; Mules (9,000 head) \$423,000; Hogs (2,475,000 head) \$79,200,000; Sheep (588,000 head) \$10,349,000; Chièkens (14,307,000 head) \$17,168,000. Nebraska was the first state west of the Mississippi River to become completely organized into soil conservation districts. Last year Nebraska farmers reduced their mortgage debt 1.5% while that of the nation rose 4.6%.

mendous yearly output of crops and livestock from Nebraska farms and ranches.

Irrigation in Nebraska is older than the state itself, and today approximately one million acres of land are being made highly productive using this method. While practically every county in the state has at least a small irrigated area, most of the acreage is concentrated in the North Platte and Platte River valleys. Approximately 700,000 acres are under gravity irrigation systems, and 300,000 acres are under pumps. While most of the water for the gravity systems is stored in reservoirs. Some gravity systems get their water from direct stream diversion. New developments of reservoirs and canals now under construction plus other proposed projects form a bright picture that may eventually add an additional 1,500,000 acres of irrigated land.

Chambers of Commerce, other civic organizations, and private individuels and business firms throughout the state work closely with Nebraska farmers and ranchers in the promotion of new and sound agricultural practices. The soil conservation programs activated in the state have received nationwide attention. 4-H Clubs, Future Farmers of America, and other farm youth organizations in Nebraska are doing an outstanding job in preparing boys and girls for the important responsibilities that will some day be theirs. One of the nation's foremost Agricultural Colleges is maintained as a part of the University of Nebraska. It plays an important part in the state's agricultural and livestock development, and also in creating new industrial uses for farm crops.

All of this adds up to the fact that our Nebraska is an important contributor in filling the food basket of the nation ... and, yes, of the entire world. The farmers, ranchers, and those associated with the agricultural efforts of our state, have made and always will make Nebraska a great state in which to live, work, and raise our families.
