### Random Thoughts of TOWN & COUNTRY

We had quite a talk the other day with farmer J. M. Roberts. After solving a few of the world's lighter problems, we turned to the matter of small grain harvesting past and present, and J. M.'s thought was that the combine is gradually pushing the threshing rig to extinction. (That wasn't such a far-fetched dream either). We've Lost Something

Farm communities lost something with the passing of the long, old-fashioned harvest runs. There are 30 neighbors cooperating for a month, working together, eating together and celebrating together at the job's end.

And while the men harvested from sunrise till dark, still think it was the women who had the toughest task.

The days were hot—the cooking range was hot and the kitchen seemed hotter. Yet, the lady of the house worked long hours to fix a meal fit for king and all his nobles.

So—the men came in, disourged the quantities of food, pushed back the chairs and left in a few minutes—leaving only the bones, a stack of dishes, and three hours until lunch time.

Getting back to the male view—and personal experience—I have never forgotten Mrs. Harold Sorson's salads, or Mrs. Emil Baier's fried chicken, or a lot of other harrowing lunch time.

But the fact remains, the combine is here to stay.

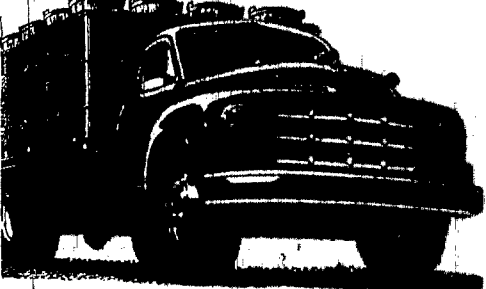



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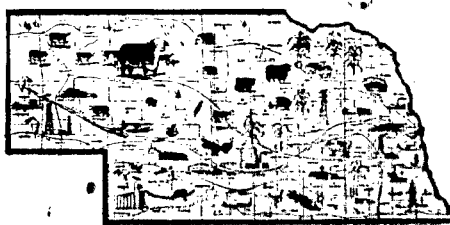
## OUTSTANDING! NEBRASKA TRADES AND SERVICES

In 1541 Francisco Vasquez de Coronado and a party of 30 Spanish cavalry were the first white men to set foot on the territory now known as the great state of Nebraska. About the year 1700 French explorers, fur traders and trappers began to venture up the Missouri River to Nebraska shores. In the years 1739-1740 the Mallet brothers and a party of Frenchmen crossed the region from East to West, and were responsible for naming the Platte River. At different times Spain, France and England all claimed the Nebraska territory, and in 1803 it passed to the United States as part of the Louisiana Purchase. Several exploration parties between the years 1804 and 1857 made known important facts about the region. One explorer, Major Stephen H. Long, designated the country as a "great desert," stating it was "entirely unfit for agriculture." While trading posts in the territory existed as early as 1795, the most important early white settlement was Fort Atkinson. This fort, founded in 1819 on the present site of Fort Calhoun, was a military post of 1,000 men, and the center of the first white industry and agriculture. The name, "Nebraska," was derived from the Otoe Indian name "Ne-brath-ka," meaning "Shallow Water," after the Platte River.

Even in those early settlement days, pioneers inaugurated a system of trades and services that was to eventually become a part of the daily lives of over a million people. In those early days with the state serving as the principal gateway to the West, towns and settlements were developed and served the needs of those who followed the Overland, Oregon, and Mormon trails. Today, most of these same towns still exist, offering comfortable living to their inhabitants.

From this early historical beginning, then, Nebraska has continued to grow in wealth and importance. Today, Nebraskans, who spring from hardy stock and guarded by excellent medical facilities, are a healthy and happy lot.

66.25 years while the women in the state can expect to live 70.04 years. Due to the efforts of Nebraskans themselves, general living conditions in the state are good. The comfort, well-being, and high standard of living offered to the people of any state depends largely upon the trades and services available to them. Nebraska does not lack for these facilities, and, as a result, comfortable and happy living can be enjoyed by all.

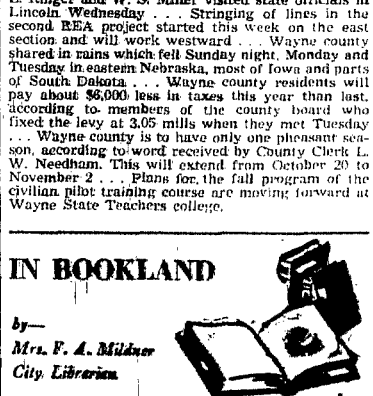

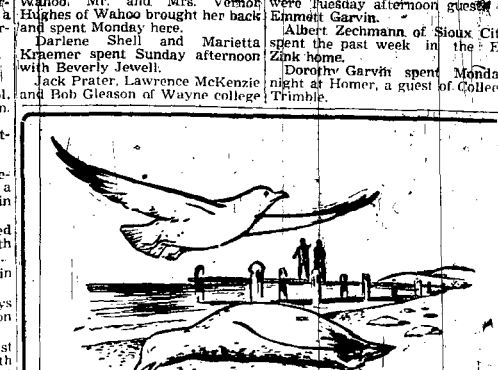
